ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commiss; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

couraging, or promoting, the raifing, effablishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of fuch Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any fuch Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof. And the Attorney General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of fuch Offence; which Discovery fuch Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in fuch Bill, the faid Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and infifting only on the Single Value thereof; And in fuch Cafe, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by fuch Offender. And that every Subject of His Majefty accepting of any Truft, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majefty's Subjects fhall have, or be intitled to, in any fuch Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting fuch Truft, or coming to the Knowledge of fuch Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforefaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest for accepted in Trust, or so known and not difcovered, as aforefaid; and any Perfor making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture. And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than fuch as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Mifdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the fame, at the Difcretion of fuch of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Profecution for fuch Offence shall be commenced. And every Perfon fo offending may be feized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there; by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where fuch Profecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

B Y the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be crected; it is Enacted as follows, viz.

'stb Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an AEt passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies.-And to the End fuch Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to fend them to England, there to answer for the faid Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, follicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or País, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to fail, or go, or trade, in, or to the Balt Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every fuch Offence, 500 %.

3 7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed

In the 7th Year of His late Majefty King George the First, every Subject of his Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Eine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies, or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with Double the Value thereof.

-9th Geo. I. Cop. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, en-

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted.

ed, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licenfed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Lofs, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were fent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the fame, and Double the Value thereof.

Naples, July 11. On Tuesday last three of the King's Gallies returned into this Port from a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates, in which they have been very unfuccessful, not having been able to come up with any of them. The young Prince, of whom the Queen was lately brought to Bed, has been very much indifpofed for fome Days paft, as has also their Majesties eldest Daughter, but we hope their Illnesses will be attended with no fatal Confequences, The King intends fetting out towards the End of this Month for the Island of Procida, in order to take the Diversion of Hunting for fome Days; and 'tis faid her Majefty proposes accompanying him thither, if the Health of her Children will permit. On Saturday last a large Gang of Thieves, who have committed divers Robberies in this Neighbourhood, were apprehended at Angra, a Village fome little Distance from hence, and conveyed the fame Day under a ftrong Guard to the Prifons of this City. Rome, July 15. In Conformity to the Orders of the Pope, publick Prayers are still continued to be put up in all the Churches of this City for the Prefervation of the Catholick Church from the Dangers with which it is threatned by the Disputes being carried fo high between the Clergy and Parliaments of France, and particularly that of Paris. On the 9th Inftant Cardinal Ruffo, Dean of the Sacred College, who has been very much indisposed of late, set out from hence for Anzio, in order to embark on board one of our Gallies for Bagnara in Calabria, the Place of his Nativity, whither his Physicians have prevailed on him to retire for some Time, in order, if possible, to re-establish his Health. The young Prince of Tour-Taxis, who went fome Time fince to Naples, to view the Curiofities of that City, is returned hither, and was elegantly entertained at Dinner on Thursday last by Cardinal Spinelli. Vienna, July 22. Yesterday Morning the Emperor figned feveral Dispatches, and afterwards gave fome private Audiences. Befides the late Promotion made by the Empress Queen of Majors General, there has also been a confiderable one of Colonels and Lieutenant Colonels, amongst whom Mess. Q-Donel, Petit, Rebach, Beccaria, Campitelli, Hohenfeld, Bilow, Miggazzi, Cramer, Valenciani, Coursia, Bindershoffen, Wurtzbourg, Stahrenbourg, Wangenheim, Aichem, Guasco, Kalmocky, and St. Ywany, were all promoted to the Rank of Colonels; as were Meff. Rhedi, Weifs, Caraccioli, Pompeati, Seckendorff, Althemps and Cicogna, to that of Lieutenant Colonels. Her Imperial Majesty has appointed Mess. Ebner, Rottschutz, and Soto, to be Commandants of actions, and To-day are visiting the Magazines. the Fortreffes of Kuffstein, Zolnock, and Temeswar. Count Keyserling, the new Russian were put up in all the Churches of this City for the

Ambassador, had his first private Audience of their Imperial Majesties the Beginning of this Week, and delivered his Credential Letters.

Prague, July 24. The Officers belonging to the Regiment of Foot of Archduke Charles, as : alfo those of the Regiments of Sinceri and Wolfembuttel, which Regiments have for fome Time paft composed this Garrison, have received Orders to march from hence by the End of next Week for the Camp that is forming in the Neighbourhood of Colin.

Dresden, July 25. The Tour which Prince Xavier and Prince Charles-Christian proposed taking to feveral of the principal Courts of Europe, . will not take Place this Year; and we are now . affured, that those two Princes will accompany the King in his Journey to Poland. The two Princes of Borghese, who have been for some Months paft at Berlin, are arrived here, and have had the Honour of being prefented to their Majesties and the Royal Family, who received them with great Marks of Diffinction.

Augsbourg, July 25. The Prince of Tour-Taxis, the Emperor's Principal Commission to the Diet of the Empire, passed by this Place a few Days ago, with the Princess his Spoule, and a numerous Retinue, on his Way to his Seat in Swabia. Frankfort, July 28. The Elector of Mayence, who has been very much indifposed for fome Time paft, is now greatly recovered, and appears every Day in Publick. They write from Upper Bavaria, that on the 19th Instant a large Quantity of Hail, of a prodigeous Size, fell at Braunau, and for feveral Miles round, which greatly damaged the Fruits of the Earth, and particularly the Corn. Liege, July 29. According to Advices received here from Spa, the Cardinal Prince our Bifhop has found fo much Benefit from the Waters of that Place, that he already takes the Diversion of Hunting in that Neighbourhood, The Post of Resident from this State to the Court of Bruffels, vacant by the Death of M. Rameau, is conferred on Count Grosberg. Duffeldorp, July 30. There are feveral Perfonstaken up here, and committed to Prison, being accufed of putting off a confiderable Quantity of counterfeit Spanish double and single Pistoles. We learn by private Letters from Drefden, that the Difficulties which have hitherto hindered the King of Poland from acceeding to the Treaty concluded at Petersbourg in the Year 1746, were at Length entirely removed. They write from Neubourg, that the Princess of Hesse Rheinfelds, who fome Years after the Death ' of the Landgrave her Spouse, retired into the Convent of the Carmalites in that City, where fhe afterwards took the Veil, has lately been elected Superior of that Community, notwithftanding all her Interest was used to have that the Dignity conferred on fome other Perfon.
