Extraordinary from their High Mightineffes the States General of the United Provinces, hath prefented a Memorial to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, fetting forth, " That three " Dutch Ships, named the Groenlandia, the " Bruynvis, and the Vrouw Leonora, were " fent, the Beginning of laft Year, upon the "Greenland Whale Fishery, where they were " froze up, on the 21st of August; That the * Crews did thereupon return to Holland with " Commodore Harmanse, having first secured " the faid three Ships by their Anchors in the " best Manner they could, in Hopes of find-" ing them again, upon their going to Green-" land this Year-That three Ships are now " ordered to be fitted out to fail for Green-" land in Search of the faid Veffels fo left " there; but the Owners and Freighters hav-⁴⁴ ing been under fome Apprehensions, leaft "the faid Ships fhould be taken and carried " away by Perfons who have no Right or " Title thereto, had therefore made Appli-" cation to the States General, praying, that " all Perfons might be forbid to intermeddle " with the faid Ships and their Cargoes, ex-" cept only those, who shall be authorized to " go and look after them : And the States "General having complied therewith, the ne-" ceffary Placards have been iffued for that " Purpole ;—The aforementioned Envoy Ex-" traordinary therefore humbly begs, that the " like Orders may be given with Regard to " His Britannick Majefty's Subjects." Which Memorial being this Day laid before His Majefty at this Board, the fame was taken into Confideration : And His Majesty is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to Order, as it it is hereby Ordered, That none of His

Naples, Feb. 12. Their Majeflies, who are ftill at Caferta with the young Royal Family, propole fetting out from thence towards the End of the Week for Bovino, in order to take the Diversion of hunting. The Project that was fome Time ago prefented to the King for repairing and enlarging the Port at Salerno, having been examined in Council and approved, the fame will be immediately carried into Execution, from whence great Advantages are expected to arife by the Encrease of our Commerce.

Stockholm, Feb. 20. There is no Talk at prefent of recalling our Troops from Finland; on the contrary 'tis now faid they are to remain in that Province till the new Fortifications lately begun there, are entirely finished. The Queen, who has been confined to her Chamber by a feverish Disorder, is now much better, 'Tis faid the King intends to fet out early in the Spring on a Tour to Scania, and fome other Provinces of this Kingdom, which his Majefty has not visited fince he came to the Throne. We are informed by fome Travellers who are arrived here from the Northern Frontiers of this Kingdom, that two violent Shocks of an Earthquake were lately felt in those Parts, particularly in the Diffrict of Angermanland, but that the same happily went off without doing any confiderable Damage. Vienna, Feb. 21. On Sunday last Part of a large Bridge upon the Danube was broke down and carried away by a great Quantity of Ice that came floating down that River, by which Меаяія
