ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

BY the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is enacted as follows, viz.

5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies. — And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East-India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500*l*.

7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of His Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with double the Value thereof.

9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company,

from, and after, the 24th Day of June, 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-



East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

Modena, Oct. 7. To-morrow the Court removes to Massa, from whence the Duke our Sovereign will go to Carara, in order to be at Hand to give Directions in relation to the Works that are carrying on at the Port of Lavenza.

Naples, Oct. 12. On the 27th past, two of the King's Half Gallies arrived here from Cotrone, and brought with them eleven Smuggling Vessels which they seized on that Coast, loaded with Contraband Goods. And last Tuesday two of the King's Gallies, that have been for some Time on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates in the Seas of Sicily, returned into Port, and are ordered to be unrigged.

Leghorn, Oct. 14. The strict Quarantain, which all Ships coming from the Seas of Ponent, are still obliged to perform here, on Account of the Plague's continuing to rage at Algiers, has greatly diminished the Trade of this Port. We learn from Corsica, that the Marquis de Cursay, Commander of the French Troops, has received a new Plan for accommodating the Disputes between the Inhabitants of that Island, and the Genoese; which Plan was communicated to the Heads of each Community on the 6th Instant.

Turin, Oct. 15. The King is still at the Venerie, where his Majesty generally diverts himself with Hunting two or three Times a Week. We are informed, that two new Regiments of Foot are going to be raised by his Majesty's express Orders, one of which is to be called the Regiment of Tortona, and the other that of Navarra.

Rome, Oct. 16. The Chevalier Ricci, the new Commander of the Pope's Gallies, arrived here a few Days ago from Civita Vecchia, and has been graciously received by the Pope. There has lately been discovered in a Vault at Calligano, several Urns filled with ancient Coin. On the 4th Instant, being the Emperor's Name-Day, Cardinal Alexander Albani was complimented on that Occasion by the College of Cardinals, and by the Princes and Noblemen, Subjects and Feudatories of his Imperial Majesty. On the 5th and 6th the Cardinals Paolucci, Sacripante, Caraffa, and the Prelates Furietti and Petroni, set out for their respective Country-Seats; and as most of the Cardinals and principal Nobility are now out of Town, all publick Transactions are suspended here as usual at this Season. On the 8th the Princess Altieri was safely delivered of a Prince, to the great Joy of that ancient and noble Family.

Warsaw, Oct. 16. We are informed by our last Letters from the Ukraine, that a large Body of Heyducks appeared there the Beginning of this Month, who plundered and burnt several Villages. The General Diet of the States of this Kingdom continue their Deliberations at Grodno with great Unanimity, and to all Appearance will take no Resolutions but what are agreeable to his Polish Majesty, and for the Good of the Kingdom.

Prague, Oct. 23. The States of Bohemia opened their Assembly on the 17th Instant, with the usual Formalities; at which Count Schaffgotsch, Count Kollowrath, and M. Dobolsky, assist in Quality of Commissaries from the Empress Queen of Hungary.

Hague, Nov. 7. Last Thursday being her Royal Highness the Princess Governante's Birth-Day, the same was observed as usual; on which Occasion her Royal Highness received the Compliments of the Lords of the Regency, the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and other Persons of Quality and Distinction. His Grace the Duke of Newcastle arrived here last Friday Evening, and immediately repaired to the House in the Wood, where he had a long Conference with her Royal Highness the Princess Governante; and the next Day, after conferring with several Lords of the Regency, his Grace set out for Calais, in order to embark with his Dutchess for England. The Men of War appointed to convoy his Britannick Majesty to England, arrived safe at Helvoetsluys with the Yachts last Friday Night; since which Admiral Anson and Lord Delawar are arrived here, and have waited on the Princess Governante. Their High Mightinesses have, at the Request of Colonel Yorke, ordered the Relays of Horse, appointed to escort his Britannick Majesty through these Territories, to march immediately to their respective Posts; and as his Majesty is expected at Helvoetsluys on Saturday next, several Lords of the Regency, and other Persons of Distinction, are preparing to set out for that Place, in order to wait his Arrival.

St. James's, November 10.

This being the Anniversary of the King's Birth-Day, the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired at Noon; and at Night there were Bonfires, Ringing of Bells, and other Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

London, November 9.

Yesterday Crisp Gascoyne, Esq; Lord Mayor Elect for the Year ensuing, was sworn at Guildhall; when the Chair and other Ensigns of Mayoralty were surrendered to him in the accustomed Manner.

This Day the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending, and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges adorned with Streamers and Pendants to Westminster; and having walked round the Hall, and solemnly saluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed, and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black Fryers, and from thence in Coaches with the usual Solemnity to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided; at which were present the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, the Judges, and other Persons of Quality and Distinction.
