P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS Signior John Baptist Gastaldi, Minister of the most Serene Republick of Genoa, hath presented a Memorial to his Majesty-at this Board, representing, That ever since the Re-establishment of Peace by the Treaty of Aix la Chapelle, the said most Serene Republick, has taken all the Care possible, for settling such Regulations, as might secure Tranquility in the Island of Corsica, which at present is the only Place in Europe, where the Troubles are not entirely ceased; That there is Reason to imagine, the whole Island would return to its Duty towards its ancient and lawful Sovereign, if it was not for the Perfidy of some of the Chiefs of the Malecontents, who endeavour to foment the Spirit of Rebellion, and do their utmost to make it continue; and that one of the best Means to elude the Efforts of these Chiefs would be, by hindering all Foreign Ships from Landing in Corsica new Succours for the Rebels, and therefore the said Minister humbly requested, that his Majesty would be pleased to issue his Royal Orders, to prohibit his Subjects from giving any Assistance to the Corsican Rebels, in like Manner as his Majesty had been formerly pleased to do upon Applications of this Kind made by the said Minister, in the Fifth and Tenth Years of his Majesty's Reign—His Majesty having taken the said Memorial into his Royal Consideration, and being desirous of giving all further just and reasonable Satisfaction to his Majesty's said good Friends and Allies, the Republick of Genoa, and to maintain inviolably the Peace and Friendship subsisting between his Majesty and them, is hereby pleased, with the Advice of his Privy Council, strictly to charge and command, all his Majesty's Subjects, of what Condition soever they be, that they forbear to give, or furnish, Aid, Assistance, Countenance, or Succour, by any Ways or Means whatsoever, to any of the Inhabitants of the Island of Corsica in Rebellion against the said most Serene Republick, upon Pain not only of his Majesty's high Displeasure, but of suffering such Punishment as by Law may be inflicted on such as wilfully violate his Majesty's

Treaties, and infringe the Peace and Friendship subsisting between his Majesty and any Foreign Princes or States—And to the End, that all his Majesty's Subjects may be informed hereof, it is his Majesty's Commands, that this Order be printed and published in the London Gazette.

*Naples, April 10.* Their Majesties, who have been for some Weeks past at Caserta, are expected here on Saturday next. Last Week Sentence was pronounced against a Gang of fifteen Persons, who have, for some Time past, committed the greatest Outrages in this City, four of whom are to suffer Death, and the rest to work in the Gallies during Life.

*Rome, April 17.* The Duke and Dutches of Wirtembourg, who some Days ago took a Tour to Naples, returned here on Saturday last. An Express having arrived at Court from Civita Vecchia, with an Account of the Death of the Chevalier Alberici, Commander of the Pope's Gallies, that Employment is already conferred on the Chevalier Ferretti, who is set out to take upon him that Command. By Letters received this Post from different Ports of the Ecclesiastical State, we are informed, that several Ships and small coasting Vessels were cast away in the late tempestuous Weather, amongst which, an English Ship, loaden chiefly with Woollen Goods, was drove on a Bank of Sand off Fiumicino, where she perished with all her Crew; and a

French Ship, loaden with Oil, suffered in like Manner a little Distance from Nuttuno.

*Florence, April 17.* Prince San-Severino, who is going to reside at the Court of Great Britain in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the Two Sicilies, left this Place the Beginning of last Week on his Way to London. They write from Vienna, that Count Richecourt, President of the Council of this Regency, having happily succeeded in his Commissions at that Court, proposes to set out shortly on his Return hither. We are informed by private Letters from Lombardy, that five Regiments of Foot are soon expected there from Germany, but whether they go as a Reinforcement of the Troops already there, or only to replace the like Number of Regiments, is at present uncertain. We hear from Plaisentia, that great Preparations are already making against the approaching Fair, which begins the 29th Instant, the Infant Duke of Parma having engaged to honour it with his Presence.

*Stockholm, April 20.* The King's Fever still continues, but as it now intermits, and the Fits are not so long nor so severe as they were a few Days since, his Physicians have great Hopes of his speedy Recovery. On Friday last the Corps of Baron Fuchs, late Governor of this City, and Knight of the Order of the Seraphins, was carried with great Funeral Pomp to the Church of Ridderholm, where it was interred. The same Day M. Skutenhielm, Secretary of State of the Department of the Royal Chancery, died here in a very advanced Age. His Majesty has named M. Sadolin to the vacant Professorship of Physick in the University of Abo. We have received Advice from Gottenbourg, that the Prince Charles, one of our East India Company's Ships, sailed from thence last Week for Canton in China.

*Vienna, April 21.* On the 19th Instant, being Maundy-Thursd'ay, the Emperor, attended by some of the principal Lords of his Court, performed the Ceremony of washing the Feet of twelve poor Men, whose Ages, put together, amounted to 934 Years; after which his Imperial Majesty served them at Table; and, when Dinner was over, each poor Man was presented with a compleat Suit of Cloaths, and several Pieces of Silver. The Empress Queen having ordered a large Edifice to be erected near the University, for the Professors to read publick Lectures and to reside in, the same will be begun soon after Easter; towards which Building it is said the States of Lower Austria are to furnish a considerable Sum. On Thursday Morning last Count Caunitz Rittberg arrived in this City, and was the same Day introduced to their Imperial Majesties, and met with a gracious Reception.

*Paris, April 27.* The King has declared his Intention to review the French and Swiss Guards, on the 6th of next Month, in the Plains of Sablons. His Majesty has appointed the Duke d'Aiguillon to be his Lieutenant General in the County of Nantes, in the Room of the Duke of Chaulnes. We hear from Rochelle,

that the violent Storm of Wind that happened in the Night between the 4th and 5th Instant, reached also Nantes and Bourdeaux, where it did considerable Damage; and several small Vessels were drove on Shore along those Coasts. They write from Madrid, that the Drought they had there for some Time past, is at length succeeded by a fine soft Rain, which continued for several Days together, so that instead of the Scarcity with which they were threatened, they have now the Prospect of a plentiful Harvest, which has already reduced the Price of Corn, that was getting to a great Height, almost one Third. The same Letters add, that by their Advices from Catalonia, the Regiments intended to Form a Camp in that Province, arrive there successively from the interior Parts of the Kingdom.

*Brussels, April 30.* The Regency having been informed, that a great Quantity of Corn has been lately bought up, as well in this Province as in that of Hainault, in order to be sent to Valenciennes and Maubeuge, to fill the Magazines of those two Places, have absolutely forbid the same; and several Detachments of regular Troops are ordered to be posted on the Frontiers, to see the Orders given on this Occasion strictly carried into Execution. The Ordonnance published some Time since, to prevent the Circulation of the old Escalins, takes Place To-morrow, when all Persons possessed of any of those ancient Pieces of Coin, are required to carry them to the Mint. 'Tis said a Manufacture is going to be established here for the working of Iron and Steel, and that great Privileges are to be granted to all those concerned in it.

*Rotterdam, May 3.* Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante having approved of the Nomination that was laid before her of Burgo-masters and other Magistrates of this City for the Year ensuing, they are accordingly sworn into their respective Offices.

*Hague, May 4.* The Barons de Boetzelaer and Burmania, Deputies to the Council of State from the Provinces of Holland and Friseland, are appointed to visit the Fortifications, and view the Magazines of the City of Maestricht. Yesterday in the Afternoon the Marquis de Bonac, the French Ambassador, went to Court in the same State in which he made his publick Entry, where, being admitted to his first publick Audience of their High Mightinesses, he delivered his Credential Letters; and the Discourse, with which they were accompanied, having been answered, on the Part of their High Mightinesses, by Count Bentinck, President for the Week, the Ambassador was conducted to the Hotel of Prince Maurice, where an elegant Entertainment was provided, at which the Members of the Regency, and many other Persons of Distinction, were present.
