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**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the Eighth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for the Amendment of the Law relating to Actions on the Statute of Hue and Cry, It is enacted, That no Person shall have or maintain any Action against any Hundred, unless he shall, within the Space of Twenty Days next after the Robbery committed, cause publick Notice to be given thereof in the London Gazette; in Pursuance whereof, Robert Talbot, of Emberton in the County of Bucks, Laceman, hereby gives Notice, That on Saturday the 17th Day of February last, between the Hours of Four and Five of the Clock in the Afternoon of the same Day, he was assaulted and stopped in the King's Highway, near a Farm called Livers Ockle, and in a Lane called Livers Ockle Lane, in the Parish of Livers Ockle, in the Hundred of Broxash, and in the County of Hereford, by a lassy tall Man, long Visage, and of a sandy Complexion, and had then on a dark brown Great Coat, and a dark Curled or Cut Wig, and mounted on a dark brown Horse or Mare, or a dark Bay Horse or Mare, with a short Tail; who then robbed him the said Robert Talbot of two Boxes of Buckinghamshire Lace, commonly called Thread or Bone Lace; and in one of the said Boxes there was 435 Yards of Lace or thereabouts, of the Value of 127 l. 3 s. 10 d. and in the other Box 137 Yards of Lace or thereabouts, of the Value of 88 l. 10 s. 1 d. one Silver Watch, and ten Shillings in Silver, or thereabouts.
