Naples, June 22.

HERE is a strong Report here, of a Combat having happened between rine Xebecks; of which last, one, 'tis ! Jaid, has been sunk, two taken, and the other three put to Flight. As this News is very interesting here, the Confirmation of it is expected with great Impatience.

Kiow, June 22. A great Body of Haydamacks having penetrated into the Russian Ukraine, Count Rasomossky, Captain General of the Cossacks, marched with several Regiments to oppose and disperse those Plunderers, in which he has so effectually succeeded, that he has entirely driven them from those Frontiers.

Alicant, June 24. According to our Advices from Barcelona, Commodore Don Francis de Horosco lest that Port on the 17th Instant, with three Men of War and two Frigates, in order to pass the Straits of Gibraltar, in Quest of four Algerine Corsairs, which have passed the same, with a View to disturb the Navigation of our Ocean-Coasts. Two Men of War from Cadiz are ordered to join the Commodore, to strengthen the said Squadron.

Madrid, June 26. The King has been * pleased to appoint Lieutenant General Don Francis-Xavier de Lanzos, to be Councillor at War; and, amongst other Military Promotions, Don Eustachio Duran, Governor of the Castle of Rosaleazar at Oran, has obtained the Government of Mazarquivit; and Lieutenant Colonel Don Pierre Guelfi, the Command of the second Battalion of the Regiment of Naples. His Majesty has also been pleased to grant the Place of Corrigidor of Salamanca, to Don Joseph de Mancha y Argote; and that of Guadiz and Baza to Don Juan-Antonio-Velmonte. Don Juliano de Arriago, President of the Board of Contractors for the Indies, and Intendant of the Navy at Cadiz, has acquainted the Ministry, that the two Register-Ships, St. Peter and Nuestra Senora de Mont-Carmel, sailed from thence on the 13th Instant for Vera Cruz; and another small Vessel, with Artillery and Ammunition, for Carthagena in America.

Genoa, June 30. In the Beginning of last Week there was an Election here of five new Senators, viz. The Marquesses Augustino Imperiali, Constant Pinelli, Joseph Doria, Giofour Gallies of Malta, and six Alge- vanni Antonio Spinola, and Sig. Giovanni Stephano Mousia. The Cavalier Augustino Pinelli, who has so happily succeeded in the Commission he was charged with against the revolted Inhabitants of St. Remo, is returned hither with the Gallies and other Vessels under his Command. The Master of a French Vessel, lately arrived here from Algiers, reports, that the Plague had broke out there the Beginning of this Month, amongst the Dey's own Domesticks, and had spread itself-throughout the whole Town with so much Violence, that a great Number of Perfons were daily carried off by it.

> Warsaw, July 3. Count Oginsky, Grand Marshal of Lithuania, passed thro' this Town some Days ago with the Countess his Lady, on their Journey from Prague to the Palatinate of Cracovia, where he his going to visit his Estates. The Disputes between the Clergy and Nobility of this Kingdom, are daily increasing, and give Room to fear, that they will be attended with very bad Consequences.

> Carlsbad, July 4. Amongst the great Number of Persons of Distinction, who are come here to use the Baths of this Place, there are lately arrived the Prince Bishop of Augsburg, the Count of Waldorff, the Baron of Asseburg, the Countess of Thun, the Count of Dohna, the Prince of Mansfeld, and the Count of Kokorsowa, Privy and actual Councillor of their Imperial Majesties.

Vienna, July 7. Their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by Prince Charles of Lorrain, and several Persons of Distinction, went on Saturday last to Neustadt, to see the Corps of Cadets perform their several Exercises, which gave great Satisfaction. Count de Bellasy having been appointed Chambellan to the Empress, took the usual Oaths last Wednesday upon that Occasion. The Departure of the Court for the Camp of Kittsee, is said to be fixed for Monday next; but it is still uncertain whether their Imperial Majesties will go to those which are soon to

to be formed in Bohemia and Moravia. There is Advice from Chemnitz in Hungary, that there had been a violent Storm, attended with Thunder and Lightning, by which several Combustibles in one of the Mines there had been set on Fire, and though it was with great Dissiculty put out, yet several Persons who were at Work therein, were sufficiently by the Smoak and Stench thereof.

Stockholm, July 8. The Senators Counts Tessin and Eckebladt, accompanied with Colonel Count Sparre, Baron Hopken, President of the Chancery, and Major General Count Lieven, fet out some Days ago, to see and examine the new Canal of Trolhatta, which, after much Labour and Expende, is finally brought to Persection. We have received Advice, that the Corps of 1200 Men, who were embarked some Time ago at Carlscroon, to relieve the Garrisons in Finland, were arrived at Helfingfors, one of the Ports in that Province. We have Advice from Gottenburg, that the Union, a Ship belonging to our East India Company, was arrived in that Port from Canton, which Place the failed from the 24th of December last: Her Cargoe is faid to be one of the richest that ever our Company received from thence.

Paris, July 9. The Camp which is to be formed within a few Days in the Neighbourhood of Compiegne, will be composed of no more than four Battalions of the King's Regiment, and one Battalion of that of the Royal Artillery; and is to be commanded by Lieutenant General Count Guerchy, Colonel of the first-mentioned Regiment. The Marechal de Camp, Joseph Lamoureulx de la Javeliere, died here some Days ago in the 88th Year of his

Berlin, July 10. The King having last Year received great Benefit from the Use of Pyrmont Water, his Majesty has begun to use the same again, at his Palace of Sans-Soucy. Prince Frederick-Francis of Brunswick-Wolfenbuttle, returned hither last Thursday Night from the Court of Denmark, and set out the next Day for Konigsberg, to join his Regiment.

Hague, July 19. The Court's intended Journey to Dieren, is put off for this Year.
