Naples, December 19.

THEIR Majesties, who went some Days ago to Persano, to take the Diversion of Hunting, are returned here from thence. The extreme bad Weather we have lately had in this Country, has obliged the Workmen to cover up the Walls of the new Palace, that is erecting by the King's Order at Caserta, till Spring.

Petersbourg, Dec. 23. Her Imperial Majesty is returned here from Czarkaselo; since which 'tis said her intended Journey to Moscow is deferred for a few Days, on Account of some Dispatches received from Vienna, which occasioned an extraordinary Council to be held, at which all the Great Officers of State assisted. The Senate have published an Ordonnance, forbidding all Persons to retail any Goods or Merchandize whatsoever in this City, who are not free thereof.

Rome, Dec. 26. The Promotion of Cardinals, which was expected to be made as Yesterday, did not take Place, neither did the Pope name any Time for making such Promotion.

Copenhagen, Dec. 30. On Wednesday last, being the Feast of the Order of the Elephant, the same was celebrated at Court with great Magnificence, the King dining in Publick with the Knights of that Order. The two Ships belonging to our East India Company, bound for China, are still at Anchor in our Road, waiting for a favourable Wind to put to Sea.

Genoa, Jan. 2. On the 11th of last Month, being the Anniversary of the Deliverance of this Capital in the Year 1746, the Doge, accompanied by the Senators, and other principal Members of this Government, went in Procession to the Church of our Lady of Loretto, and heard Te Deum sung to Musick on that Occasion, the Cannon from the Ramparts continuing to fire during the whole Service; and at Night there were Illuminations and Bonfires throughout the City. A few Days ago two notorious Thieves were brought here, under a strong

Guard, and committed to Prison, being charged with robbing the Church of Legina near Savona, of all its sacred Vases.

Prague, Jan. 3. The States of this Kingdom, who have been assembled here for some Weeks, having finished their Session to the entire Satisfaction of the Court, separated on Monday last, and most of the Members are already set out on their Return to their respective Homes.

Stockholm, Jan. 5. The Queen is greatly recovered of her late Indisposition, and we hope will soon be able to appear again in Publick. The King continues to assist regularly at the Deliberations of the Senate, and takes all Opportunities of promoting the Manufactures of this Kingdom. A few Days ago his Majesty made a numerous Promotion of Military Officers, when the Barons de Ebrencrone and Klewenow, Lieutenants of Horse, were each preferred to the Command of a Company in their respective Regiments; and Mess. de Ratzwill, Wrangel, Blix, and Tigerdon, Lieutenants of Foot, were appointed Captains in different Regiments.

Bonn, Jan. 6. As every Thing is now ready for the Elector our Sovereign's intended Journey to Munich, and his Electoral Highness's heavy Baggage is sent away, we are in daily Expectation of his Highness's setting out.

Vienna, Jan. 6. On Monday last, being New-Year's-Day, their Imperial Majesties received, on that Occasion, the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers; after which they went in Procession to the Church belonging to the Jesuits, attended by the Pope's Nuncio, and the Knights of the Order of the Golden Fleece; when Divine Service was ended, they returned to the Palace, and dined in Publick, with the Archduke Joseph, the two eldest Archdutchesses, and the Princess Charlotte of Lorrain. We are informed by our last Letters from Constantinople, that the famous Bashaw of Rhodes has been strangled, by Order of the Grand Seignor, for being concerned in some late Disturbances at the Place of his Exile.

Dusseldorp, Jan. 9. Several hundred Recruits arrived here during the Course of last Week, and are all incorporated in the Regiments in this Garrison, and in those quartered in other Parts of this Dutchy. The Navigation of the Rhine, which has been lately very much interrupted by the great Quantity of Ice floating on it, is now quite free again. The extravagant Price at which the Eating-Houses and Taverns in this City still keep up their Wines, notwithstanding the plentiful Vintage we had last Year, has determined our Magistrates to open a publick Warehouse for the Sale of that Commodity at a much cheaper Rate to the Inhabitants.

Utrecht, Jan. 16. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, in order to make good the Losses this Province sustained during the late War, as well as by several Inundations, and the great Mortality we have had amongst the Cattle, has caused an Ordonnance to be published, in Conjunction with the States of this Province, whereby a Tax of One and a half per Cent. is laid on all such of the Inhabitants as have Estates of 400 Florins per Annum, and upwards. Those who reside in other Countries, and have Estates in this Province, are liable to the same Tax; as are also all Employments, Fees and Pensions. And, to prevent Disputes, every Person is to tax himself, according to the best of his Judgment, and to deliver the same in upon Oath.

Hague, Jan. 18. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, has appointed Major General Bigot to be Commandant of Gertruydenbourg, in the Room of Lieutenant General Crommelin, deceased. Her Royal Highness has promoted the Baron de Wulkenitz, and M. Stocken, to the Rank of Colonels, and M. Raeber to that of Major, in the Body Guards. By Letters received this Post from Germany we are informed, that the Prince Archbishop of Saltzburg died lately at his Archiepiscopal Residence, in the 64th Year of his Age.
