Constantinople, January 2.

HE Grand Seignor, who at first looked with Indifference on the Troubles in Persia, seems now to conceive some Jealousy at the Advantages gained by Prince Heraclius of Georgia over Schach Doub; and 'tis said will order a considerable Body of Troops to assemble on the Frontiers of that Kingdom in the Spring, in order to be ready to act as Circumstances may require.

Algiers, Jan. 2. A few Days ago one of our armed Vessels brought into this Port a Polacco which she took in the Adriatick Gulf. But it appearing the Polacco belonged to some Merchants at Marsailles, and the French Consul interesting himself in the Affair, the Dey ordered her and her Crew to be immediately restored to the Master, with Liberty to proceed on his

Voyage.

Lisbon, Jan. 12. The Infant Don Emanu el, who a few Days ago was so ill that there was but little Hopes of his Recovery, was Yesterday "thought to be much better. The Departure of the Court for Salvaterra is fixed for the 19th Instant, where 'tis said their Majesties intend to stay a Month or five Weeks. Last Week the Spoule of Count Caravalho, Secretary of State, was safely delivered of a Daughter. The Man of War that carried the New Governor of Ma zàgan to that Colony, returned into Port on the 6th Instant, in a shattered Condition, having on her Return met with extreme bad Weather; however the is to be forthwith repaired, in order to cruize on the Corfairs of Barbary.

Naples, Jan. 24. On Saturday last, being the King's Birth-Day, the Court was very numerous and extremely splendid at Caserta, whither all the Nobility and Foreign Ministers repaired in their richest Habits to compliment their Majesties on that Occasion. The same Day his Majesty conserred the Order of the Golden Fleece on Prince St. Nicandre. Towards the End of last Week a large Quantity of Ingots of Silver, and Pieces of Eight, were sent from hence to the Spanish Treasurer at Rome, in or-

der to be circulated in Commerce.

Rome, Jan, 27. Advice having been received at Court, that the Barbary Corfairs are become more troublesome than ever, and greatly interrupt our Navigation and Commerce, Orders are fent to Civita Vecchia for two armed Gallies to put to Sea forthwith in Quest of those Pyrates. A few Days ago a Courier was dispatched to Naples, with the Pope's Permission for the King of the Two Sicilies to raise Three per Cent. upon the Incomes of all the Clergy in his Dominions. Cardinal Albani, who is charged with the Affairs of the Imperial Court, having received some Dispatches of Importance from Vienna, has communicated the Contents there-

of to the Secretary of State in a long Conference

he had for that Purpose.

Turin, Jan. 27. They have been so successful in enlisting Men for the two new Regiments with which the King is about to augment his Troops, that those two Regiments are already compleat. We are informed by our last Letters from Corsica, that the Malecontents of that Island had taken up Arms, at a Time when 'twas least expected; and that they have taken, Sword in Hand, some strong Posts possessed by the Genoese and French Troops.

Prague, Feb. 3. Count Collowrath, to whom the Empress Queen has given the Regiment of Dragoons, vacant by the Death of Baron Philibort, fet out from hence the Beginning of this Week for Vienna, in order to take upon him that Command. Prince Piccolomini, Commander in Chief of the Troops in Moravia, who was lately appointed Governor of the Fortress of Brinn, is gone to take Poslession of that Government. 'Tis said that some Regiments will march from hence for Hungary in the Spring. The Frost continues so very severe in these Parts, that all Sorts of Carriages pass and repass upon the Moldau without the least Danger.

Vienna, Feb. 3.. Their Imperial Majesties have appointed Count Ernest de Harrach to be Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from this Court to that of Sardinia, and a Courier is gone to Madrid, where he resides at present, with Orders for his setting out forthwith for Turin. The Prince of Schwartzenberg is extremely ill, and 'tis feared will not recover. The Deputies of the City of Hambourg have executed their Commission at this Court, and are preparing for their Return Home. We learn from Constantinople, that the new Captain Bashaw has so far insinuated himself into the Grand Seignor's good Graces, that he is already named a Bashaw of three Tails, and has moreover the Government of Candia conferred on him, in the room of the late Governor, who is promoted to the Government of Negropont. The same Advices add, that the Bashaw of Chio, who was some Time ago deposed, is again taken into Favour, and made Governor of Boinia, in the room of the lite Governor, who is preferred to the Government of Oczakow, the late Governor whereof having been promoted to that of Bendar.

Franckfort, Feb. 10. At the Time when the Courier was robbed of the Mail near Bingen, about three Weeks ago, by fix Men masked, itwas generally believed to be done with a Design to secure some Papers of Consequence; but by several Circumstances which have appeared fince. we have great Reason to think the Robbers had no other View than to take what Money they could find in his Portmantle.

Dusseldorp, Feb. 13. All the Troops in this Dutchy, as well as those in Juliers, have Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to be seviewed by Prince Frederick of Deux Ponts, in April or May next, when his Highnels proposes to come hither for that Purpose from Manheim. We have received Advice, that Baron Widmann, Minister Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties to the Princes and States of the Circle of Franconia, is gone from Nuremberg to Munich. They write from Mayence, that Count Coblentzel set out from thence on Sunday last for Saltzbourg, in order to affift, in Quality of Imperial Commissary, at the Election that is thortly to be made of a new Archbilhop.
