THIS Morning John Johnson, one of His Majesty's Messengers, arrived here, with an Account, that the King set out from Hanover early on Wednesday Morning last, and reach'd Osnabrug that Night; that His Majesty lay on Thursday Night at Hoolten; and arrived at Utrecht on Friday about Four in the Afternoon; where His Majesty went on Board His Barge about Six, which brought Him to Maeslandsuys about Ten on Saturday Morning; and His Majesty arrived at Helvoetsluys about One o'Clock the same Day in perfect Health.

ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

BY the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is enacted as follows, viz.

5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies. — And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East-India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500l.

7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of His Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with double the Value thereof.

9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June, 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

Lisbon, Oct. 6. The Court has been inform'd by Dispatches brought by the late Fleet from Fernambuco, that three new Mines have been discovered in the Brazils, two of Gold, and one of Silver, in which last there are also some curious Diamonds; and that they were preparing to work the same, from whence they expected considerable Advantages.

Petersbourg, Oct. 16. The Departure of her Imperial Majesty for Moscow is fixed for the Beginning of December, but 'tis not certain whether the Great Duke and Great Dutches are to accompany her in that Journey. Count Rasumofsky, Captain General of the Cossacks, has informed the Court, that one of his Detachments has totally defeated a large Party of the Heyducks on the Frontiers of the Ukraine. The last Letters received here from Constantinople, confirm the News we had some Time ago of the Grand Vizier's having notified to the Foreign Ministers the Grand Seignior's unalterable Resolution of living in perfect Friendship with the Christian Powers.

Parma, Oct. 20. The Duke our Sovereign is expected here towards the End of this Month, in order to fix his Residence in this City for the Winter. The write from Modena, that the Abbe de Bernis had passed through that City for Venice, whither he was going to reside in Quality of Ambassador from the Court of France.

Stockholm, Oct. 24. A few Days ago the King was seized with a slight Fever, but it was attended with no bad Consequences. His Majesty is now perfectly recovered, and proposes to assist at an Assembly of the Senate, which is appointed for the 27th Instant, in order to consider of some Propositions relating to the Affairs of Finland. On Saturday last Baron Rosen, who has for a long Time commanded our Troops in Finland, arrived here from that Province.

Vienna, Oct. 28. Their Imperial Majesties, and the Princess Charlotte of Lorraine, are returned to Schonbrun from the Seat of Prince Lichtenstein, and on Wednesday Morning her Imperial Majesty came to the Palace in this City, in order to see the young Archdutchesses her Children, and to give some Audiences, after which she returned to Schonbrun. The States of Lower

Austria are summoned to meet here on the 13th of next Month. The Directors of the Bank of this City have given publick Notice, that they will pay off such Part of their Stock as carries an Interest of Six per Cent. unless the Proprietors thereof consent to subscribe the same in at Five per Cent. on or before the Expiration of three Months. A great Number of Recruits passed by here a few Days ago; they were raised in the Hereditary Countries, and were marching into Hungary, in order to compleat the Regiments quartered in that Country.

Munich, Oct. 28. On Sunday last, being the Anniversary of the Birth of the Empress Dowager, who then entered into the 52d Year of her Age, the same was celebrated at Court with great Magnificence. The Elector our Sovereign has disposed of the Post of Commandant of Stadt-amhoff, in Favour of Count Minuzzi. The Prince of Czartorisky, Son of the Palatine of Russia, arrived here the Beginning of this Week, and has been received at Court with great Marks of Distinction.

Berlin, Oct. 31. The Queen Mother, who a few Days ago was so much indisposed as to be obliged to keep her Chamber, is now perfectly recovered. Count Haacke, Commandant of this City, is distributing, by the King's Order, a considerable Sum of Money amongst the Widows and Children of such Soldiers as were killed, whilst in his Majesty's Service, during the late War. On Saturday last the Prince of Wirtemberg set out for Treptow in Pomerania, to review his Regiment of Dragoons, in Garrison at that Place. We have received Advice from Aschersleben, in the Principality of Halberstadt, that Baron Stille died there on the 21st Instant, after a tedious Illness.

Paris, Nov. 2. The Departure of the Court from Fontainebleau, on its Return to Versailles, is fixed for Wednesday next. 'Tis said a Treaty of Marriage is on Foot between the Prince of Conde, and a Princess of the House of Soubise, and that the same will certainly take Place in the Month of January next.

Hague, Nov. 8. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland opened their Assembly this Morning, in order to deliberate on several important Points that are to be laid before them. On Thursday last M. Dennicke, Minister from the Duke of Brunswick, did, by a Letter from the Duke his Master, notify in Form to their High Mightinesses, the Birth of a Prince, of whom the Dutches of Brunswick was lately delivered. The same Day M. Calkoen, Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, to this Court, set out from hence on his Return to Dresden. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has appointed M. du Roc, to be Commandant of the Town of Flushing, in the Room of M. Pasturel, deceased. On Sunday last a solemn Deputation from the principal Towns of the Province of Overijssel, arrived here, in order to execute a private Commission to her Royal Highness the Princess Governante; and this Evening they are to be admitted to their Audience of her Royal Highness. The Deputies are, Mess. Jordens, Dapper, and Borgerink, for the Town of Drenther; Mess. van Marle, Bruinier, and Muntz, for that of Campen; and Mess. Berg, Schrive-rius, and Tobiaz, for that of Zwooll.
