ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

BY the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is Enacted as follows, *viz.*

5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies.— And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500 l.

7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of his Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies, or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with Double the Value thereof.

9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, en-

couraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there; by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted,

ed, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

Naples, July 11. On Tuesday last three of the King's Gallies returned into this Port from a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates, in which they have been very unsuccessful, not having been able to come up with any of them. The young Prince, of whom the Queen was lately brought to Bed, has been very much indisposed for some Days past, as has also their Majesties eldest Daughter, but we hope their Illnesses will be attended with no fatal Consequences. The King intends setting out towards the End of this Month for the Island of Procida, in order to take the Diversion of Hunting for some Days; and 'tis said her Majesty proposes accompanying him thither, if the Health of her Children will permit. On Saturday last a large Gang of Thieves, who have committed divers Robberies in this Neighbourhood, were apprehended at Angra, a Village some little Distance from hence, and conveyed the same Day under a strong Guard to the Prisons of this City.

Rome, July 15. In Conformity to the Orders of the Pope, publick Prayers are still continued to be put up in all the Churches of this City for the Preservation of the Catholick Church from the Dangers with which it is threatned by the Disputes being carried so high between the Clergy and Parliaments of France, and particularly that of Paris. On the 9th Instant Cardinal Ruffo, Dean of the Sacred College, who has been very much indisposed of late, set out from hence for Anzio, in order to embark on board one of our Gallies for Bagnara in Calabria, the Place of his Nativity, whither his Physicians have prevailed on him to retire for some Time, in order, if possible, to re-establish his Health. The young Prince of Tour-Taxis, who went some Time since to Naples, to view the Curiosities of that City, is returned hither, and was elegantly entertained at Dinner on Thursday last by Cardinal Spinelli.

Vienna, July 22. Yesterday Morning the Emperor signed several Dispatches, and afterwards gave some private Audiences. Besides the late Promotion made by the Empress Queen of Majors General, there has also been a considerable one of Colonels and Lieutenant Colonels, amongst whom Mess. O-Donel, Petit, Rebach, Beccaria, Campitelli, Hohenfeld, Bellow, Miggazzi, Cramer, Valenciani, Courfia, Bindershoffen, Wurtzbourg, Stahrenbourg, Wangenheim, Aichem, Guasco, Kalmocky, and St. Ywany, were all promoted to the Rank of Colonels; as were Mess. Rhedi, Weifs, Caraccioli, Pompeati, Seckendorff, Althemps and Cicogna, to that of Lieutenant Colonels. Her Imperial Majesty has appointed Mess. Ebner, Rottschutz, and Soto, to be Commandants of the Fortresses of Kuffstein, Zolnock, and Femelwar. Count Keyserling, the new Russian

Ambassador, had his first private Audience of their Imperial Majesties the Beginning of this Week, and delivered his Credential Letters.

Prague, July 24. The Officers belonging to the Regiment of Foot of Archduke Charles, as also those of the Regiments of Sinceri and Wolfembuttel, which Regiments have for some Time past composed this Garrison, have received Orders to march from hence by the End of next Week for the Camp that is forming in the Neighbourhood of Colin.

Dresden, July 25. The Tour which Prince Xavier and Prince Charles-Christian proposed taking to several of the principal Courts of Europe, will not take Place this Year; and we are now assured, that those two Princes will accompany the King in his Journey to Poland. The two Princes of Borghese, who have been for some Months past at Berlin, are arrived here, and have had the Honour of being presented to their Majesties and the Royal Family, who received them with great Marks of Distinction.

Augsbourg, July 25. The Prince of Tour-Taxis, the Emperor's Principal Commissary to the Diet of the Empire, passed by this Place a few Days ago, with the Princess his Spouse, and a numerous Retinue, on his Way to his Seat in Swabia.

Frankfort, July 28. The Elector of Mayence, who has been very much indisposed for some Time past, is now greatly recovered, and appears every Day in Publick. They write from Upper Bavaria, that on the 19th Instant a large Quantity of Hail, of a prodigious Size, fell at Braunau, and for several Miles round, which greatly damaged the Fruits of the Earth, and particularly the Corn.

Liege, July 29. According to Advices received here from Spa, the Cardinal Prince our Bishop has found so much Benefit from the Waters of that Place, that he already takes the Diversion of Hunting in that Neighbourhood. The Post of Resident from this State to the Court of Brussels, vacant by the Death of M. Rameau, is conferred on Count Grosberg.

Dusseldorp, July 30. There are several Persons taken up here, and committed to Prison, being accused of putting off a considerable Quantity of counterfeit Spanish double and single Pistoles. We learn by private Letters from Dresden, that the Difficulties which have hitherto hindered the King of Poland from acceding to the Treaty concluded at Petersbourg in the Year 1746, were at Length entirely removed. They write from Neubourg, that the Princess of Hesse Rheinfelds, who some Years after the Death of the Landgrave her Spouse, retired into the Convent of the Carmalites in that City, where she afterwards took the Veil, has lately been elected Superior of that Community, notwithstanding all her Interest was used to have that Dignity conferred on some other Person.

Maestricht, July 30. Baron-Heekeren, and M. vander Does, their High Mightinesses Deputies, arrived here on Thursday Night last. They were received at their Entrance into this City by a triple Discharge of the Artillery upon the Ramparts, the whole Garrison being under Arms, and were soon after complimented by the Magistrates in a Body. On Friday and Yesterday they were employed in viewing our Fortifications, and To-day are visiting the Magazines.

Antwerp, July 31. Yesterday publick Prayers were put up in all the Churches of this City for the happy

happy Delivery of her Imperial Majesty, who is near her Time; and the same are ordered to be continued daily till she is brought to Bed. The Work of cutting the Canal from Ghent to Bruges, which has been greatly interrupted by the almost continual Rains we have had here for these two Months past, goes now vigorously on again; as does likewise that of Louvain, where no less than 800 Workmen are employed.

Hague, Aug. 3. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has lately disposed of several vacant Military Employments. The Barons de Boetzelaer and Burmania, Deputies to the Council of State on the Part of this Province, propose to set out on Thursday next for the Meuse, in order to the farming out the several Taxes and Duties imposed on that District.
