Genoa, June 18.

BY Letters received from M. Pinello, who lately sail'd from hence with three Gallies, two Ships, a Bomb Ketch, and several Vessels laden with Mortars, Cannon, Ammunition, and Troops, under his Command, to reduce the Inhabitants of St. Remo to Obedience, we have Advice, that on the 13th Instant he appeared before that Place, which he found fortified with a deep Entrenchment along the Beach with eight Pieces of Cannon; and after having summoned the Inhabitants to surrender and deliver up the Governor and Officers whom they had confined, which they refusing to do, he that Afternoon ordered the Cannon to fire upon the Town; and in the Evening a great Number of Bombs were thrown: And the Troops being then landed at a little Distance, they the next Day attacked and took the Place. In this Engagement four Officers and ten private Men were wounded, and two private Men killed of the Republick's Forces. The Inhabitants of St. Remo had sent four Deputies to Turin, but having been refused an Audience, they were obliged to retire. Letters from Bastia of the 13th Instant mention, that several of the Pieves had sent their Chiefs to treat with M. Grimaldi, the Republick's Commissary General, for an Accommodation.

Copenhagen, June 26. The Troops concluded their Operations and Exercise last Saturday, and Yesterday the Camp broke up. His Danish Majesty seemed highly satisfied with their Appearance and Performances, every Thing having passed in the greatest Order. Tomorrow the Court removes again to Friedensburg for the Remainder of the warm Season; but it is believed they will return to their Residence in Town sooner this Year than usual, upon Account of the Queen's lying in, which is expected about the Month of October. Two Ships belonging to the Danish East-India Company are lately arrived here with the usual Lading from Canton.

Hambourg, June 29. According to our last Advices from Stockholm of the 22d Instant, his Swedish Majesty had begun again to take the Bark, which kept off the Return of the Ague.
