Whitehall, January 6. Letters from Fort St. George, in the East Indies, dated July 5, 1752, have brought the following Account. Road was in Sight of the Enemy's Camp, they came out with their whole Force to oppose hum. Major Lawrence, in order to fecure the Baggage, marched to meet them; this brought on a Cannonading from them, which did hum but little Damage, but his Guns galled the Enemy

Major Lawrence, in order so secure the Baga Cannonading from them, which did him but little Damage, but his Guns galled the Encosy very much, and forced them to retreat into # hollow Way; upon this Major Lawrence drew off his Men, and join'd the Army that Night. In this Action the Enemy loft above 300 Horfe, belides Allam Cawn, a Man of great Interest in the Country. Chundah was foon obliged so raise the Siege of Trichinopoly, and collect his Forces in Syringham, s Neighbouring Mand ; and the English Forces Baving policis's themfelves of all the ftrong Pofts quite round it, they fo effectually prevented Provisions from coming to the Enemy, that Chundah's great Anny of above 30,000 Men was differred in lefe than two Months, and himfelf, with the French, and a few black Horfe and Seepoys, who held out, were in a milerable Condition for Want of Suffenance. Upon this the Nabob furminon'd them to furrender Prifoners, and after they had feat Chundah in the Night Time to Monacjee, they deliver'd up the Island of Syringham on the 3d of June, on Condition that the French Officers should have leave to go to Pondicherry on their ... Parole, never to ferve against the Nabob or his Allies, and the Soldiers to be feat to Europe by the first Opportunity, but in the mean Time to be kept Prifoners. As the Allies could not agree who fhould keep Chundah, who was taken at Monacjee by the Tanjore Ally, to end the Difpute his Head was flruck off. The whole Bufiness was done in a few Sieger and some Skirmishes, in feveral of which not a Man of our Forces was loft, fo that in reducing the Blacks to the Nabob's Obedience, and making 30 Officers and near 1000 European Soldiers Prisoners, we had not 50 Men kalled. M. Dupleix, at the Defire of Salabad Jug, has folicited for a Peace, which the Nabob is willing to confeat to, provided it is made to our Satisfaction, as he owns himself much obliged to us.

HE President and Council of Fort St. George, having received Information fometime ago, that the Chunda Saib, and his Allies, were endeavouring to harrass us in our own Districts, sent for a Reinforcement from Bengal, and also fent Capt. Clive to Madrafs, who having collected our Forces and taken the Field, found the Enemy ftrongly encampeed at Vendaloor, a Place about 15 Miles diftant from hence. The Enemy decamp'd in the Night, and took the Rout of Arcot, and were purfued by the Nabob's Forces; they gain'd Covercepaute about 60 Miles off, which Place was appointed for their Rendezvous, their Intention having been to furprize Arcot. Here an Engagement enfued, in which most of their European Forces were killed and taken Prisoners, and their Cannon and Baggage were also taken. Upon this Advice Capt. Clive was immediately ordered to march; he took St. David in his Way, and whilst he was there, the Ship Dorrington arrived, with Major Lawrence, who, at his own Request, had the Command of the Forces given to him, and he fet out on the 17th of March from Fort St. David, at the Head of a Party of 400 Europeans and 1000 Seepoys, and took under Convoy a large Quantity of Stores and Ammunition for Trichinopoly, and proceeded, without Moleflation, till he came with his Forces near Coiladdy on the 28th, when the Enemy strove to take Advantage of his Situation, a ftrong Detachment of French from Chunda Saib's Army having thrown up an Intrenchment in the Way he was to march, cannonaded him from it, and endeavoured to interrupt his Paffage, which induced Major Lawrence, on the Nabob's Part, to return it, and occasion'd the Loss of some Men on both Sides, but, the Enemy not ad vaneing, he went on the next Day for Trichinopoly, about 16 Miles diftant, and as the

Leghorn, Dec. 72 By Letters received here directly from Constantinople, we are informed, that fome fevere Shocks of an Earthquake have been lately felt in that City, and at Adrianople; and that the Damage cauled thereby, particularly at Adrianople, are almost beyond Conception, whole Streets of Houles, and fome beautiful Molques, having been entirely deftroyed thereby, and Numbers of the Inhabitants buried under the Ruins. The fame Letters add, that there has been a great Scarcity of Coffee\_at\_Constantinoples-the-contrary Winds having prevented the Arrival of the Levant Ships; of which an Armenian, and two Jewish Merchants, had taken the Advantage, and raifed that Commodity to an exceffive high Price. This Proceeding fo violently enraged the common People, that the Grand Vilier was absolutely obliged to cause those three Merchants to be apprehended and put to Death before he could appeale them.

Florence, Dec. 9. Prince Esterhasi, Ambasfador from their Imperial Majesties to the Court of Naples, arrived here on Thursday last from Rome, accompanied by his Spoule, and his two Nephews, and followed by a numerous Retinue. Their' Excellencies went immediately to an Apartment provided for them in the Palace; and, as their Stay will be but short, they are entertained every Day by one or other of the Members of the Regency. 'Tis faid that fome new Plans, for the Improvement of our Commerce, will be brought on the Carpet foon after the Return of Count Richecourt from Vienna. Duffeldorp, Dec. 24. We are informed by our last Letters from Bonn, that the Elector of Cologn is preparing for a Journey to Munich; and 'tis faid the Perfons, who are to attend his Highness in that Journey, are already named. General Trips, who arrived here fome Time ago, in order to affift at the Affembly of the States of Juliers and Burghues, let out from hence a few Days ago for his Seat in the Neighbourhood of Aix-la-Chapelle, Brussels, Dec. 25. Count Caunitz-Rittberg is daily expected here from Paris : It is believed he will stay here about a Fortnight, and then proceed on his Journey to Vienna. The high Dufies that are at prefent fixed on Tobacco and Spirituous Liquors in this Country, having greatly diminished the Consumption thereof, 'tis faid an Ordonnance will foon be published for taking off a fourth Part of those Duties. Hague, Jan. 1. Last Friday her Royal Highnels the Princels Governante went, at the Head of the Council of State, to the Affembly of the States General, and laid before them the State of War for the Year 1753; on which Occasion M. Beelarts, Deputy to the faid Council, on the Part of the Province of Holland, made an elegant Speech to that Assembly. We hear that the drawing, of the Lottery of Obligations, which was agreed to by the States of Holland and Westfrizeland on the 4th of Oclober last, will

begin on Monday the 22d Inftant. They write from Amfterdam, that fix Ships belonging to different Chambers of the Eaft India Company of those Provinces, put to Sea from the Taxel on Tuesday last, one for Bengal, one for Ceylon and four for Batavia.
