Moscow, June 12.

THE Reports that have been spread for some Time, that a considerable Body of the Troops of this Empire would be encamped this Summer, are verified; and accordingly several Regiments of Foot, Horse and Dragoons, are already in full March towards the Frontiers of Livonia, where they are to form a Camp consisting of 60,000 Men.

Naples, June 14. A Gang of Counterfeiters of Spanish Pistoles, and Species called Ounces of Sicily, having lately been discovered, were seized at Gaeta, and sent here Prisoners. The 30th past being the King of Spain's Name Day, and also that of the third Prince Royal, the same was celebrated at Portici with the usual Solemnity. Notwithstanding the Precaution taken by this Government of sending many armed Vessels to Sea, to cruize against the Barbary Pyrates, yet the Commerce of the King's Trading Subjects suffers much by the frequent Captures they make of their Vessels. On the 9th Instant M. Ursino, an Advocate of great Merit and Credit, took Possession of the Post of President of the Chamber of the Summaria, lately conferred on him by the King. Their Majesties and the Royal Family continue at Portici in perfect Health.

Rome, June 16. The Port of Fiumicino being extremely dangerous, the Pope has ordered the Plan of Pere Sambini to be examined, whether it can effectually render that Harbour more safe and commodious, in order to come to a final Determination about it. They are actually repairing Porto d'Anzio, under the Inspection of the Chevalier Michetti, Architect of the Ecclesiastical Chamber, agreeable to the Plan of M. Marechal, a French Engineer. A few Days ago the Corpse of the late Prince Corsini was landed at the Tyber from Naples, and was interred in the Vault of the Corsini Family, in the Basilick of St. John de Lateran. On the 11th the Prince of Ardore, the late Neapolitan Ambassador to the French Court, and his Family, arrived in this City from Paris, on his Return to Naples. The Duke of Modena having lately consented to the Disposal of the famous Statues at the Villa Este at Tivoli, four of the most valuable ones were purchased by the Pope,

and the rest by the King of Naples, to be placed in his Palace at Caserta.

Florence, June 22. Yesterday being the Festival of Corpus Domini, the two Members of the Regency, accompanied by the Senate, Magistrates, and the Knights of the Order of St. Stephen, attended the Procession as usual, in which the said Knights, both Secular and Ecclesiasticks, appeared in their long Habits of the Order, lately prescribed by the Emperor to be worn in publick Functions. As the Barbary Corsairs, during this Season, greatly infest these Seas, and frequently pursue Vessels to the Coasts of this State, Orders are come from Vienna to fit out one of the Emperor's Ships of War to cruize about, in order to prevent any Irregularities of that Kind, and to give Protection, indifferently, to any Vessel that may demand it, by putting itself immediately under the Cannon thereof, which is the most the Commander of that Ship of War can do, without offending the Regencies of Barbary, or acting contrary to the Treaties subsisting between the Great Duke of Tuscany and those States. The French Consul at Leghorn has notified to the French Merchants and Masters of Ships, the Orders of his Court relating to Corsica, which are agreeable to those which the King of Great Britain has been pleased to give by an Order in Council dated the 10th of May last, not to give Aid or Assistance, by any Ways or Means whatever, to the Inhabitants of Corsica in Rebellion against the Republick of Genoa. We hear that the General Pardon which the said Republick has promised to such of the Rebels, who, within a certain Time, should submit, has not yet produced any Effect.

Hambourg, July 6. The young Princes Corsini, who are on their Travels, and passed through this Place some Weeks ago for Copenhagen, are returned hither from that Court, and propose being in England about the Month of September next.

Whitehall, July 14.

The King has been pleased to nominate, constitute and appoint the Right Honourable John Earl of Ashburnham, to be Keeper of His Majesty's Park, called Hyde-Park, in the Room of the Right Honourable Thomas Earl of Pomfret, deceased.
