*Madrid, April 24.*

**O**N Wednesday the 19th Instant their Catholick Majesties went to Aranjuez, where they propose staying till the latter End of June. Before the Court left Madrid, Count Esterhasi had his Audiences of Leave, and was presented by the King with his Majesty's Picture, richly set with Diamonds: That Minister is since gone to wait upon the Queen Dowager at St. Ildefonso; after which he proposes setting out immediately on his Return to Vienna, his Successor M. de Migazzi, Coadjutor to the Archbishop of Mechlin, being already arrived.

*Petersbourg, April 28.* The Dispute between this Court and that of Sweden, in Relation to the Limits in Finland, has lately taken a favourable Turn, and we doubt not will soon be amicably adjusted to the Satisfaction of both Courts. Count Possé, the new Swedish Minister to this Court, is arrived here from Stockholm.

*Turin, April 30.* The Court sets out this Week for the Palace of the Venerie, in order to pass the Summer. The Deputies who arrived here some Time since from the Republick of Geneva, with Instructions to solicit the King to revoke, or at least to soften the Rigour of the Orders lately sent to the Regency of the Dutchy of Savoy, in relation to the Protestants established in the District of St. Victor and Chapitre, not having been able to obtain their Request, are set out from hence on their Return Home. In Conformity to the King's Orders, they have already began to equip, in the Port of Nice, the small Squadron intended to cruize against the Corsairs of Barbary. The Engineers appointed to inspect the Fortifications of the Frontier Places of this Country, are set out from hence in order to view the same.

*Genoa, May 2.* We learn by Dispatches received lately from the Marquis de Grimaldi this Republick's Commissary General in Corsica, that the Affairs of that Island begin at length to take a favourable Turn.

*Chamberry, May 5.* We are assured, that the King is resolved to solicit the Court of Madrid for the Debts the Spaniards contracted, whilst they were in Possession of this Dutchy, during the late War. The large Gang of Robbers, who committed for several Months together the most unheard-of Outrages in this Country, are become more audacious than ever, several Country Seats having been lately plundered by them in the Night, and all the most valuable Effects carried off. There fell

such a prodigious Quantity of Snow on the Mountains that separate Savoy from Piemont, towards the End of last Month, that the Roads from hence to Turin, are almost impassable.

*Rome, May 6.* The Pope has disposed of the Archbishoprick of Gorice in Favour of Count Althemps. The two Sons of Prince Corsini are set out from hence for Venice, from whence they propose taking a Tour to most of the principal Courts in Europe.

*Warsaw, May 6.* The Primate of this Kingdom arrived here on Sunday last from Lowicz; and the same Day Count Siedlincky, Great Treasurer of the Crown, set out from hence for Constantinow. The Regiments here in Garrison were reviewed a few Days ago by the Commissaries appointed for that Purpose, and made a very fine Appearance. By our last Advices from Podolia and Volhinia we are informed, that those two Provinces enjoy the greatest Tranquillity, and that the same is entirely owing to the prudent Measures which have been taken to prevent the Incurfions of the Heyducks.

*Vienna, May 7.* They are making Preparations at Schonbrun for celebrating the Empress Queen's Birth-day on the 13th Instant. The Chevalier Tron, Ambassador from the Republick of Venice to this Court, having had his Audiences of Leave of their Imperial Majesties, waits only the Arrival of the Chevalier Correro, who is appointed to replace him, before he sets out on his Return Home. Her Imperial Majesty has caused two beautiful Services of China Ware, made in this City, to be sent as Presents to the King and Queen of Spain.

*Copenhagen, May 9.* Field Marshal Count Schulenburg is preparing to set out from hence for Hanover, in order to compliment his Britannick Majesty, in the Name of the King of Denmark, on his safe Arrival in his German Dominions. The new Envoy from Morocco has frequent Conferences with the Ministry, and with the Directors appointed to regulate the Commerce of this Kingdom; but he has not as yet been admitted to his publick Audience.

*Berlin, May 16.* The Celebration of the Marriage of Prince Henry with the Princess of Hesse Cassel, is fixed for the 24th of next Month, when the grand Fireworks, that have been preparing for some Time, will be played off. The King has appointed M. Bartsch to be Receiver General of the Chamber of Finances of Konigsberg. On Monday next his Majesty proposes to review the Regiment of Foot Guards, as likewise the Regiments of Prince Henry, Munchow, Retzow and Kalde

*Antwerp, May 17.* On Saturday last, being the Anniversary of the Empress Queen our Sovereign's Birth Day, who then entered into the 36th Year of her Age, the Magistrates in a Body, and the principal Officers of the Garrison, assisted at High Mass in the Cathedral Church, during which three Discharges were made of the Cannon of the Citadel, and of the neighbouring Forts; and at Night there were Illuminations and Bonfires throughout this City.

*Dusseldorp, May 18.* We have received Advice, that the Princess of Deux Ponts was safely delivered of a Princess on the 10th Instant; and that the young Princess was christened the next Day by the Name of Maria-Amelia.

*Hague, May 23.* Count Schlippenbach, Governor of Lillo, having obtained Leave to resign his Employment, her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has disposed of the same in Favour of M. Borssele, Colonel Commandant of the Regiment of Field Marshal Count Maurice of Nassau,
