Petersbourg, May 30.

THE Empress, who is expected here To-day from Czarkazelo, will set out for Petershoff towards the End of next Week for the Summer, her Imperial Majesty's intended Journey to Moscow not being to take Place till the Beginning of next Winter. Colonel Poshakoff is sentenced to be reduced to a private Soldier, for the Insult lately committed by him on Baron Greiffenheim the Swedish Minister. We learn by an Express from Moscow, that a most dreadful Fire broke out a few Days ago in that City, which burnt with such Violence, and spread so fast, that upwards of 5000 Houses, besides many Churches, Convents, and other Religious Houses, were entirely reduced to Ashes, and several Persons lost their Lives. Upon the Receipt of this melancholy News, her Imperial Majesty caused Orders to be dispatched thither for granting Relief to all such as are in immediate Want, great Numbers having been reduced to the utmost Misery and Confusion.

Turin, May 31. Publick Prayers are ordered to be put up in all the Churches of this City, for the happy Delivery of the Dutchess of Savoy, who is now near her Time.

Rome, June 3. Yesterday the Cardinal Secretary of State set out for Castel Gandolfo, where the Court now resides. Ten of the principal Authors of the late Tumults at Subiaco are sentenced to perpetual Banishment out of the Ecclesiastical State. The Pope has ordered 2000 Scudis more to be distributed amongst the Inhabitants of Gualdo, Nocera, and other Places that suffered so much by the late Earthquakes. 'Tis confidently reported here, that the Maltese Gallies had a very smart Engagement with some Algerine Corsairs on the 14th of last Month, off the Island of Pantellaria, which ended greatly in Favour of the Maltese, who took two large Algerine Xebecs, and sunk another.

Parma, June 6. The fine Appearance we have in this Country of a plentiful Harvest this

Year, has already considerably reduced the Price of Corn and Bread, which have been extremely dear for some Months past.

Vienna, June 7. A Courier is dispatched to Madrid, with the Ratification of the Treaty lately concluded with that Court. The Number of Persons of all Ages who have passed by this Place from Swabia, the Uppere Rhine, the Watteraw, and other Places in the Empire, is computed to upwards of 20000: These People, who are mostly very poor, are going to settle in Hungary, where they hope to find better Encouragement than in their own Countries.

Stockholm, June 8. Their Majesties and the young Royal Family came here on Saturday last from Ulrichsdahl in perfect Health; and on Tuesday M. Marteville, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, had his first private Audience of the King, to whom he delivered his Credential Letters; after which he had an Audience of the Queen. The Separation of the Diet, which was fixed for Monday last, is deferred for eight or ten Days. His Majesty has appointed M. Adlerbeth, Knight of the Order of the North Star, to be Vice-President of the Tribunal of Jonkioping. On Friday last died here Count Gyllenbourg, one of the Senators of this Kingdom, and Chancellor of the University of Lund.

Dresden, June 9. The King, who set out for Fraustadt on Sunday last, to sign the Universalia for convoking the General Diet of Poland, returned to this City last Night in perfect Health.

Berlin, June 13. The King returned to Potzdam on Wednesday Night last from reviewing his Troops in the Dutchy of Magdebourg; and Yesterday Morning his Majesty, accompanied by the Princes Henry and Ferdinand, and attended by several General Officers, set out for Stettin, in order to review the Troops in Garrison at that Place. On the 24th Instant the King, the two Queens, and all the Royal Family, intend going to Charlottenbourg, in order to receive the Princess of Hesse Cassel, who is to be married to Prince Henry on the

25th, when the magnificent Feasts and publick Rejoycings on that Occasion are to begin; they are to last for several Days, during which all the grand Fireworks, that have been preparing for some Time, are to be played off,

Cologn, June 14. On Monday last we had a most violent Storm of Hail and Rain, accompanied with Thunder and Lightning, but we do not hear that the Fruits of the Earth have suffered so much by it as was greatly feared.

Dusseldorp, June 16. Orders are arrived here from Mannheim, for the Regiment of Foot of la Marck, which has been in this Garrison for three Years, to march from hence on the 24th Instant for Juliers, in order to relieve that of Isselback, which is expected here towards the End of the Month.

Copenhagen, June 17. His Danish Majesty's Marriage with the Princess Juliana Maria of Brunswick, is absolutely concluded, and the new Court already formed. It consists chiefly of those Persons who had the Honour to serve the late-Queen, and who are not yet otherwise provided for. M. Juell and his Lady keep their former Posts, and the young Countess Haxthausen is Lady of the Bed-Chamber. All these, with a proper Attendance, are set out for Holstein, in order to meet the Princess upon the Frontier, and to conduct her hither. Her Highness is expected about the 12th or 13th of next Month; and the Marriage is to be solemnized, very privately, in the Country. But the Royal Family soon after comes to Town, where there will be a publick Entry, and other Festivities, for some Days, at the End of which they propose to return again into the Country for the rest of the Season. On this Occasion the Court Mourning is to be shortened, and, 'tis thought, will entirely conclude in the first Week of July.

Hague, July 20. The Duke of Brunswick Wolfembuttel, who has been indisposed for some Days, is now much better. A solemn Deputation is arrived here from the Province of Groninguen, who have already been admitted to an Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante. Her Royal Highness has lately disposed of several Military Employments, amongst whom M. Sonsbeek is appointed Colonel Commandant of a Regiment of Horse, and M. Witten is appointed Captain Commandant of the Second Company of Grenadiers of the Regiment of Lieutenant General Evertzen. We have received an Account from Nimeguen, of the Death of M. Grotenray, Colonel of a Regiment of Foot in the Service of this Republick.
