

was performed in the publick Theatre at the King's Expence; and in the Evening there was a magnificent Supper again at Court, followed by a Ball. On the 13th the Court gave an elegant Dinner, as before; in the Afternoon a French Comedy, and at Night a Supper and a Ball. The Town House, and all the Houses about the Palace, as well as several others, were finely illuminated in the Evenings of each of the three Days. The University likewise bore a considerable Part in this Festivity, by Speeches, Verses, and conferring of Degrees; and the Citizens, besides the Parade of their Militia, and other publick Demonstrations, had private Entertainments in their respective Houses.

Dusseldorp, Oct. 16. The States of this Dutchy, and those of Juliers, have opened their Assembly this Morning. We learn from Cologne, that a Fire broke out on Thursday last at a Wine Merchant's in that City, which burnt with great Violence, and reduced that, and several other Houses, entirely to Ashes.

Brussels, Oct. 17. M. Bellanger, Counsellor of the Domains and Finances of her Imperial Majesty in the Low Countries, is named to be one of the Council of State. M. Dupuy, who went some Time ago to Namur, to take an exact Account of the Revenues of the Clergy in that Province, is daily expected to return here from thence. The Government has ordered the Duty that used to be paid for the bringing of French Gold and Silver Lace into this Country, to be considerably diminished.

Hague, Oct. 19. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has been pleased to appoint M. van Eck, Major of the Town of Arnheim, to be Commandant of that Place. Yesterday died M. Roelands, Principal of the Chamber of Finances, and he is already succeeded in that Employment by M. Basscourt. We are informed by Letters from Hanover, that his Britannick Majesty intends to set out from thence for England on the 8th of next Month.
