Naples, April 21.

ORDERS are dispatched to the different Provinces of this Kingdom for raising a sufficient Number of Recruits to complete the several Regiments against the general Reviews which the Inspectors of the Troops are ordered to make in the Months of May and June next. We have not as yet received any Confirmation of the Action between our armed Frigates and the Algerine Corsairs, which makes us seem doubtful as to the Truth of that Report. We learn from Capoua, that several Persons belonging to a large Gang of Banditti were lately apprehended there, who having confessed to what Place their Accomplices usually retired, a strong Detachment of Grenadiers are gone in quest of them.

Turin, April 29. A Courier is arrived here from Vienna, whose Dispatches we are informed are so pleasing to the King, that 'tis presumed the Difficulties which have so long retarded the Conclusion of the Treaty for maintaining the Repose of Italy, are at length happily removed; and it is not doubted but that the last Hand will now soon be put to that important Affair.

Vienna, May 3. The Prince de Campo Reale, Ambassador from the King of the Two Sicilies to this Court, made his publick Entry into this City on Sunday last, and the next Day was admitted to his first publick Audiences of the Emperor, and of the Empress Queen, at Schonbrun. 'Tis said their Imperial Majesties will set out for Laxembourg towards the End of this Week, in order to take the Diversion of Hunting.

Stockholm, May 4. The general Diet of the States of this Kingdom is upon the Point of separating, and, to all Appearance, will break up with the same good Harmony that has subsisted through the whole Course of their Proceedings. They have still under Consideration the Methods to be made use of for raising a

Sum sufficient to answer the Expences of the late King's Funeral, and his present Majesty's Coronation. On Friday last the Anniversary of the Institution of the Order of the Seraphims was celebrated at Court; but the King made no Creation of Knights of that Order, as was expected. A few Days ago Count Goes, Envoy Extraordinary from their Imperial Majesties to this Court, received an Express from Vienna, with Dispatches of great Importance, the Contents of which he immediately communicated to the King in a private Audience he had of his Majesty for that Purpose.

Frankfort, May 9. We learn by our last Letters from Leipfick, that their Polish Majesties, who had been there, with several of the principal Lords of the Court, during the greatest Part of the Time of holding the Fair, set out from thence on Friday last on their Return to Dresden.

Berlin, May 10. A grand Firework is preparing at Charlottenbourg, in order to be play'd off on the Day of Prince Henry's Marriage, which 'tis believed will be celebrated towards the End of next Month. The King having ordered the Troops, quartered in this City, and in all the neighbouring Towns and Villages, to be in the Cantonments allotted for them by the 22d Instant, 'tis expected the Day will soon be fixed by his Majesty for the general Review on the Plain of Templow. On Wednesday last died in this City, Count Dohna, Grand Master of the Queen's Household, and Knight of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, and on Sunday his Corps was privately interred, agreeable to his Will.

Dresden, May 10. The Court is returned from Leipfick; and 'tis said the King's Departure for Fraustadt, in order to sign the Universalia for convoking the general Diet of Poland, will take Place immediately after Whitsuntide. They have lately discovered a Mine of Silver in the District of Plauen, from whence great Advantages are expected.

Leipsick, May 11. On the 2d Instant Count Solms, who came here some Days before, in order to pay his Respects to their Majesties, and to partake of the Pleasure of viewing the Fair, was seized with an Apoplectick Fit in the King's Antichamber; and, though all possible Care was taken of him, he expired in a few Hours, to the great Surprize of their Majesties and the whole Court. On the 5th the Court set out on its Return to Dresden; since which all the Nobility and Gentry who were here, have been setting out successively for their respective Homes.

Dusseldorp, May 12. In Conformity to the Elector our Sovereign's Orders, they have began, not only to repair the Fortifications of this City, in which upwards of 600 Men are employed, but also those of the other Places in this Dutchy. Within this Month past a great many Families have passed through this Place for Holland, in order to embark for New England, Nova Scotia, and other Parts of America. The Prince o Deux Ponts, Generallissimo of the Palatine Troops, who is appointed to review the Regiments quartered in this Country, is daily expected here from Manheim.

Brussels, May 15. On Monday last the Anniversary of the Empress Queen our Sovereign's Birth Day, was celebrated at Court. In the Morning a triple Discharge was made of the Cannon upon the Ramparts; at Noon Prince Charles of Lorrain, our Governor General, received the Compliments of the Nobility and Gentry on that Occasion; and at Night the Town House, and other publick Buildings, were all illuminated: The whole concluding with a grand Masquerade at the Theatre of the Court.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warlike Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Spierness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr Thomas Risley Blanchley, at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st Day of May next; This is to give

Notice, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, by the 31st of next Month, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.

The Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed Money for paying Half Pay to Sea Officers, from the 30th of June to the 31st of December 1751, according to his Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf;
