THEREAS John Earl of Dunmore was duly elected and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to fit in the House of

Peers of the present Parliament of Great Britain, and is since deceased; in order to the Electing another Peer of Scotland to fit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, issue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Thursday the Ninth Day of July next, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland, to fit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the room of the said John Earl of Dunmore deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies of fuch as shall be absent, (such Proxies being Peers) and producing a Mandate in Writing duly figned before Witnesles, and both Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law, And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the faid Reers, and to take their Votes, and immedistely after such Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer fo elected, and sign and attest the same in the Presence of the said Peers, and return such Certificate into His Majesty's High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And we strictly charge and command, that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, Twenty five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such Election.
