The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council-THEREAS Signior John Baptift Gastaldi, Minister of the most Serene Republick of Genoa, hath prefented a Memorial to his Majefty at this Board; representing, That ever fince the Re-establishment of Peace by the Treaty of Aix la Chapelle, the faid most Serene Republick, has taken all the Care possible, for settling such Regulations, as might fecure Tranquility in the Island of Corsica, which at present is the only Place in Europe, where the Troubles. are not entirely ceafed; That there is Reafon to imagine, the whole Island would return to its Duty towards its ancient and lawful Sovereign, if it was not for the Perfidy of some of the Chiefs of the Malecontents, who endeavour to foment the Spirit of Rebellion; and do their utmost to make it continue; and that one of the best Means to elude the Efforts of these Chiefs would be, by hindering all Foreign Ships from Landing in Corfica new Succours for the Rebels, and therefore the faid Minister humbly requested, that his Majesty would be pleased to iffue his Royal Orders, to prohibit his Subjects from giving any Affiftance to the Corfican Rebels, in like Manner as his Majesty had been formerly pleased to do upon Applications of this Kind made by the faid Minister, in the Fifth and Tenth Years of his Majesty's Reign-His Majesty having taken the faid Memorial into his Royal Confideration, and being defirous of giving all further just and reasonable Satisfaction to his Majesty's faid good Friends and Allies, the Republick of Genoa, and to maintain inviolably the Peace and Friendship subsisting between - his Majesty and them, is hereby pleased, with the Advice of his Privy Council, strictly to charge and command, all his Majefty's Subjects, of what Condition foever they be, that they forbear to give, or furnish, Aid, Affistance, Countenance, or Succour, by any Ways or Means whatfoever, to any of the Inhabitants of the Island of Corfica in Rebellion against the faid most Serene Republick, upon Pain not only of his Majesty's high Displeasure, but of fuffering fuch Punishment as by Law may be. inflicted on fuch as wilfully violate his Majefty's Treaties, and infringe the Peace and Friendship subsisting between his Majesty and any Foreign Princes or States—And to the End, that all his Majesty's Subjects may be informed hereof, it is his Majesty's Commands, that this Order be printed and published in the London Gazette. They write from Perouse, that some Robbers had broke into the Monastery of St. Julien in the Night, and had carried off, in Plate, and other Things of Value, to the Amount of upwards of 2000 Sudis.
