Tripoly, October 13.

WE have enjoyed the utmost Tranquility since the Attempt of the Albanians to become Masters of this Town in August last: And we have since received Advice, that about Two Hundred of those Albanians, who escaped from hence in an English Vessel after that Attempt, had, with great Difficulty, gained the Coast of the Morea, where they disposed of the said Vessel; and that about thirty of them, going afterwards from thence in a Bark to the Island of Candia, were secured, soon after their Arrival, and put in Irons. We are assured, that Ali Effendi, who went some Time ago to execute a Commission from the Recency of this Place to the Court of France, and who arrived here from thence a few Days ago in a Ship of 25 Guns, will set out shortly for Constantinople, in order to lay some important Affairs before the Porte. We have at present no Ships at Sea but our Admiral, who sailed Yesterday on a Cruize against the Ships of the Christian Powers.

Lisbon, Oct. 23. The Court is still at Bellem, from whence their Majesties are expected here towards the Beginning of next Month. The Duke de Soto-Mayor, the Spanish Ambassador, strongly solicits this Court to renew its Orders to the Governor of the Brazils, to cause the Island of St. Sacrament, which was ceded to the Crown of Spain by a late Treaty between the two Courts, to be effectually evacuated, as the Portuguese, who are at present settled there, seem not at all inclined to give it up.

Naples, Oct. 31. On Wednesday last, being the Anniversary of the Birth of the Queen Dowager, of Spain, the King's Mother, there was a very splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility and Gentry, to compliment their Majesties on that Occasion. Last Wednesday a great Number of Convicts, confined in the different Prisons of this City, received their Sentence, two of whom are ordered to suffer Death, and the rest to be sent to work in the Gallies for Life. Prince Esterhasi, Ambassador from their Imperial Majesties to this Court, sets out from hence on Thursday next for Vienna; from whence the Marquess Doria, who comes to succeed him, is shortly expected.

Rome, Nov. 4. On Wednesday last, being the Feast of All Saints, the Pope heard a solemn Mass sung to Musick on that Occasion by Cardinal Tamburini, assisted by several Members of the Sacred College. Notwithstanding there is now 15 Vacancies in the Sacred College, by the Death of Cardinal Riviera, the Pope does not as yet seem inclined to make any new Promotion. Yesterday 70 Convicts were sent from hence to Civitta Vecchia, to work as Slaves in the Gallies.

Genoa, Nov. 7. The King of Sardinia having lately purchased a fine new Galley built in this Port, has sent one of his own Gallies, accompanied by a Bark, and two Tartanes, in order to fit her for Sea, and to conduct her to Villafranca. M. Cortada, heretofore Auditor de Rota for the Kingdom of Spain, who arrived here the 21st of last Month from Rome, set out from hence Yesterday, in order to take Possession of the Bishoprick of Zamora, to which he was lately promoted by his Catholick Majesty. The Master of a Ship, who arrived here a few Days ago from Minorca, says, that he saw several Neapolitan Chebecks cruizing off Messina, against the Corsairs of Barbary.

Leghorn, Nov. 8. The Regency having received Advice, that the Plague at Algiers is entirely ceased, Orders are daily expected to be issued, either for reducing the Quarantine which all Ships coming from thence are at present obliged to perform, or else to take it quite off. We are informed by our last Letters from Corsica, that most of the Inhabitants of that Island have refused to accept the new Regulation offered by the Marquess de Cursay; and 'tis even said, that the Heads of the Pieves have solemnly declared, in an Assembly held for that Purpose, that they will sooner risk their whole Fortunes than submit to it.

Vienna, Nov. 11. On Monday next the States of Lower Austria will open their Assembly in this City, when Count Konigsegg Erps will lay before them the Propositions of her Imperial Majesty, upon which they are to deliberate. Count Christiani, who arrived here a few Days ago from Lombardy, has already been admitted to an Audience of their Imperial Majesties, and has laid before them an Account of the present State of Affairs in that Part of Italy.

Warsaw, Nov. 11. We learn from the Frontiers of the Ukraine, that a Detachment of Troops from the Crown Army having lately come up with another large Party of Heyducks, had fallen upon them, and cut them to Pieces; and that the Defeats those Heyducks have lately sustained, have so intimidated and weakened them, that they have entirely quitted the Polish Territories.

Ratisbon, Nov. 15. Count Seilern, whom the Empress Queen of Hungary has appointed Ambassador from Bohemia to the General Diet of the Empire, in the Room of Count Franckenberg, arrived here on Sunday Night last from Vienna. The Barons de Greiffenheim and Rantzau, Ministers from the Courts of Sweden and Denmark to the said Diet, have delivered their Credential Letters, and are both acknowledged in their respective Qualities.

Copenhagen, Nov. 15. On the 10th Instant we had as violent a Storm of Wind as has been remembered for some Years, by which several Merchantmen in this Port were drove from their Anchors, and received considerable Damage; and by the Pieces of Wrecks which are since come on Shore, we are afraid this Hurricane has made great Havock amongst the Ships along our Coast.

Hague, Nov. 23. By our last Letters from Germany we have Advice, that the Elector of Bavaria, accompanied by several of the principal Lords of his Court, was gone from Munich for Bonn, in order to pay a Visit to his Uncle the Elector of Cologne. We have received an Account from the Brill, that M. Maclean, Lieutenant Colonel of the Scotch Regiment of Majorisbanks, died lately there, in the 64th Year of his Age.
