THE Count de Aubigny, the new French Ambassador to this Court, has had several Conferences with the King's Ministers since his Arrival, but no Day is as yet fixed for his first publick Audience of his Majesty. Count Unham, lately appointed Ambassador from this Court to that of Spain, has sent forward most of his Servants and heavy Baggage for Madrid; and, as he has received his last Instructions, he proposes to follow them in a few Days.

Genoa, Feb. 2. On Monday last two Ships sailed from hence for Bastia, having on board about 300 Men, to reinforce the Genoese Troops in Corsica; in Regard to which Place the People here seem greatly divided in their Opinions, some insinuating, that the French will soon use their utmost Efforts to oblige the Malecontents to submit entirely to this Government, whilst others, who pretend to an equal Share of Knowledge in that Affair, seem to affirm, that his most Christian Majesty, finding all his Endeavours to bring those People to their Obedience, have proved unsuccessful, is at length determined to withdraw his Troops from thence; which we the reader believe, as by certain Advices received here from Provence and Languedoc, the Intendants of those Provinces have received Orders to provide the necessary Magazines and Quarters for a Body of Troops. Upon Information that some Corsairs of Barbary are cruising on these Coasts, the Company of our Lady of Succours have given Orders for the immediate equipping two large Xebecs, in order to give them Chace. We are informed by our last Letters from Parma, that the Difficulties which prevented the Infant Duke's taking Part in the Treaty concluded last Year at Madrid, having been removed, that Prince had at length acceded thereto; and that 'twas believed the King of the Two Sicilies, and the Duke of Modena, would soon follow his Example.

Bayonne, Feb. 6. On Sunday last we received Advice, that Count Gages, Knight of the Order of the Golden Fleece, and Viceroy and Captain General of the Kingdom of Navarre, died at Pampelona on the 31st of last Month, in the 74th Year of his Age.

Berlin, Feb. 21. The King has appointed the Barons de Wylich, Matzfeld, Reck, Grollman, Gruter, and Goor, to be perpetual Coun-

fellors of the Courts of Justice established at Cleves and in the New Marche. Orders are sent to Silesia, for making the necessary Preparations for the Subsistence of a Body of Troops who are to form a Camp there in the Spring.

Paris, Feb. 23. On Sunday last the Court went out of Mourning on Account of the Death of the Dutchess of Maine. 'Tis confidently asserted, that the Dauphiness is again with Child, and that the same will soon be declared at Court. The Council of State have issued an Arret, by which all Cattle are allowed to be brought from Foreign Countries till the 1st of January next, without the Owners being lyable to pay the usual Duties for the same. A Contract of Marriage between the Marquess de Pracontal and Mademoiselle Montregard, is signed by their Majesties and the Royal Family. The King has appointed the Count de la Marche, a Prince of the Blood, to be Colonel of the Regiment of Foot of Nivernois, in the Room of the Marquess de Monteil; and the Marquess de Chamborant, Son to Lieutenant General Count Claviere, is appointed Lieutenant Colonel thereof. His Majesty has likewise appointed the Abbe du Chastel, Chancellor of the Cathedral Church of Metz, to be Almoner to the Queen, in the Room of the late Abbe de Montazet. Lieutenant General Count de Apchier died here a few Days ago, in the 59th Year of his Age. We learn by our last Letters from Marsailles, that several Ships have been cast away in those Seas during the late tempestuous Weather, particularly upon the Coast of Sardinia, where a considerable Number of large Vessels, and small Craft, have been drove on Shore, and most of them dashed to Pieces.

Hague, Feb. 27. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who separated on the 10th Instant, will meet again on the 7th of next Month. On Sunday last Count Bentinck, who arrived here a few Days ago from Brussels, in order to communicate to her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and to their High Mightinesses, the Result of some late Conferences, set out from hence on his Return that City. The States of Guelderland have agreed to a Lottery for 760000 Florins; it to consist of 16000 Tickets, to be divided into four Classes, of which 6718 are Prizes, the neat Produce whereof is to be employed in repairing their Dykes.
