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Rome, September 1.

Ut Letters from Naples tell us, that the Inhabitants of Meffina continue not only by all wayes poffible to provide for their defence, but that they carry their Armes without their City and have taken one or

two Caffles which were in their Neighbourhood: In the mean time the Viceroy of Naples omits no endeavers on his part, for the affilting the Viceroy of Sicily. The Galleys of Genona, having taken in 400 Italians are failed from Nifita for Sicily to befiege Meffina by Sea, in which they will be affilted by the Sicilian and Neapolitan Galleys.

Sicilian and Neapolitan Galleys. War(am, August 28. The 22 inflant his Majesty parted from hence being attended with all the No-bility and other persons of Quality that were here, about a league out of the Town; In eight or ten days his Majefty hopes to reach the Frontiers having appointed the general Rendezvous of his For-ces to be the 15 of the next Month, and intends to continue the Campagne till Christmas; On Sunday Iast the Envoy from the Cham of Tariary had Audience of the King, his errand was to offer the mediation of the Cham in order to a Peace with the Port, which he faid the Grand Signior would be ready to grant his Majesty in cafe he fent Ambassadors to him to defire it. All the News at present here is that the Grand Vizier has entered the Ukraine, and that he is marching against the Moscovites, who having likewife a good Army in those parts, it is not unlikely fome Action may fuddainly pass between them; His Majesty, it is faid, is refolved to affiilt the Mo covites with all the Force he can, though they have been fomewhat wanting on their fides, and having had a very powerfull Army together this Summer, have not at all employed it against the common Enemy according to their promife, but against the Coffacks to enlarge their Territories on that fide.

Vient Septemb. 5. From Hungary they write that the Turks commit frequent and great diforders on the Frontiers, a party of the Garrison of Newhausel having lately furprised a Company of Imperial Dragoons, and put them all to the Sword, not one of them escaping. All the endeavors that have been hitherto used, have not been able to oblige the Elector of Bavaria to depart from his Neutrality with the most Christian King. Nothing farther is as yet done in the affair of Monsieur Burman or the Chanon of Mci7.

Francfort, Septemb, 12. We have had feveral reports here of the retreat of Monfieur de Turenne, shough without any ground, Yefterday was broughe news hither that the Confederates having left their Baggage at Spire were marched directly towards Monfieur de Turenne, who upon advice thereof decamped and retreated into Alfitia, covering himfelf in the Foreft of Bunnervali, where they add, that the Confederates have befett him, but this news deferves littly credit, feeing our Letters dated Yefterday at Spire, and which arrived here this evening, affure us that the

Confederates continued in their Quartets near that City, and that it was not known when they would remove from thence, and that Monfieur de Turenne was encamped within 6 German miles from them without any intention as yet to für from thence. We have advices which tell us that a confiderable party, commanded out from the Confederate Army marches through the Territories of the Duke of Denx Points towards Lorraine, and that 1000 Horfe of the faid Party was already advanced as far as the Townecalled Saargemunt, having paffed the Saar at Wolfelinguez.

Spire, Septemb. 11. The Confederate Army cominues encamped within half a League of this City, their chief Quarter being at Dudenhoven, and as yet we know not, when or whither they will march; The Duke of Bournonville remains very ill at Wormes, but the Duke of Lorrain is arrived from thence in the Army, which begins to have fome want of provisions, and especially of Forrage, which they are forced to goe and fetch above 6 Leagues from their Camps the reason of which is that Monsheur de Turenne deftroyed all the Country round about in his march', that he might not leave his Encmy wherewithall to fublit; He is at prefent encamped about fix hours march from hence, and has fo firongly retrenchi-ed himfelf there, that it will be a hard matter for the Confederates to approach him. There arrive daily 50, 60, and many times 80 Wagens from Monfieur de Turenne's Army at Strasburg, which return laden with provisions and other necessaries. Yesterday Colonel Dunemalt killed the Count Stroggi in a Duel.

Hague, Septemb. 18. Our ill ficcels at Martenieg had like to have occafioned fome diforders at Amfterdam, to prevent which the Magilirates were forced to keep feveral Companies of Soldiers more then ordinary on the Guard. The Siege of Grave has advanced very little this ten dayes patt, occafioned partly by the Rains; fome people feem to concern Monfieur Rabenbaupt for not acting with more Vigor; and that fo much time has been then in this Siege. Our Letters from Bruffels tell us of the Siege of Oudenard, and add, that his Highnels is very much concerned that he was forced to give over his defigne of Belieging Aetha for that the French being advertified of it had put a great Succor into the place.

Ruremond, Sept. 17. Our Letters as well as Paffengers come from the Camp before Grave tell us that the Befiegers are lodged within 50 paces of the Counterfearpe; that Monfieur Rabenhaupt, having not above

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
