Naples, June 27.

ON Saturday last the King, attended by several of the principal Lords of his Court, went from Portici to view the new Palace that is erecting at Caserta, with which his Majesty seemed greatly pleased, and ordered a handsome Sum of Money to be distributed amongst the Workmen. On Sunday Night a Fire broke out at a considerable Druggists in this City, which burnt down that and several other Houses adjoining. Most of our armed Chebecks are now cruising in the Seas of Calabria, in order to protect the Navigation of this Kingdom from the Barbary Pyrates.

Florence, July 1. The Regencies of Barbary and Algiers have made a Proposal to this State, to furnish the Inhabitants of Tuscany with all the Corn they shall from Time to Time have Occasion for, at a Sequin a Sack, and to take one half of its Value in the Manufactures of this Country, and the other half in Specie, which Proposal is sent by Count Richcourt to Vienna, for his Imperial Majesty's Approbation. They write from Leghorn, that on Friday the 23d of last Month they had a violent Shock of an Earthquake, which happily went off without doing any considerable Damage.

Leghorn, July 2. The Master of a French Ship which arrived here a few Days ago assures us, that a Venetian Man of War, cruizing in the Adriatick Gulph, had fallen in with two Barbary Corsairs, one of which she had sunk, and had taken the other with eight Guns and 64 Men on board. It has been currently reported here for some Days past, that Part of the Ottoman Fleet, under the Command of the Captain Bashaw, who was going to collect the annual Tributes of the Inhabitants of the Islands in the Archipelago, for the Use of the Grand Seigneur, had perished at Sea in a violent Tempest; but as some Ships are since come in from the Levant, the Masters of which declare they heard of no such Accident, we must suspend our Belief of it for the present.

Toulon, July 2. A Tartane, named the Emanuel, that made Part of the small Squadron commanded by M. du Reveft, which sailed from hence some Time ago for the Mediterranean, is returned into this Port with Advice, that the Dey of Tripoly has consented to give that Commander all the Satisfaction the King his Master required; that M. du Reveft continued at Anchor before Tripoly, waiting for the Squadron commanded by M. Villarzel, in order to go on a secret Expedition, as is said to Tunis, to demand Satisfaction of the new Dey for compelling the French Minister, M. Montchenu, to declare in his Favour against the Dey his Father, at the Time of the late Revolution in that State.

Parma, July 3. The Small-Pox being very rife at Colorno, and many of the Inhabitants dying of it, the Duke and Dutchess our Sovereigns have thought fit to leave that Place much sooner than they intended, and have fixed their Residence for the present in this City. We are informed that Cardinal Alberoni has, by his Will, given all his Lands and Tenements in Lombardy to the College of St. Lazarus at Placentia; and those he was possessed of in the Romagna, to the Abbe Alberoni his Nephew, for his Life only, after which they are to go likewise to the said College. They continue to make the necessary Preparations for the Dutchess's intended Journey to France, and 'tis assured she is to be accompanied thither by the Infanta Isabella her Daughter.

Stockholm, July 7. We have received Advice, that the King landed safe at Helsingfors in Finland the 27th of last Month, and was joyfully received by the Inhabitants of that Dutchy. The Resolutions taken by the late Diet, for the Improvement of the Commerce of this Kingdom, are now vigorously carrying into Execution. Lieutenant Colonel Baron Scheffer is set out from hence for France, in order to replace his Brother in the Post of Envoy Extraordinary from this Court. We learn from Gothenbourg, that the Prince Charles and the Gothick Lyon, two Ships belonging to our East India Company, arrived there the 26th of last Month

Month from China; and that the Sale of the Merchandize, brought by them, is to commence on the 17th of next Month.

Munich, July 9. Duke Clement of Bavaria, and the Princess his Spouse, who went last Wednesday to Lichtenbourg, to compliment the Elector of Bavaria our Sovereign upon his late Recovery, are returned here, and propose going the latter End of next Week to the Palace of Nymphenbourg, in order to meet his Electoral Highness, who 'tis said will be there from Lichtenbourg by that Time.

Aix-la-Chapelle, July 16. We are assured, that the Marriage of the Hereditary Prince of Brandenburg-Anspach with the Princess Carolina-Amelia-Sophia, fourth Daughter of the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, is agreed to, and that the same will be celebrated in a short Time. We are informed by Letters from Strasbourg, that the new Swiss Regiment, which was raised in the Canton of Zurich, by Virtue of an Agreement made for that Purpose between that Canton and the Court of France, is almost compleat. The Cardinal Prince and Bishop of Liege, for whose Reception Preparations have been making for some Days past at Spa, arrived there on Thursday last, with a numerous Retinue, and proposes staying about a Month.

Brussels, July 17. The almost continual Rains that have fallen in this Country, ever since the Beginning of this Month, give Room to fear our Harvest will not prove altogether so plentiful as we some Time since imagined; and in Consequence the Price of Bread, which has been very moderate for some Time past, is now daily expected to rise.

Hague, July 20. We learn from Utrecht, that her Royal Highness the Princess Governante arrived there on Tuesday Night last with her Children, in perfect Health; and having rested that Night at Baron Gieffenbourg's, her Royal Highness continued her Journey Yesterday Morning for Dieren.

WHEREAS the Time draws near for holding a Fair in this County, called *Welsh Fair*, for the selling of Horned Cattle, which said Fair used to be held at Islington, but lately has been held at Barnet: And whereas we have Cause to believe the said Infection, which during the Summer Time, in this County has greatly decreased, has for some Years, by reason of this Fair broke out again, and raged very much during the Months of September, October and November: Therefore in order to prevent such spreading of the said Distemper, and in Pursuance of the Powers and Authorities given, as well by his Majesty's Orders in Council, as by the several Acts of Parliament in that Behalf made, we do order and direct, That no Fair or Market, or other publick Place of Sale, be held or kept within this County for the Sale of Horned Cattle, (except fat Cattle for immediate Slaughter) from the 15th Day of August next, to the 10th Day of October following; and that no Person or Persons shall or do presume to drive, send, or remove, or cause to be driven, sent, or removed, any Horned Cattle, (except fat Cattle for immediate Slaughter) to any Fair, Market, or other publick Place of Sale in this County, within the Time before mentioned, under the Pains, Penalties, and Forfeitures mentioned, set, or imposed by his Majesty's said Orders in Council, or the said Acts of Parliament, or any of them in that Case made. And for the notifying this Order, it is further directed, That the same be forthwith inserted in the London Gazette, the Daily Advertiser, and London Evening Post.
