AT the Court at St. James's, the 10th Day of May, 1753,

P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Signior John Baptist Gastaldi, Minister of the most Serene Republick of Genoa, hath presented a Memorial to his Majesty at this Board; representing, That ever since the Re-establishment of Peace by the Treaty of Aix la Chapelle, the said most Serene Republick, has taken all the Care possible, for settling such Regulations, as might secure Tranquility in the Island of Corsica, which at present is the only Place in Europe, where the Troubles are not entirely ceased; That there is Reason to imagine, the whole Island would return to its Duty towards its ancient and lawful Sovereign, if it was not for the Perfidy of some of the Chiefs of the Malecontents, who endeavour to foment the Spirit of Rebellion; and do their utmost to make it continue; and that one of the best Means to elude the Efforts of these Chiefs would be, by hindering all Foreign Ships from Landing in Corsica new Succours for the Rebels, and therefore the said Minister humbly requested, that his Majesty would be pleased to issue his Royal Orders, to prohibit his Subjects from giving any Assistance to the Corsican Rebels, in like Manner as his Majesty had been formerly pleased to do upon Applications of this Kind made by the said Minister, in the Fifth and Tenth Years of his Majesty's Reign—His Majesty having taken the said Memorial into his Royal Consideration, and being desirous of giving all further just and reasonable Satisfaction to his Majesty's said good Friends and Allies, the Republick of Genoa, and to maintain inviolably the Peace and Friendship subsisting between his Majesty and them, is hereby pleased, with the Advice of his Privy Council, strictly to charge and command, all his Majesty's Subjects, of what Condition soever they be, that they forbear to give, or furnish, Aid, Assistance, Countenance, or Succour, by any Ways or Means whatsoever, to any of the Inhabitants of the Island of Corsica in Rebellion against the said most Serene Republick, upon Pain not only of his Majesty's high Displeasure, but of suffering such Punishment as by Law may be inflicted on such as wilfully violate his Majesty's Treaties, and infringe the Peace and Friendship subsisting between his Majesty and any Foreign Princes or States—And to the End, that all his Majesty's Subjects may be informed hereof, it is his Majesty's Commands, that this Order be printed and published in the London Gazette.

The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for allowing Interest upon certain Debentures for the Bounty granted on the Exportation of Corn.

An Act to prevent Wines imported into any of the Out Ports of this Kingdom, being afterwards brought into the Port of London or Parts adjacent, without paying the London Duty.

An Act for the more effectual levying of the Duties upon Windows or Lights in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland.

An Act for enlarging and regulating the Trade into the Levant Seas.

An Act for Encouraging the Silk Manufactures of this Kingdom, and for securing the Duties payable upon the Importation of Velvets, wrought Silks, and Silks mixed with other Materials, not manufactured in Great Britain.

An Act for Encouraging and Improving the Manufactory of Linnen in the Highlands of Scotland.

An Act for more effectually preventing the fraudulent Removal of Tobacco by Land or Water, and for the Ease of the fair Trader in Tobacco; and for ascertaining the Rates payable for the Portage of certain Letters; and for amending and explaining the Laws relating to the Sale of Spirituous Liquors by Retail.

An Act for enforcing the Laws against Persons who shall steal or detain Shipwrecked Goods, and for the Relief of Persons suffering Losses thereby.

An Act for reducing the Number of Directors of the Corporation of the Governor and Company of Merchants of Great Britain trading to the South Seas, and other Parts of America; and for Encouraging the Fishery; and for Regulating the Election of the Governors and Directors of the said Company.

Genoa, April 17. Advice is received at Court, that one of our Men of War, cruizing off Pianosa, has fallen in with four Corsairs, which she attacked with such Success, that two of them were sunk, and the others obliged to sheer off. The Affairs of Corsica having become more critical since the French Troops left that Island, we are in continual Expectation of hearing that the Malecontents have begun Hostilities.

Rome,

Rome, April 17. The Pope, in order to promote the Commerce of the Ecclesiastical States; has, by an Edict published for that Purpose, declared, that for the future the Port of Ancona shall be deemed a free Port; that all Captains or Masters of Ships shall be at Liberty to enter the same, and to dispose of their Cargoes, without paying Duty; that all Merchants sending Goods thither by Land, shall have Leave to dispose of the same in like Manner; and that all Persons whatsoever, carrying Goods or Merchandize thither for Sale, shall have free Liberty to depart at all Times, without Molestation; and if any Disputes arise in Relation to the Sale of such Goods or Merchandize, they are to be determined by the Consul, &c. of the Nation to which the Owners thereof belong. They write from Perouse, that some Robbers had broke into the Monastery of St. Julien in the Night, and had carried off, in Plate, and other Things of Value, to the Amount of upwards of 20000 Sudis.

Toulon, April 24. Several of the Transports, that went under Convoy of his most Christian Majesty's Ship the Flora, to fetch the French Troops from Corsica, are already returned into this Port.

Brin, April 24. Prince Piccolomini, on whom the Empress Queen of Hungary has lately conferred the Command of the Troops in these Parts, has, since his Arrival, constantly employed himself in reviewing the Troops and visiting the Garrisons. 'Tis thought he will have finished this Business by the Beginning of next Month, when he intends to set out for Bohemia, in order to spend some Days at his Seat in that Country.

Stockholm, April 26. The King's Fever is quite gone off, his Majesty having felt no Symptoms of it for these three Days past; To-day he appeared in Publick, and seems in perfect Health; and having declared his Intention of setting out for Scania the Middle of next Month, the necessary Orders were immediately given for getting ready his Equipage. We have received the melancholy News, that the Town of Lidkoping, in Westrogothia, is almost reduced to Ashes by a dreadful Fire which lately broke out there.

Dresden, April 27. The Regiments appointed to form a Camp in the Neighbourhood of this City, have received Orders to repair to the Ground marked out for that Purpose on the 29th and 30th of next Month, and on the 2d of June the Reviews are to begin.

Vienna, April 28. Her Imperial Majesty having perused the Memorial she received from the Evangelick Body, in Favour of the Protestants of Upper-Austria, and of those of the Provinces of Styria and Carinthia, has signified her Intention to do all in her Power to regulate Things in such a Manner, as that they may not have the like Complaints to make for the future; and in Case her Endeavours should not have the desired Effect, those Protestants will be permitted to dispose of their Effects, and to retire into Hungary, here that Religion is more generally professed.

Berlin, May 1. The King set out this Morning for Silesia, accompanied by Prince Ferdinand his Brother, and the Prince of Brunswick. His Majesty has nominated M. Litzmann to the Post of Counsellor of War and Domains, in the Department of the New Marche, vacant by the Death of M. Reichow. The Margravine of Anspach set out from hence last Friday Morning, on her Return Home, the whole Royal Family accompanying her as far as Span-da We have received Advice, that the Mar-

riage of the Count of Solms-Baruth, with the eldest Daughter of the Prince of Anhalt Bernbourg, was celebrated on the 23d of last Month in the Castle of Baruth, on which Occasion there were great Rejoycings.

Versailles, May 3. The Ceremony of the Marriage of the Prince of Conde, with Mademoiselle Soubise; was performed here this Morning, in the Presence of the King and all the Royal Family.

Dusseldorp, May 4. Prince Frederick of Deux Ponts, having finished the Reviews of the Troops in this Dutchy, set out on Wednesday last for that of Juliers, in order to review the Regiments quartered there, from whence he intends going to spend some Time at the Court of Liege.

Utrecht, May 7. On Saturday last the Regiment of Horse of Field Marshal Count Maurice of Nassau, arrived here from Arnhem and Zutphen, in order to relieve that of Lieutenant General Baron Cannenbourg, which has been upwards of four Years in this Garrison; and Yesterday the said Baron Cannenbourg's Regiment marched from hence for Arnhem and Zutphen.

Hague, May 8. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland will open their Assembly Tomorrow, for which Purpose most of the Members are already arrived. This Morning her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, accompanied by his Serene Highness the Prince Stadtholder, and the Princess Caroline, and attended by a great Number of General Officers, and other Persons of Distinction, reviewed the Militia of this Place, who went through their Exercise to the entire Satisfaction of all present; after which they all filed off before her Royal Highness, who seemed greatly pleased with their Appearance and Behaviour. We are informed by Letters from Italy, that the Princess, of whom the Dutchess of Savoy was delivered last Year, died on the 17th of last Month.
