ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

BY the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is Enacted as follows, *viz.*

5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies.— And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East-India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500 *l.*

7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of his Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies, or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with Double the Value thereof.

9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to

Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

Lisbon, July 13. Their Majesties have been at Belem for this Fortnight past, taking the Diversions of Hunting and Fishing. The Corsairs of Barbary have greatly infested our Coast of late, and have taken several Fishing Barks, with about twenty Men, whom they have carried into Slavery. The Fleet destined for Mozambique, which put to Sea the Beginning of last Week, under the Command of Commodore Vasquez, consists of nine large Ships, three of which are Men of War from 50 to 60 Guns. An Edict is in the Press, and will be published To-day or To-morrow, for obliging all Ships, coming from the Coast of Africa, to perform a strict Quarantain.

Algiers, July 20. The Plague, which a few Days ago was thought to be somewhat abated, has again increased since the 15th, for, by the best Accounts, it has carried off from 30 to 80 Persons a Day for these four or five Days past.

Naples, July 20. A few Days ago died M. Galliani, the Chief Chaplain of the Court, greatly regretted for his Probity and Learning, and to whom a Cardinal's Hat was designed in the first Promotion. The Court has deferred its Return to this City from Portici, on Account of the youngest Prince and the eldest Princess being still indisposed. On Thursday last the Queen's Birth-day was celebrated at Court with the usual Solemnity, on which Occasion the Foreign Ministers, the Gentry, and Military Officers, appeared in their rich Habits; and in the Evening there was a Discharge of the Cannon of the Castles.

Rome, July 22. The Pope has received a Copy of the Will and testamentary Disposition of the late Cardinal Alberoni, by which he has left the greatest Part of his vast Wealth for the Maintenance of the College of St. Lazzero at Placentia, erected by himself, empowering the Bishop of Placentia, for the Time being, to distribute the yearly Overplus amongst the Poor of that City.

Florence, July 28. In Consequence of the Emperor's Determination to dismiss the Farmers of the Revenues of Tuscany, which he

designs to have managed for his own Account, the Chevalier Pecci, a Member of the Council of the Finances, is actually examining the Accounts of those Farmers for nine Years past; and 'tis said the Sieur Gavi, who has been acquitted by the Emperor of all the Charges alledged against him on Account of the Management of those Farms, is to be replaced in his former Post. We are informed by the Master of a Vessel, who arrived a few Days ago at Leghorn from Tunis, that the Bey, who besieged the Castle into which his Son had retired, had caused three Mines to be played off all at once, and so successfully, that they had almost ruined the Castle, which had obliged the Son, some said to surrender, but others, that he had found Means to escape.

Modena, July 26. The Duke our Sovereign has given Orders for casting thirty new Pieces of Cannon, each to carry Balls of 24 Pounds, as also some new Mortars. We learn from Veraggio, that the Commissaries appointed by the Empress Queen, and the Helvetick Body, to determine some late Differences between them, have finally adjusted every Thing to the mutual Satisfaction of both Parties, and are about to leave Veraggio, in order to return to their respective Courts.

Prague, July 29. The Troops destined to form the Camp at Colin are all in Motion, and consist of the Regiments of Foot of Francis de Lorraine, Archduke Charles, the two Regiments of Wolfembuttel, being the Father and the Son's, those of Neuperg, Hildbourghausen, Leopald Daun, Esterhafi, Botta, Gaisrugg, Coloredo, Andreafi, Haller, and Sinceri; the Regiments of Dragoons of Wirtemberg and Philibert; and the Cuirassiers of Pretlack. They are all to be commanded by General Count Brown, whose Orders are to have the Camp completely formed by the 10th of next Month.

Cologn, Aug. 7. Last Wednesday two large Barks, loaded with Bombs, Cannon Balls, and Granades, passed by this City on the Rhine for Holland, in order to supply the Arsenal of Dort.

Dusseldorp, Aug. 7. We learn from Bonn, that the Elector of Cologn proposed to set out on Thursday next for Neuhaus, in the Bishoprick of Pabarborn, where he intends to stay about three Weeks. By Letters received this Post from Coblentz we are informed, that a great Number of Foreign Merchants were arrived there with their Effects, and more were daily coming in against the approaching Fair, which begins on the 21st Instant.

Paris, Aug. 11. The Dauphin is as well as can be expected. To-morrow, or next Day, will be the Critical Day, when the Distemper is expected to take its Turn; after which all Apprehensions will be over, and we shall be entertained with continual Rejoycings for some Days.

Hague, Aug. 12. This Afternoon Messrs. Boetzelaer and Burmania set out from hence for the Meuse, in order to farm out the Taxes and Duties, and to view the Fortifications and Magazines, of that District. On Wednesday Night last General Grovesteins, Master of the Horse

to his Serene Highness the young Prince Stadtholder, arrived here from Leuwaerden, and set out the next Morning, in order to join the Court at Dieren.
