ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

Indies or purchased there, by any such Offentders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Cuftody of any other Perfon, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with double the Value thereof.

9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George

Y the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies unde. Foreign Commissions; and from being inter effed, or concerned, in any Foreign East-Indi Company, to be erected; it is enacted as follows, uiz.

gth Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies. ---And to the End such Offenders may be brought ta Juffice, the East-India Company are empowered to arreft, and feize, fuch Offenders in the East-Indies, and to fend them to England, there to answer for the faid Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, follicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or País, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to fail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every fuch Offence, 500%.

the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from fubscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raifing, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, "om, and after, the 24th Day of June, 1723, o be raifed, formed, or erected, for Trading the East-Indies, and from being interested in, in intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of fuch Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any fuch Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of fuch Offence ; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in fuch Bill, the faid Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and infifting only on the Single Value thereof 3 And in fuch Cafe, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by fuch Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majefty accepting of any Truft, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majefty's Subjects fhall have, or be intitled to, in any fuch Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting fuch Truff, or coming to the Knowledge of fuch Intereft, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforefaid, truly difcover the fame in Writing to the Eaft-India Company, or their Court of Directors, fhall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest fo accepted in Trust, or so known and not difcovered, as aforefaid; and any Perfon making fuch Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture,

"7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majefty King George the First, every Subject of His Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Reord at Westminster, is to pay, and fuffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall taink fit.

'And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that hall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-

And all His Majefty's Subjects, (other than fuch as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the Eaft-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Mildemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punifhment, Imprifonment, or Fine, for the fame, at the Difcretion of fuch of His Majefty's Courts of Record at Weftminfter, where the Profecution for fuch Offence fball be commenced.

And every Perfon fo offending may be feized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majefty's Juffices of the Peace, until fufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where fuch Profecution shall be commenced, to answer the fame, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act paffed in the 3d Year of His prefent Majefty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majefty's Subjects (other than the Eaft-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure ; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the sent, and Double the Value thereof.

dience of the Pope on Wednesday last, to which he was introduced with the accustomed Ceremonies. A violent Shock of an Earthquake was felt in the Night between the 19th and 20th Inftant, at Frescati, Marino, and several other Places in that Neighbourhood, which greatly alarmed the Inhabitants, but the fame happily went off without doing any confiderable Damage. M. Genoa, Sept. 24. We are informed by the Master of a Tartane just arrived in this Port from Marseilles, that the Squadron of French Men of War, which lately failed from Ajaccio, and afterwards touched at the Gulph of Spezzia, arrived at Toulon on the 15th Instant, where they were unrigging, in order to be laid up. Vienna, Sept. 30. Baron Bachoff, the Danish Minister, who has been on a Tour to Ratisbon, returned here the Beginning of this Week, and Yesterday he waited on their Imperial Majesties at Schonbrun, and met with a most gracious Rev ception. The Marquess Durazzo, heretofore Envoy Extraordinary from Genoa, having quitted the Service of that Republick, and entred into that of this Court, it is expected he will fhortly be named to fome important Employment. Count Caunitz is soon expected here on his Return from his Embaffy to the Court of France; and though no one is as yet appointed to fucceed him, it is generally believed it will be Count Stahremberg. Madrid, Oct. z. This Morning M. Wall, Ambaffador from this Court to his Britannick Majesty, set out on his Return to London: The King was pleafed fome Days ago to promote his Excellency to the Rank of Lieutenant General. On the 23d of last Month, his Majefty's Birth-day, the King disposed of three vacant Collars in the Order of the Golden Fleece, in Favour of the Duke of Solferino, Grand Mafter of the Queen's Houfhold; Prince Mafferano, Captain of the Italian Company of Horfe Guards; and the Prince de St. Nicandro, formerly Ambaflador from the King of Naples to this Court. Naples, Sep. 20. The King has appointed Don Marcel Cafani, to be Archbishop of Otranto. Yesterday being the Feast of St. Januarius, Patron of this Kingdom, the fame was celebrated as usual, great Numbers of Perfons, many of when were of the first Distinction, going all Day long to Church to pay their Devotions to the Relicks of that Saint. The Auditor of the Army, and two other Comiffaries, are gone, by his Majesty's Express Orders, to Pescara, to examine a Captain of a Company in the Regiment called Royal Palermo, now in Garrison at that Place, who is secured there on a violent Suspicion of having poisoned his Wife. Hambourg, OET. 6. By Letters received this Post from Petersbourg we are informed, that the Empress of Russia had learnt by an Express, that the City of Cafan, the Capital of the Kingdom of that Name, had been almost reduced to Ashes by a terrible Fire that broke out there on the 15th of last Month.

Berlin, Oct. 6. The King has lately made feveral Promotions in his Army. Baron Scheffer, late Envoy Extraordinary from Sweden to the Court of France, who has been here about a Fortnight, and had the greatest Respect shewn him, even by his Majefty and the reft of the Royal Family, fet out from hence on Friday last on his Return to Stockholm. The Count de Gronsfeld, Minister from the States General of the United Provinces to this Court, has of late had frequent Conferences with his Majesty's Ministry, in Relation to the Payment of a large Sum of Money lent fome Time fince by the Dutch on East Frizeland; and 'tis thought, by the Methods that are now taking, that Affair will foon be fettled entirely to the Satisfaction of all Parties. Bruffels, Oct. 9. Prince Charles of Lorrain, Governor General of the Low Countries, propoles to fet out from hence in a few Days for Mons, in order to view the Fortifications of that City, and fome other Places in its Neighbour**bood**. A confiderable Detachment from the Regiment of Prince Ligne, marched from hence few Days ago for Antwerp, where it is to remain for some Time in Garrison. MuHague, Oct. 12. The Duke of Brunswick Wolfembuttel, who has been for fome Weeks at his Government of Bois-le-Duc, is expected here fowards the End of the Week. The Count and Counters of Winchelfea, who are returned here from the Tour they lately made to Amfterdam and North Holland, intend to fet out on Sunday next for Helvoetfluys, in order to embark for England.
