*ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.*

**B**Y the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is enacted as follows, *viz.*

*5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.]* By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies. — And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East-India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500*l.*

*7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.]* By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of His Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with double the Value thereof.

*9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.]* By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June, 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And



And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

Lisbon, Sept. 22. The Fleet from Fernambuco, which arrived lately at the Mouth of the Tagus, consists of seventeen Merchantmen, convoyed by a Man of War of fifty Guns. They made the Voyage in little more than two Months, and have on board 527,825 Cruzades, besides a large Cargo of rich Merchandize. An Express is arrived at Court with the agreeable News, that our small Squadron, which has been cruising for some Time past in the Streights of Gibraltar, had attacked, on the 8th Instant, four Algerine Corsairs, and had taken two of them, after a very smart Engagement, in which several Persons were killed and wounded on both Sides. The two Corsairs that are taken, have Forty-two Pieces of Brass Cannon on board, besides a great Number of Slaves.

Leghorn, Oct. 6. The Emperor's Men of War are now cruising off this Port, in order to protect our Trade and Navigation from being interrupted by the Barbary Corsairs, which have lately appeared upon these Coasts. Two Ships from Trieste have brought here a considerable Quantity of Linen; printed at Vienna, which sells extremely well. We learn by our last Letters from Naples, that the King of the Two Sicilies has granted Letters Patents for establishing a Company of Manufacturers at Messina, for the Weaving of Silks and Camblets. The same Letters add, that this Company is to pay no Duty for any Merchandize they shall have Occasion to make Use of in the said Manufactures for ten Years; and the King, to encourage them all in his Power, has promised they shall never want for Silk, though there should be ever so great a Demand for it in Foreign Countries.

Petersbourg, Oct. 6. Most of the Foreign Ministers have declared their Intention to follow the Court to Moscow in December next. Baron Leutrum, heretofore Lieutenant Colonel of Foot in the Dutch Service, has entred into the Service of this Court in the same Quality.

Naples, Oct. 6. The Fair at Salerno proves very successful this Year to most Persons that

attend it with Merchandize, the fine Weather having not only invited thither many of the Nobility and Gentry of this City, but also those from all the Towns thereabouts. The Court having received Advice, that a Barbary Galliot was cruising off Portolongone, Orders were immediately given for two armed Vessels to be fitted out in order to give her Chace. The Prince de Cimitile, whom the King has named his Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Great Britain, waits only for his last Instructions, in order to set out for London.

Rome, Oct. 7. We are informed by Letters from Velletri, that in the Night between the 26th and 27th of last Month, they had a most terrible Shock of an Earthquake, which threw down several Houses, and put the Inhabitants into the utmost Consternation.

Madena, Oct. 12. The Duke our Sovereign intends shortly to make an Addition of several new Professorships in the Civil Law, Philosophy, and the Mathematicks, to those already established in the University of Reggio, in order to put that University in a more flourishing Condition.

Madrid, Oct. 16. Their Catholick Majesties set out on Wednesday last for the Escorial, where they intend to reside about six Weeks; most of the Foreign Ministers are gone to attend upon them. Two Days before the Court left this Place, the French Ambassador, M. de Vaulgrenant, had his Audience of Leave, when the King was pleased to make him a Present of his Picture, richly set with Diamonds; his Excellency intends setting out for Paris in a few Days, and the Duke de Duras, his Successor, is expected here towards the latter End of this Month.

Stockholm, Oct. 16. Last Monday Morning the King came here from Drotningholm, and assisted at the Deliberations of the Senate, and in the Afternoon his Majesty returned to Drotningholm. Baron Lieven, who went to carry the Order of the Seraphins to the Kings of Denmark and Prussia, is daily expected here from Copenhagen, where he stopt some Days on his Return from Berlin.

Copenhagen, Oct. 17. The King has promoted Vice Admiral Hoope to the Rank of Admiral, and Rear Admiral Tunder to that of Vice Admiral. His Majesty has also named M. de Qualen to be one of his Privy Council; and Mess. Gersdorff and Rosencrantz are appointed Chamberlains of his Majesty's Household.

Hague, Oct. 26. Colonel Yorke, Minister Plenipotentiary from his Britannick Majesty to this Court, has obtained the usual Passports of their High Mightinesses the States General, for the free Passage of the King his Master's Domesticks and Baggage through the Territories of this Republick, on their Return from Hanover to England. The Duke of Brunswick Wolfembutte arrived here last Night from his Government of Bois-le-Duc. We learn by Letters from Paris, that the young Princess, Daughter to the Dauphin, who is ill of the Small-Pox, has a very favourable Sort, and is in a fair Way of Recovery.

Dublin Castle, October 23.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Coronation, the Great Guns were fired in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks; and this Day their Excellencies the Lords Justices received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction upon the Occasion. In the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy: And at Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies. And,

This Day being the Anniversary of the Irish Rebellion in 1641, their Excellencies the Lords Justices went in the usual State to Christ Church, where they heard a most excellent Sermon, preached by the Reverend John Palliser, D. D. Vice Provost of Trinity College, on the Day. After their Excellencies came from Church, the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix fired three Rounds, which were answered by Volleys of Small Arms from the Regiments in Garrison, drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks.
