30th Day of *June*, 1752,

P R E S E N T,

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council.

**W**HEREAS their Excellencies the Lords Justices have received Information, that the Plague hath lately broke out within the State or Dominion of *Algiers* in *Africa*, and that great Numbers of Persons die daily thereof—Their Excellencies have therefore thought proper, for preventing the said Infection from being brought into this Kingdom, to Order, as it is hereby ordered, with the Advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, That the Quarantine of Forty Days, now subsisting by Orders of his Majesty in Council of the 18th of *June* 1747, and 28th of *June* 1749, upon all Ships and Vessels coming from any of the Ports in *West Barbary* upon the *Atlantick Ocean*, or from any of the Ports in the *Streights of Gibraltar* on the *Barbary Coast*, or any other of the Ports on that Coast in the *Mediterranean*, lying between the said *Streights* and *Cape de las Tres Forcas* in the Kingdom of *Fez*, be extended Eastward upon the *African Coast*, from the said *Cape de las Tres Forcas* to *Cape Rufara* in the Kingdom of *Barca*—And that all Ships and Vessels already arrived and not unladen, or that shall hereafter arrive in the Ports of this Kingdom, from any of the Ports or Places between the said two Capes, be put under the like Quarantine, and required to pursue the same Rules, Regulations, and Directions, as are contained in his Majesty's aforementioned Orders in Council:—And the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and his Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

*Warsaw*, *June* 28. Count *Branicki*, Great General of the Crown Army, has sent Circular Letters to every particular District, enjoying them to require such Deputies as they shall appoint to assist in their Name at the General Diet of the Kingdom, to be at *Loficz*, in the Palatinate of *Podlachia*, on Friday the 7th of *August* next. We learn from *Polsania*, that a most violent Storm of Rain and Hail, accom-

panied with Thunder and Lightning, happened there on the 16th Instant, which did a vast deal of Mischief. The Thunder appeared most terrible, and the Lightning falling on a Church in the Town of *Schroeder*, soon reduced it to Ashes, with about thirty Houses that adjoined to it. According to our last Advices from the Frontiers of *Volhinia*, they have been for this Fortnight past greatly pestered with surprizing Flights of Locusts, which have devoured almost every Thing Green, both in their Fields and Gardens.

*Prague*, *July* 4. Field Marshal Prince *Lobkowitz* returned hither from *Raudnitz* the 24th of last Month, and on the 27th set out for *Hungary*. Count *Keyserling*, the late Russian Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of *Dresden*, arrived here from thence on Friday last, with a numerous Retinue, and the next Day continued his Journey for *Vienna*, to which Court he is appointed to reside as Ambassador Extraordinary from the Empress of *Russia*.

*Dresden*, *July* 5. The King has disposed of the Place vacant in the Ministry by the Death of Count *Hennicke*, in Favour of Count *Stubenberg*. The King has likewise appointed the late Count *Hennicke's* Son to be Director of the Chamber of Accompts of the Revenues of *Mersebourg* and *Naumbourg*; and the Post of Vice-Chancellor, which Count *Stubenberg* has resigned on this Occasion, has been given by his Majesty to *M. Stammers*, Counsellor of the Court. Prince *Albert*, who has been for some Days past very much indisposed, is now much better. 'Tis reported that a Treaty of Marriage is on Foot between the Princess *Maria Christiana*, their Majesties Daughter, and the Infant *Don Pedro* of *Portugal*, and that the same will take Place soon after the King's Return from *Poland*, whose Departure from hence for that Kingdom is fixed for the 20th of next Month.

*Augsbourg*, *July* 5. According to our last Advices from *Lichtenbourg*, the Elector of *Bavaria* is perfectly recovered of the Measles, and sets out on Friday next with the Electress his Spouse for their Palace at *Nymphenbourg* for the Remainder of the Summer. The Baron de *Widman*, Minister Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties to divers Princes and Circles of the Empire, arrived here on Saturday last from *Munich*, and set out the next Day for *Nurembourg*, in order to terminate some Disputes which have arisen between the Princes of the Circle of *Franconia*. We learn from *Brunswick*, that the Feasts given on Account of the Marriage of the Princess *Julia Maria*, with

with the King of Denmark, have been extremely Magnificent; and that great Preparations are making against the approaching Fair, which opens on the 1st of next Month.

*Heidelberg, July 6.* The prodigious Quantity of Corn that has been sent out of this Country for these five or six Months past into Swisserland and Alface, has caused a considerable Rise in that Commodity; but as we have now a fine Prospect of a plentiful Harvest, 'tis not doubted but that it will soon fall again to a reasonable Price.

*Brussels, July 10.* The States of the Province of Flanders are soliciting for Leave to make a Road from Alost to Louvain, and 'tis thought their Request will be granted, as 'twill doubtless be very serviceable to Commerce. The English and Dutch Commissaries have sent to their respective Courts the Result of a seventh Conference they have lately held with those of the Empress Queen, in relation to the settling of the Barrier and the Tariff. 'Tis said a Placard or Edict will soon be published here, forbidding all Persons whatsoever to wear Swords, whose Birth or Employments do not entitle them to that Liberty.

*Hague, July 13.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who opened their Assembly Yesterday, have this Day continued their Deliberations. Mess. Schydeuyt and Alberda are returned here from Dutch Flanders, where they have been, by Order of the Council of State, to visit the Fortifications and Magazines.
