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Lisbon, January 8.

WE have received Advice, that the Fleet, which sailed from hence the 4th of last Month for the Brasils, were dispersed by a violent Tempest a few Days after they left this Port; and as we have not since been able to learn any News concerning several of them, 'tis greatly feared they perished in the Storm.

Petersbourg, Jan. 23. The Great Chancellor Count Bestucheff is something recovered of his Disorder, but is still too weak to undertake so long a Journey as that to Moscow; which is not to be wondered at, as the Violence of his Complaint has occasioned his loosing at least fourteen or fifteen Pounds of Blood since the 19th of last Month.

Leghorn, Jan. 23. We are informed by our last Letters from Corsica, that the Malecontents, who have taken Arms in great Numbers, have secured several Detachments of French Troops which were sent into the interior Parts of that Country; and that they absolutely refuse to set them at Liberty, till the important Posts of San Fiorenzo, Corte, Nebbio, and Aleria, are restored to them; which Posts, they alledge, were some Time ago put into the Possession of the Marquis de Cursay, Commander of the French Forces, with no other View than to secure them from being taken by the Genoese Troops.

Geneva, Feb. 1. Advice having been received here, that the King of Sardinia had forbid the circulating of all Kinds of counterfeit Coin in his Dominions; the Regency of this Place immediately followed his Example, by expressly forbidding all the Inhabitants either to pay or receive any such Kinds of Specie for the future. The Frost is set in so very severe in these Parts, that the like has not been felt since the Year 1740.

Bordeaux, Feb. 1. The Commerce of this City, which was greatly injured during the late War, is now in as flourishing a Condition as ever. Last Week five notorious Thieves were apprehended and committed to Prison, being Part of the Gang who some Weeks ago broke

open the Parish Churches of Pessac and Begle, and carried off all the Sacred Vases.

Worms, Feb. 3. They write from Mettenheim, that the Countess Sophie-Amelie-Polixene, only Daughter of Count Casimir de Wartenberg, died there a few Days ago, in the 16th Year of her Age.

Vienna, Feb. 3. On Thursday last, being the Birth-Day of Archduke Charles, their Imperial Majesties received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers on that Occasion. The Empress Queen has appointed General Harsch to be Commandant of the City of Prague; and Count Linden, and General Lowenwalde, are appointed to be of her Imperial Majesty's Privy Counsel. Count Richecourt, President of the Regency of the Dutchy of Tuscany, is preparing for his Return to Florence.

Franckfort, Feb. 6. A great Number of Officers are lately arrived in this City, who have dispersed themselves into all the Neighbouring Towns and Villages, in order to raise Recruits for the Imperial Troops, in which they are very successful.

Hambourg, Feb. 6. The Prince and Bishop of Lubeck, accompanied by the Princess his Spouse, and a numerous Retinue, arrived here on Thursday Night last from Eutin, in order to spend some Weeks in this City. We have received Advice from Riesenbourg, that the Princess, Spouse of Prince George-Louis of Holstein Gottorp, was safely delivered of a Prince, whose Birth had occasioned great Rejoycings.

Berlin, Feb. 6. The King has appointed the Prince of Anhalt Cothen to be Lieutenant General of his Armies. His Majesty has also appointed M. Notting, to be President of the Regency of the County of Tecklenbourg; and the Employment of Counsellor of War and Domains, of the Department of Minden, of which he was possessed, is conferred on M. Lunders. The King has caused an Ordonnance to be published, at the Request of the Merchants of this City, expressly forbidding all Foreign Merchants, who frequent the Fairs at Franckfort upon the Oder, to sell their Merchandize at
