Lisbon, April 15.

HE Fleet bound for Goa, is ready to put to Sea, and will sail with the first fair Wind. They continue to make Preparations for the Departure of the Infanta, future Spouse to the Archduke Joseph; but the Persons who are attend her Highness, in her Journey to Vienna, are not yet named. A few Days ago two new Men of War, one of twenty, and the other of twenty four Guns, were launched at this Port.

Naples, May 1. There was a brilliant Court To-day at Portici, it being the Feast of St. Philip, whose Name their Majesties eldest Son, and the Duke of Parma, bear. Last Thursday two Tartanes and four Gallies put to Sea from hence for Sicily, having on board the Regiment of Royal Bourbon, which is going to be garrisoned in that Island, in the Room of another Regiment, which those Tartanes and Gallies are to bring back. The magnificent Palace that is . erecting, by the King's Order, at Caserta, is

carrying on with great Vigour.

Rome, May 5. Upon Advice that the Corfairs of Barbary have taken three of our Fishing Boats in the Canal of Piombino, Orders are sent to Civita Vecchia, to equip three of the Pope's Gallies, in order to give Chace to those Pyrates. The Departure of the Pope for Castel-Gandolfo, which was fixed for the 10th Instant, is put off to the Beginning of June. The Duke and Duichels of Wirtembourg, having seen every Thing remarkable in this City, intend to fet out on Monday next for Germany. Last Week a private Council was held at Cardinal Valenti's, Secretary of State, in which the different Kinds of foreign Specie, that are for the future to be current in the Ecclesiastical State, were finally regulated. On the 23d past, the new Bishop of Lipari, and the new Bishop of Borgo San Donino, were confecrated by Cardinal Porto-Carrero in the Church of St. Catherine de Sienne, in the Presence of several Cardinals, and other Presates.

Florence, May 6. The Hereditary Prince of Anspach is arrived here from Rome, and is trea-

\* I ted with great Politeness and Distinction by our principal Nobility. His Highness intends staying here only a few Days, to view the Curiolities of the Place, and then to return to Germany. We learn from Leghorn, that the Corsairs of Barbary are in great Numbers in the Canal of Piombino, where they have lately taken some Neapolitan Tartanes, and grealy interrupt the Navigation and Commerce.

Plasentia, May 7. Last Night the Infant Duke our Sovereign arrived here with a nume-. rous Retinue. His Highness proposes to stay till the End of the Week, and then to proceed to Colorno for the Summer. We have Advice from Modena, that the Prince, of whom the Hereditary Princess of that Name was delivered on the 4th of January last, died last Saturday of a Disorder which the Physicians imagined to be the Small Pox.

Saltzbourg, May 13. On Sunday last the new Prince-Archbishop of this Principality, made his publick Entry into this City with great Pomp

and Solemnity.

Vienna, May 13. Their Imperial Majesties having agreed to restore all the Artillery taken from Bavaria during the late War, they are now actually employed in embarking the same upon the Danube, in order to its being transported to Ingolstadt and Strawbengen. This being the Empress's Birth-Day, she was complimented thereupon by the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction. After which the following Promotions were declared, viz. Count Uhsefeld, to be Grand Master of her Imperial Majesty's Houshold; Count Caunitz Rittberg, to be Chancellor of the Court; Count Haugwitz, to be Great Chancellor of Bohemia; and Baron Bartenstein, to be Vice Chancellor; besides several other considerable Promotions.

Besancon, May 14. On the 6th Instant 2 Fire broke out in the little Town of Rochejean, which burnt with such Violence, that, in three Hours Time, upwards of 70 Houses were reduced to Ashes: Several Women and Children, and a considerable Number of Cattle, perished in the Flames.
