Genoa, May 27.

WE are informed by the Master of a Felucca, which arrived here some Days ago from Antibes, that the King of Sardinia's Gallies put to Sea from Villafranca on the 17th Instant, on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates, but that they had been obliged to put back again into that Port by contrary Winds.

Rome, May 27. On Saturday last the Baron de St. Ody, the new Imperial Minister, had his first publick Audience of the Pope, to which he was conducted with the usual Ceremonies. The next Day, being Whitsunday, the Pope repaired to the Chapel of the Quirinal, and assisted at High Mass, which was performed by Cardinal Tamburini; and on Thursday he set out, with a great Retinue, for Castel Gandolfo for the Summer.

Bologne, May 28. We learn by our last Letters from Parma, that Count Anguisciola, Governor of that City, died there a few Days ago, and that the Infant Duke had appointed the Count de Riva to succeed him in that Post. The Court of Modena, which has been at Reggio during the Fair, sets out from thence on Monday next for Rivalta, in order to pass the Month of June at that Palace.

Aranjuez, May 29. His Excellency General Wall, Ambassador from this Court to the King of Great Britain, arrived here on Saturday last, the 27th of this Month, and was most graciously received by their Catholick Majesties. Great Preparations are making for celebrating, on the 30th Instant, St. Fernando's Day, whose Name the King bears.

Aranjuez, June 5. A Detachment of Infantry, (consisting of about three thousand Men, drawn out of different Regiments) which has been for some Time at Ocanna, learning several new Exercises, under the Direction of Brigadier Don Antonio Manso, marched from thence on the 23d, in order to encamp on a Plain about half a League distant from this Place, and the three following Days was reviewed by his Majesty, who was so well satisfied with the fine Appearance that this select Body of Troops made, as well as with the Manner in which they went through all their different Exercises, that he was pleased to order the private Men triple Pay for five Days, and has since promoted several of the Officers. His Majesty has reserved for his own Determina-

tion, which of the several Exercises, that were performed before him, he will have made use of in his Army. By an extraordinary Messenger, who arrived here on the 23d of last Month, their Catholick Majesties had the Pleasure of hearing, that the Queen of Naples was brought to Bed of a Son on the 11th Instant at Night. Don Jayme Massenes, Lieutenant-General in this Service, set out the 3d Instant, on his Embassy to France.

Stockholm, June 1. 'Tis now confidently asserted, that the States of this Kingdom will separate on Monday next. The King is preparing to set out for Finland, in order to visit the Fortifications of that Province, which Tour will take up near six Weeks; during which the Queen and the young Royal Family are to remain at Drottningholm.

Venice, June 2. The Master of a Ship arrived here from Smyrna brings Advice, that some Days before his Departure from thence, a Fire broke out in that Part of the City inhabited by the Turks, which burnt down a great Number of Houses; and that two Days after another Fire broke out in the Quarter inhabited by the French, which did also very considerable Damages. The Master of a French Ship just arrived here from the Coast of Barbary, not only brings a Confirmation of the eldest Son of the Bey of Tunis's having defeated his Father's Army, and forced him to take Shelter in the Castle of Bardo; but likewise adds, that the Father had been obliged to surrender to his Son after a Siege of ten Days; and that the Son had thereupon committed him to Prison, with strict Orders to those who have the Care of him, to cause his Eyes to be put out, and even to strangle him, in Case he or his Party should make the least Attempt to procure his Liberty.

Vienna, June 3. Her Imperial Majesty is now in the last Month of her Pregnancy, and enjoys a good State of Health. Count Konigssegg Erps, President of the Council of the Mines, is set out from hence for Stiria, in order to examine a new Mine of Silver lately discovered in that Country, which 'tis thought will answer extremely well.

Cologne, June 12. Last Week a Number of Families passed by this Place from the Counties of Budingen and Birstein; they were going to Holland, in order to embark for New England and Nova Scotia.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Honourable George Earl of Cardigan, the Office of Governor and Captain of his Majesty's Castle of Windsor, and of the Forts and Fortifications thereunto belonging, in the Room of Charles Duke of St. Albans, deceased.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Honourable John Lord Delawarr, Lieutenant General of his Majesty's Forces, the Office of Governor of his Majesty's Island of Guernsey, Castle of Cornet, and the Islands and Territories thereunto belonging, (the Island of Adderney only excepted.)

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable Charles Lord Cadogan, Lieutenant General of his Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of the Fort and Blockhouse of West Tilbury in the County of Essex, with the Intrenchment and Fortifications thereof; and also of the Town of Gravesend in the County of Kent, and of the Blockhouse and Forts there.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Sir John Mordaunt, Knight of the Bath, Major General of his Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of the Fort of Sheerness in the Isle of Shepey in the County of Kent, in the room of Lord Cadogan.

An Extract of a Clause inserted in an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, amongst other Things to indemnify Persons who have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execution of Articles of Clerkship within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for those Purposes.

AND whereas divers Persons through Mistake, Absence, or some unavoidable Accident, to the Prejudice of Infants, and others, have omitted to cause Affidavits to be made and filed in the proper Offices, of the actual Execution of several Contracts in Writing, to serve as Clerks to Attorneys and Solicitors within the Time limited and expressed by an Act passed in the Twenty-second Year of his present Majesty's Reign, whereby many Persons may be in Danger of incurring the Disabilities in the said Act mentioned, be it enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That all and every Person and Persons who have omitted to cause such Affidavits to be made and filed as aforesaid, and who shall, on or before the said 28th Day of November, cause one or more Affidavit or Affidavits to be made and filed in such Manner as directed by the said Act, shall be, and are hereby indemnified, freed and discharged from and against all Penalties, Forfeitures, Incapacities and Disabilities in the said Act mentioned, incurred or to be incurred for or by Reason of any Neglect or Omission in causing such Affidavit or Affidavits to be made and filed according to the Direction of the said Act; and such Affidavit or Affidavits so to be made and filed as aforesaid, shall be as effectual to all Intents and Purposes as if the same had been made and filed within the Time limited by the said Act.

All Persons who have omitted to file Affidavits of the due Execution of Articles of Clerkship within the Time mentioned in the Act of the Twenty-second of his present Majesty, and in Pursuance thereof, are desired to file such Affidavits on or before the 28th of November next, agreeable to the above Clause.
