Lisbon, December 26.

THE King has named Don Bartholomei-Manuel-Mendes dos Reys, to the vacant Bishoprick of Macao; Don Antoine-Nuguiera, to that of San-Thome; and Don Pedro-Yacinthe-Valente, to that of the Islands of Cape Verde. The Fleet which put to Sea the Beginning of this Month for the Bay of All-Saints, consisted of 16 Ships, and were escorted to a certain Distance by one of our Men of War.

Florence, Jan. 8. They write from Leghorn, that a great Number of Ships were arrived there within this Week past, most of which were expected some Time ago, but were detained in different Ports of the Mediterranean by the late tempestuous Weather, which held for some Weeks.

Warsaw, Jan. 13. Count Malachowsky, Great Chancellor of the Crown, is expected here on Tuesday next, in order to proceed on the Business of the Tribunal of Justice, which has been suspended for some Time on Account of the late Festivals. We have received Advice, that Prince Lubomirsky, Palatin of Lublin, made his first publick Entry on the 31st of last Month, and was received with great Acclamations of Joy by the Inhabitants.

Stockholm, Jan. 17. The Queen's Health is so well established, that her Majesty appears again in Publick as before her late Illness. The Gregorian Kalender is to take Place here on the 1st of March next, agreeable to a Resolution taken for that Purpose in the last Diet of this Kingdom.

Dantzick, Jan. 18. The Regency of this City having received certain Information that the Plague is broke out in the Neighbourhood of Choczim, where it has carried off great Numbers of the Inhabitants, are taking all possible Precautions to prevent its being brought into this Country; for which Purpose the strictest Orders are given for stopping all Persons coming

from that Part of the Country; and not to suffer any one to pass, on any Pretence whatsoever, without he is provided with a proper Certificate of Health.

Vienna, Jan. 20. The eldest Archdutchess seems quite recovered of the Small-Pox. The Empress Queen has named Prince Piccolomini to be Commander in Chief of all her Troops in Moravia, in the Room of the late General Philibert; and the Regiment commanded by Prince Piccolomini, is given to Count Collowrath. They are working with great Diligence at the new Roads leading from Trieste and Fieume to the principal Towns in the Hereditary Countries. The Prince de Campo-Reale, who has resided here for some Time past in the Quality of Ambassador from the King of the Two Sicilies, had his Audience of Leave of their Imperial Majesties the Beginning of this Week, and set out from hence Yesterday for Dresden on his Return to Naples. The Baron Dewitz, whom the King of Prussia sent hither some Time ago, to negotiate a Treaty of Commerce with this Court, died here on Thursday last of the Small-Pox, in the 35th Year of his Age.

Manheim, Jan. 24. The Elector of Cologne arrived here last Sunday in the Afternoon with a numerous Retinue, and was received with great Affection by the Elector our Sovereign, and this Morning his Electoral Highness continued his Journey for Munich.

Munster, Jan. 24. The Dignity of Grand President of the Cathedral Church in this City, vacant by the Death of Count Plettenbourg, was unanimously conferred Yesterday on the Baron de Meiternich, Great Chamberlain to his Serene Highness the Elector of Cologne. We have received Orders to have all our Troops compleat by the Spring, in Consequence whereof, proper Officers are gone from each Regiment into the flat Countries, in order to raise Recruits. 'Tis said a Project is on Foot for making the River Lieppe navigable, and that Commissaries will be appointed by the King of Prussia, and the

the Elector of Cologne, for carrying the same into Execution.

Berlin, Jan. 25. Count Schmettau, Great Huntsman, having obtained Leave to resign that Employment, the King has conferred the same on Baron Grappendorff. His Majesty has also conferred on M. Schlieben, the Post of Grand Master of the Waters and Forests in the Kingdom of Prussia. Last Week the King, accompanied by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and followed by a numerous Retinue of general Officers, went to view the Ground where his Majesty proposes to form a Camp in the Month of May next, in the Neighbourhood of Spandau. On Saturday there was a grand Supper at the Prince of Prussia's, to which all the Princes and Princesses of the Royal Family were invited; after which the whole Company went in Sledges to Charlottenbourg, where Prince Ferdinand had prepared an elegant Colation. The Prince of Anhalt Cothan, who has been lately indisposed, is now perfectly recovered; and on Tuesday last dined at the King's own Table for the first Time since his Illness.

Dusseldorp, Jan. 26. The Frost is set in so very severe in this Country, that the Navigation upon the Rhine is already greatly interrupted by the Ice. They continue, by Order of the Court, to raise a great Number of Recruits, as well in this Dutchy, as in that of Juliers, for completing all the Regiments quartered in this Country, against Spring, when they are to be reviewed by Prince Frederick of Deux Ponts.

Hambourg, Jan. 26. The Spanish Consul is returned to Hambourg. This Morning the Sieur Lochau, one of the Counsellors of this Magistracy, was seized at the Town-House with an Apoplectick Fit, and died instantly.

Hague, Jan. 30. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland renewed their Deliberations this Morning; as did also the Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty of these Provinces. Count Bentinck is returned here from Brussels; and Yesterday he was admitted to an Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and afterwards of the Lords of the Regency. Count Dehn, the Danish Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to this Court, died here on Sunday Night last, in an advanced Age, after four or five Days Illness.
