ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

BY the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is Enacted as follows, *viz.*

5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies.— And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500 *l.*

7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of his Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies, or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with Double the Value thereof.

9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Ca-

pital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

Naples,

Naples, July 18. Yesterday Prince Esterhafi, Ambassador from their Imperial Majesties to this Court, made his publick Entry into this City with the greatest Magnificence. By our last Letters from the Coast of Africa we learn, that the Plague continues very rife at Algiers. We are informed by Letters from Constantinople, that on the 18th of last Month a dreadful Fire broke out in that City, which burnt near 40 Hours, and reduced upwards of 3000 Houses to Ashes; and that in the Night between the 28th and 29th, another Fire broke out there, which however proved not so fatal as the former, having only destroyed about 500 Houses.

Turin, July 20. On Sunday Morning last the Dutchess of Savoy was happily delivered of a Daughter, who has since been christen'd by the Name of Charlotta-Elizabeth-Maria, the Queen Dowager of Spain standing Godmother; and her Serene Highness, and the young Princess, are both as well as can be expected.

Warsaw, July 24. Major General Jauch, who arrived here some Days since from Dresden, having reviewed the Saxon Regiments quartered in this City and its Neighbourhood, is set out for Grodno, in order to make Preparations for the Opening of the Diet. They write from Posen, that on the 21st Instant they had a violent Storm of Thunder and Lightning, which falling on the Church of St. Christine, set it on Fire, but, by the timely Assistance of the Inhabitants, the same was soon extinguished, without doing any considerable Damage. We are informed by our latest Advices from the Frontiers of the Ukraine, that the Heyducks have not given them the least Uneasiness for some Time past, which 'tis imagined is chiefly owing to the prudent Measures that have been taken in posting the Troops that are quartered there to be a Check upon them.

Stockholm, July 25. According to our last Letters from Finland, the King expresses great Satisfaction with the Condition in which he has found all Things in that Province; from whence he does not propose to set out on his Return to this City till the End of next Month. Most of our principal Merchants are gone to Gothenbourg, in order to attend the Sale of the Merchandize brought Home on Board the East India Company's Ships the Gothick Lyon and Prince Charles.

Vienna, July 26. The Troops, which were encamped at Salenau near Neustadt, are all returning to their respective Quarters; and Count Daun, who commanded them, is already returned to this City. Count Bestucheff, the Russian Minister, is taking his Leave of the Ministry, and of the Foreign Ministers, in order to his Return to Petersbourg. Her Imperial Majesty has lately conferred on Major General Schrottendorff, the Post of Commandant of the Town of Leutschau in Hungary.

Copenhagen, July 29. This Morning the King arrived here with a numerous Retinue from Friedensbourg, and immediately repaired to the New-Holm, in order to be present at the Launching of a new Ship, which was named the Julia-Maria; after which his Majesty went to view the rich Merchandize lately brought Home by our Asiatick Company, and then returned to Friedensbourg. No Time is as yet fixed for the Queen's publick Entry into this City, for which the greatest Preparations are still making.

Dresden, July 30. The King has appointed the Baron de Gerisdorff to be one of his Privy Council. Last Tuesday Evening a Fire broke out in the Magazine of Corn at Frederickstadt, by which Accident upwards of two Thirds of that vast Building was reduced to Ashes. Yesterday Morning his Majesty and all the Royal Family went to see the Regiment of Foot of Lubomirsky, which makes Part of this Garrison, go through their Exercise, and seemed mightily pleased with their Appearance and Behaviour.

Frankfort, July 31. We have received Advice from Swabia, that the Princess of Hohenzollern Sigmaringen was safely delivered of a Prince, who is christened by the Name of Francis Joseph. By Letters received this Post from Bohemia we learn, that the Troops appointed to form the Camp at Colin were successively arriving, and that the Camp would be completely formed by the 6th of next Month.

Hambourg, July 31. The Courier, who arrived here some Days ago from Madrid, is already returned thither, with Dispatches for the Syndick Klefeker, acquainting him, that this Government accepts, without the least Reserve, the Conditions prescribed by his Catholick Majesty for the Re-establishment of our Commerce with that Kingdom; in Consequence of which, Orders are already dispatched to M. Forth, our Consul at Algiers, to return Home after acquainting the Dey and Regency with the Impossibility of our fulfilling the Conditions of the Treaty lately concluded between the Magistrates of this City and that Republick.

Berlin, Aug. 2. The King has given Orders for the furnishing of all such French Protestants, as shall come and settle in any Part of his Dominions, with all such Necessaries as they shall be in immediate Want of. His Majesty has appointed M. de Rese to be President of his Chamber of Domains, M. Jurgas, Colonel Commandant of the Regiment of Dragoons of the Margrave of Bareith; and M. Bandemer, Colonel Commandant of the Regiment of Foot of Kleist, have both obtained his Majesty's Leave to resign their Employments, and have considerable Pensions allowed them.

Paris, Aug. 9. The Small Pox has appeared, after a few Days Indisposition, upon the Dauphin of France; but as it is of a favourable Sort, and the fifth Day is already passed, the Physicians have great Hopes of his being out of Danger.

Hague, Aug. 11. We learn from Dieren, that her Royal Highness the Princess Governante continued there in perfect Health with her Children, and 'twas thought would not return hither till the Beginning of next Month. Her Royal Highness has lately made a Promotion of Military Officers, who have since taken the usual Oaths, before the Council of State, in order to qualify themselves for their different Posts; by which Promotion Major General Bauricius has got the Regiment of Horse of Orange-Frise. Lieutenant Colonel Dundas is appointed Major of the Scotch Regiment of Major General Stewart; as is M. Dolleman to be Aid-Major to the Regiment of Aylva. By Letters received this Day from Paris we learn, that the Dauphin, who was seized with the Small Pox on the 2d Instant at Versailles, is thought to be quite out of Danger.
