The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS Monf. Hop, Envoy Extraordinary from their High Mightineffes the States General of the United Provinces, hath presented a Memorial to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, setting forth, " That three "Dutch Ships, named the Groenlandia, the Buynvis, and the Vrouw Leonora, were " fent, the Biginning of last Year, upon the "Greenland Whale Fishery, where they were " froze up, on the 21ft of August; That the " Crews did thereupon return to Holland with " Commodore Harmanse, having first secured " the faid_three Ships by their Anchors in the " best Manner they could, in Hopes of find-" ing them again, upon their going to Green-" land this Year-That three Ships are now " ordered to be fitted out to fail for Green-" land in Search of the faid Veffels fo left " there; but the Owners and Freighters hav-"ing been under some Apprehensions, least " the faid Ships should be taken and carried " away by Perfons who have no Right or " Title thereto, had therefore made Appli-" tation to the States General, praying, that " all Perfons might be forbid to intermeddle " with the faid Ships and their Cargoes, ex-" cept only those, who shall be authorized to " go and look after them : And the States "General having complied therewith, the ne-" ceffary Placards have been iffued for that " Purpose ;- The aforementioned Envoy Ex-" traordinary therefore humbly begs, that the " like Orders may be given with Regard to " His Britannick Majefty's Subjects." Which Memorial being this Day laid before His Majesty at this Boad, the fame was taken into Confideration: And His Majesty is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to Order, as it it is hereby Ordered, That none of His Majesty's Subjects do presume to seize, take away, or molest the aforementioned Dutch Ships, or any of them, or their, or either of their Cargoes, or otherwife to intermeddle therewith, without the Confent of the Owners thereof, or fuch as shall be authorized to take Care of the fame, as they shall answer the contrary at their Peril.——And to the End, that all His Majesty's Subjects may be informed hereof, It is His Majesty's Commands, that this Order be printed and published in the London Gazette. Rome, Feb. 17. The Hereditary Prince of Anfpach is fhortly expected here from Venice, for whole Reception a fine Hotel is fitting up. Robertz, appointed by the Elector our Sovereign to receive the Homage of the Magistrates of the Town of Erkelens, of which his Highnels has lately made an Acquisition, went to the Town Hanfe, and received the Oaths of all the Burgomafters and other Officers, with the usual · Ceremony : After which an elegant Dinner was provided; and at Night the Town-Houfe was finely illuminated; Fireworks were played off; the Cannon upon the Ramparts were fired; and all the Bells in the Town continued to ring the whole Evening. Hague, March 8. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who opened their Assembly Yesterday, have continued their Deliberations to Day. The Deputies of the feveral Colleges of the Admiralty of this Country are also arrived here from their respective Towns, and have began to deliberate on the Affairs of their Department.
