I am still proceeding, and shall continue to act, upon the same Principle; nothing being capable of giving me so much Comfort, as that my good Subjects may long enjoy the happy Fruits of the present Tranquillity. I have the Satisfaction to be assured of a good Disposition in all the Powers in Alliance with me, to adhere to the same salutary Object; and the Measures which have been taken in different Parts of Europe for that Purpole, cannot fail to give additional Strength and Solidity to the Provisions made by the Treaty of Aix la Chapelle.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have no Supplies to ask of you, but what shall be necessary for the ordinary Services, and such as have been already communicated to you, and for the Security of the Nation, and the Support of its Trade and Commerce, on which the essential Interests
