Lisbon, May 18.

THE Barbarian Corsairs having lately appeared on our Coasts, the Court has ordered two Frigates of 20 Guns each, to be fitted out, with all Speed, and to be sent in Quest of them.

Rome, June 1. It having been represented to the Pope, that the Wooll of the Growth of the Ecclesiastical State, is no less proper for the Use of the Manufactories of Cloth establish'd there, than what is imported from foreign Countries, he has prohibited the Exportation of it out of his Dominions, under very severe Penalties.

Genoa, June 1. By the last Dispatches from Barcelona, we are informed, that his Catholick Majesty, being resolved to put a Stop to the manifold Robberies of the Barbarian Corsairs, has sent Orders to his several Sea-Ports, for the putting to Sea of as many Men of War as may be requisite to form a Squadron of Ships, in order to destroy and deter those Infidels.

Venice, June 2. We have received the agreeable News of one of our armed Vessels having taken, in the Sicilian Seas, a Tripoly Corsair, with about thirty Christian Slaves.

Milan, June 6. The Duke and Dutchess of Wirtemberg arrived here from Turin on the 26th of last Month, and after a Stay of some few Days, proceeded on their Return home.

Warsaw, June 11. The Haydamacks continue their Robberies on the Frontiers of the Polish Ukraine, and our Government are taking the necessary Measures to put a Stop to their Incursions.

Genoa, June 11. On the 5th Instant an Express arrived here from Saint Remo, with Advice, that the Inhabitants of that Town and District had rebelled against the Republick, refusing to pay the Taxes imposed on them, as being contrary to the Convention made, when they put themselves under this Republick; they even went so far as to seize the Governor and his Guard, and keep them strictly confined, and immediately dispatch'd two Deputies to Milan, to crave Assistance, and to put themselves under the Protection of the Emperess Queen. Since the Receipt of this Advice, many Councils have been held, and it was resolved on the 8th Instant at Night to send four Gallies, two Gallies, two Pontoons, with two Mortars, and six Pieces of Cannon each, and to embark all the regular Troops in the City, to the Number of about 2000 Men, under the Command of M. Augustine Pinello, with Directions, that if the Inhabitants did not submit immediately at Discretion, and comply with every Thing that the Republick demands, to shew them no Mercy,

and lay the Town in Ashes. Yesterday 2000 Bomb Shells were embarked; and Handicrafts of all Professions are employed in getting ready the Armament, fitting the Barks for the Reception of the Troops, and shipping off Arms, Warlike Stores, Provisions, &c. Orders have also been given to the Country Militia and Citizens to prepare themselves to mount Guard daily, during the Absence of the regular Troops, as none of the latter will be left in the Town, but only one Battalion of Germans to guard the Palace. The Preparations are continued this Day with the greatest Expedition possible; and it is expected, that, in two or three Days, they will be ready to sail for Saint Remo, to reduce those People to Obedience.

Franckfort, June 12. The current Value of the various Coins throughout the Empire, is near being settled; and the Ministers who reside at Ratisbon for the Electoral Courts of Mentz, Saxony, Treves, Hanover, and Cologn, have delivered a Memorial to the Electoral Ministry of Bohemia, in which they not only declare that their Masters are all of one and the same Sentiment in respect to this Affair; but that they do not doubt, in Case her Imperial Majesty, as Queen of Bohemia, would be pleased to enter in their Views upon this Subject, her Majesty's Example would be followed by several other Princes and States of the Empire.

Cologn, June 12. They continue to raise with great Success in this Town, as well as in the neighbouring Parts of the Country, Recruits for the Imperial Troops, which are successively sent to the Regiments that are in Garrison at Luxembourg, and other Places of the Austrian Netherlands. The Baggage of Count Coloredo, whom their Imperial Majesties have appointed their Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of Great Britain, has passed through this Town, and it is reported, that that Minister will himself soon set out.

Franckfort, June 13. Three Companies of Grenadiers, belonging to the Troops of Hesse Darmstadt, have marched through our Neighbourhood to Giessen, in order to reinforce the Garrison of that Place.

Vienna, June 13. The Emperor sets out To-night for Hollitch, where his Imperial Majesty intends to stay for some Time, and will be accompanied thither by the Duke Charles of Lorrain. Count Uhlfeld, Steward of the Emperess's Household, is making Preparations for setting out with his Lady for Carlsbad, to use the Baths of that Place. Our Archbishop Prince Trautson, has issued a Mandate, enjoining Publick Prayers, in all the Churches of his Diocese, for Rain.
