Extract of a Letter from Commodore Cotes, Commander of His Majesty's Ships at Jamaica, to Mr. Cleveland, dated the 15th of January 1753.

I Have had no Complaints from the Merchants of any Ships taken since my Arrival.

Bologna, February 28. The Hereditary Prince of Anspach arrived here four or five Days ago, and proposes to continue his Route the Beginning of next Week for Rome. Cardinal Doria, who has the Inspection of the Works that are carrying on to prevent the frequent Inundations we are subject to in this Country, has given Orders for making good the Damages occasioned by the late Overflowings of our Rivers.

Florence, March 2. An Apartment is preparing, at one of the Emperor's Palaces in this City, for the Widow of the late Count Richecourt, who is shortly expected here from Vienna: The Empress has settled upon her, during Life, a yearly Pension of 1500, and the Emperor 500 Florins. His Imperial Majesty has been pleased to order the Release of the Chevalier Borgherini from one of the Castles in this City, where he has been confined for several Years past, on Account of the Capital Crime he was guilty of, in having embezzled a large Quantity of Corn out of the publick Granary committed to his Care: He is however ordered to retire to one of his Country Houses till his Imperial Majesty's Pleasure shall be farther known with Respect to the Place of his Residence.

Genoa, March 3. We are informed by our last Letters from Corsica, that M. de Courfi has taken the necessary Precautions for withdrawing the French Troops out of that Island with Safety; and that they only wait the Arrival of the Transports, in order to embark for Provence.

Saltzburg, March 6. The Election of a new Prince-Archbishop of this City is fixed for the 12th Instant.

Warsaw, March 7. Advice having been received here, that the Contagious Distemper which lately broke out in the Neighbourhood of

Choczim, is entirely ceased, the Communication is again opened with that Country.

Stockholm, March 7. On the 1st Instant, the New Stile took Place throughout this Kingdom. Orders are given for Compleating all the Regiments, both Horse and Foot, against the Summer, when the King intends to make a general Review of his Forces. His Majesty assists regularly at the Deliberations of the Senate, in which they have come to a Resolution to take off the Duty on Windows, and to lay one on Tea and Coffee in its Room.

Turin, March 10. M. Astié, late Secretary to the French Ambassador, who was some Time since appointed Intendant of the Finances to the Duke of Parma, in the Room of M. Carraccioli, left this Place on the 1st Instant, in order to take Possession of that Post. The French Ambassador has received his Letters of Revocation, his Excellency's Health not permitting him to reside here any longer; and M. Boyer, who is Secretary to the Embassy, is, for the present, charged with the Affairs of the French Court. Yesterday Morning an Express arrived here with the Account of the Death of the Princess of Hesse Rhinsfeldt, Mother in Law to his Sardinian Majesty, for whom this Court will go into Mourning for six Months.

Vienna, March 10. On the 27th past, Count Cobenzel took his Leave of their Imperial Majesties, and set out next Morning for Saltzburg, in order to assist, in Quality of Imperial Commissary, at the Election of a new Prince-Archbishop, which is to come on next Monday. 'Tis said several Camps will be formed this Summer, and that the Council of War have already received the necessary Orders in Relation thereto.

Copenhagen, March 12. 'Tis said the Queen is with Child, and that the same will soon be declared at Court. We have received Advice, that the Queen Julia Maria, a Ship belonging to our East India Company, which lately put to Sea from this Port for China, has happily passed the Sound, and proceeded on her Voyage with a fair Wind.

Berlin, March 14. In Conformity to the King's Orders, they are already making Dispositions for forming a Camp next Summer in the Neighbourhood of this City, and 'tis expected his Majesty will soon name the Regiment

ments intended for that Service. 'Tis said a Reply to the Court of Great Britain's Answer to the Exposition of the Motives, &c. of his Prussian Majesty, is actually drawing up.

Hambourg, March 15. The Deputies whom the Regency of this City sent lately to Vienna, have concluded a Treaty of Commerce between this City and the Ports of Trieste and Fiume. They write from Copenhagen, that the King, in order to encourage the Manufactures of his own Kingdom, has prohibited the Importation of Foreign Stuffs made of Silk and Wooll. The same Letters add, that the Prussian Minister is strongly soliciting his Danish Majesty for Leave that all Prussian Ships may hereafter pass the Sound without paying the Duties to which the Ships of all other Nations are liable.

Paris, March 16. We are informed by Letters from Madrid, that Orders are already given for providing Magazines of Provisions and Forage in Catalonia, a Camp being intended to be formed next Summer in that Province.

Hague, March 20. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland have renewed to Day their Deliberations; and the Deputies of the Colleges of the Admiralty continue also to deliberate on the Affairs of their Department. M. Beelaerts, who, at the Recommendation of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, was lately appointed Bailiff of Beyerland, in the Room of Baron Blockland, has taken the usual Oaths, before the Assembly of the States of Holland, to qualify himself for that Employment; as has likewise M. Stryen, for the Post of Intendant of the Digues of the Town and District of Oudewater.

D. marked, by his Desire, on the Handle thereof; and the said Person having given, in Payment, for the said Tankard, a Bank Post Bill, which was taken out of the Cirencester Mail, which was robbed on the 18th of April, 1751, and indorsed the said Bank Post Bill by the Name of Charles Dew.

This is therefore to give Notice to all Goldsmiths and others, to whom the said Tankard may be offered in Sale, that whoever apprehends, or causes to be apprehended the Person above described, who is strongly suspected of having been a Principal, or an Accomplice in the said Robbery, shall, upon Conviction, be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen.

To Make the

Lithontriptic Mass and Electary.

TAKE Five Pounds of Alicant Soap, shaved, and One Pound of Oystershell Lime; put them into a Tin Vessel, and pour upon them Five Quarts of Water: Make the Water boil till the Soap be perfectly dissolved in it, and then strain all into a glazed earthen Vessel. Expose this Mass to the Air, stirring it every Day till it becomes both mild to the Taste, and of a proper Consistence to be formed into Pills or long Pellets, without sticking to the Fingers. This may be expected to happen in Two or Three Months. If it becomes sufficiently mild before it has acquired a due Consistence, it may be brought to this by being heated over a Fire, in a Tin Vessel: If it acquires too hard a Consistence, before it be sufficiently mild, it must be soften'd with Water. The Mass here described is what I call the Lithontriptic Mass. I direct a Tin Vessel, because a Brass or Copper one would make it Emetic.

It may be prepared in a more expeditious Manner, as follows; (but, where Time can be allow'd for it, I prefer the foregoing) Pour Two Gallons of Water upon a Pound of Oystershell Lime, stir it two or three Times, and when it has fallen to the Bottom, pour off the clear Part of the Water. Repeat this fifteen or twenty Times, or till the clear Water, which is poured off, be almost tasteless, leaving about Five Pints of Water upon the Lime, after the last Ablution: Then pour this Mixture of Water and dulcified Lime upon Five Pounds of Alicant Soap, shaved, and proceed as above directed. The Mass thus prepared will be fit for Use in a few Days, or even immediately.

If the Mass of Soap and Oystershell Lime, dulcified in either of the above-mentioned Ways, be made of the Consistence of an Electary, I call it the Lithontriptic Electary. This Form is more convenient than the Mass, for those who desire to take the Medicine dissolved in a liquid Vehicle: The most suitable ones are Milk, Water sweeten'd with Honey or Sugar, Water flavour'd with Wine, Brandy, or Rum, and Small-Beer.

Where a Person is supposed to have a large Stone in the Kidney or Bladder, he ought to take every Day as much of the Lithontriptic Mass, or Electary, as contains two Ounces of the Soap, unless his Pain and Provocation to make Water be violent; in which Case it will be proper to begin with about Half this Quantity, and to increase it as he can bear. The Medicine ought also, in this Case, to be dulcified in an extraordinary Degree.

The Generation of Gravel and Gravel-Stones may be entirely prevented by this Medicine: It is likewise of great Service in Disorders of the Stomach and Bowels, arising from, or attended with Acidities there, and in gouty Habits. The Patient may, in any of these Cases, begin with such a Quantity every Day, as contains an Ounce of Soap, and afterwards increase or lessen his Quantity as he finds Occasion.
