

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

*3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.* By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

*Lisbon, Oct. 30.* The Duke de Sotto-Mayor, the Spanish Ambassador to this Court, having received his Letters of Revocation, is preparing to set out on his Return to Madrid. A few Days ago died here Don Alonse de Noronha, first Master of the Horse to the Queen Dowager.

*Florence, Nov. 18.* 'Tis said that some considerable Alterations will be made in the Troops of this Dutchy at the Return of Count Richecourt from Vienna; that a new Regiment of Dragoons will then be formed, and a Battalion added to each of the two Regiments of Foot Guards, in the Room of the Corps de Gendarmes, which is to be broke. We are taking all possible Precautions to prevent our Commerce being injured by the new Port which the Duke of Modena is erecting at the Mouth of the River Lavenza.

*Warsaw, Nov. 20.* Several Persons of Distinction are arrived here since their Majesties Return from Grodno, amongst whom are the Primate of the Kingdom, the Bishop of Cracow, the Coadjutor of Kiow, the Palatin of Russia, and Count Radwiewsky, Palatin of Mazure. The Envoy from the Kan of Tartary had his Audience of Leave of the King on Thursday last, and will set out on his Return Home some Day this Week.

*Stockholm, Nov. 21.* The King has caused an Ordonnance to be published in Favour of such foreign Protestants as shall settle at Landskron; by which they are to pay no Taxes for ten Years, and are moreover to have the Liberty of entring all Bricks they shall send for from Holland to build Houses, on paying only a Duty of one Half per Cent. We are informed by Letters received here from the Coasts of this Kingdom, that great Damages have been done by the late Tempests; during which an Ostend Ship, going from Gothenbourg to Amsterdam, laden with Tea, China, and Iron, was cast away near Oroust, a little Distance from the Island of Maarstrand.

*Vienna, Nov. 25.* Their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by the Princess Charlotte of Lorraine, came from Schonbrun on Monday last for the Winter; and Yesterday there was a Drawing-Room at Court for the first Time, which, for the future, is to be continued regularly three Times a Week. Since the Arrival of Count Christiani, Great Chancellor of the Dutchy of Milan, and Count Richecourt, President of the Regency of Tuscany, several Conferences have been held at Court, at which those two Noblemen have regularly assisted. The States of Lower Austria, who are assembled here, continue their Deliberations with great Unanimity, upon the Propositions which were laid before them by Order of her Imperial Majesty.

*Ratisbon, Nov. 26.* An Assembly of the Ministers of the Evangelick Body was held on Tuesday last, in order to consider of a Representation to their Imperial Majesties in Favour of the Protestants in Austria and Carinthia, but Debates arising, nothing was done in that Affair.

*Berlin, Nov. 28.* Yesterday the King arrived here from Potzdam, accompanied by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and several General Officers, and having given some Audiences, and signed some Dispatches, he went to dine with the Queen Mother; and this Morning his Majesty returned to Potzdam. On the 7th of next Month the whole Court is expected here for the Winter, when the Diversions of the Carnival will begin as usual.

*Leige, Nov. 30.* They are continuing to make great Preparations at the Episcopal Palace for the Reception of the Elector of Bavaria, who is expected there on Saturday next. The Feast of St. Clement, whose Name the Elector of Cologne bears, was celebrated here with great Magnificence, on which Occasion a grand Supper and a Ball was given at Court, to which the principal Nobility, and the chief Members of the different Tribunals, were invited.

*Paris, Dec. 1.* The King has nominated the Abbe de Prunieres, Vicar General of the Diocese of Riez, to be Bishop of Grassé in Provence. The Commissaries appointed by his Majesty to adjust the Disputes between the Clergy and the Parliaments of this Kingdom, have finished their Enquiries, and delivered their Opinions thereupon to his Majesty. The young Marquess de Noailles, Knight of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, died here on Sunday last; as did also on Monday the Countess de Montoisson, one of the Ladies of the Queen's Bed-Chamber.

*Hambourg, Dec 5.* Yesterday the Bishop of Lubeck and his new-married Consort, arrived here from Cassel with a very numerous Retinue. Their Highnesses intend to stay some Days with the Dutchess of Holstein, the Bishop's Mother, and then to set out for their Residence at Eutin, but are expected back again about the Beginning of the Year, to pass the Remainder of the Winter at Hambourg.

*Hague, Dec. 5.* Baron Eck, who arrived here a few Days ago from Guelderland, has taken his Seat in the Assembly of the States General,
