Petersbourg, May 21.

THE Anniversary of the Coronation of her Imperial Majesty has been celebrated this Year with the greatest Magnificence: A numerous Promotion of Military Officers was made on that Occasion, amongst whom, the Lieutenants General Brigh and Tarakanoff, were raised to the Rank of Generals; Majors General Bratke, Keyserling, Romanzoff, Bruce and Lukin, to that of Lieutenants General; and the Brigadiers Paskow and Molzanow, to that of Majors General. The Marriage of Knees Labanoff, with the third Daughter of Prince Kourakin, was celebrated at Court on Monday last with great Solemnity, her Imperial Majesty and the Great Duke being present at that Ceremony. The Affair concerning the Regulation of the Limits in Finland continues to take a favourable Turn, and 'tis not doubted but the Differences which have subsisted between this Empire and Sweden on that Account, will at last be adjusted to their mutual Satisfaction.

Parma, May 24. A few Days ago we had here an almost continual Rain for three Days successively, which, with the Melting of the Snows upon the Mountains, so swelled the Rivers, that the usual Alarm was given for the Country People to be on their Guard; and notwithstanding all possible Precautions were taken, the great River that runs by Colorno, where the Court is now kept, overflowed its Banks last Thursday Night, by which Means a large Quantity of Water came into all the lower Apartments of the Palace, and great Damages were done by the Floods all round that Neighbourhood.

Marseilles, May 26. Within these few Days past, twenty Barks have sailed from hence for Bastia; and 'tis generally said here, that they are gone thither, in order to bring away the French Forces from Corsica; if this is Fact, as most People think it is, that Island will doubtless soon be in as much Trouble and Confusion as ever.

Pofnania, May 31. Advice having been received from Dresden, that the King intends to set out from thence on the 5th of next Month for Fraustadt, in order to sign the Universalia for convoking the General Diet of Poland,

most of the Grandees of the Kingdom are already gone thither in order to attend his Majesty. We learn by divers private Letters from the Ukraine, that the Heyducks have lately appeared again in great Numbers on the Frontiers of that Province, and have plundered and massacred best Part of the Inhabitants of a large Village; from whence they proceeded further into the Country, in order to commit other Outrages, of which the Governor of Kiow being informed, he ordered a considerable Detachment of Troops to be sent after them, who marched with so much Diligence and Secrecy, that they surprized a large Body of them, whom they immediately fell upon, and cut to Pieces.

Berlin, June 6. The King set out from Potzdam on Saturday last, in order to review the Troops quartered in Lower Pomerania and the Duchy of Magdebourg. His Majesty is accompanied in this Tour by his three Brothers, and attended by several General Officers. The young Prince of Borghese, who has been extremely ill since his Arrival in this City, and who is now pretty well recovered, was last Wednesday presented to the Queen by Count Wartensleben, Grand Marshal of the Court, and met with a gracious Reception. The King has appointed M. Borke, heretofore Captain in the Regiment of Foot of Munchow, to be Counsellor of War and Domains of the Chamber of Minden; and Mademoiselle Forcade, one of the Daughters of Major General Forcade, is appointed by his Majesty to be second Maid of Honour to the Princess Guillemine of Hesse-Cassel, who is shortly to be married to Prince Henry.

Dusseldorp, June 9. According to our last Advices from Manheim, they are making great Preparations at that Court for the Reception of the Elector of Bavaria, who is shortly expected there from Munich.

Paris, June 10. On Saturday last the King took the Diversions of Hunting in the Neighbourhood of Rambouillet; from whence he went to Crecy, and returned at Night to Versailles. Count Bachy, lately appointed Ambassador from this Court to that of Portugal, took Leave of his Majesty on Wednesday last, and will set out in a few Days in order to proceed on his Journey to that Court.

Court. On the 22d of last Month the Deputies of the States of Artois were admitted to an Audience of the King, being introduced by the Duke de Chaulnes, Governor of that Province, and by Count Argenson, Minister and Secretary of State, and conducted by the Marquis de Breze, Grand Master of the Ceremonies.

Hague, June 13. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has lately appointed Major General Famars, to be Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Horse of Birckenfeld; M. de Vrese to be Major to the Regiment of Stolberg, in the room of M. Wittersheim, who had obtain'd Leave to resign; and Lieutenant General van Oyen to be Major to the Regiment of Horse Guards; and they have all taken their respective Oaths before the Council of State, to qualify them for their several Employments.
