There is Advice from Chemnitz in Hungary, that there had been a violent Storm, attended with Thunder and Lightning, by which several Combustibles in one of the Mines there had been set on Fire, and though it was with great Difficulty put out, yet several Persons who were at Work therein, were suffocated by the Smoak and Stench thereof.

*Stockholm, July 8.* The Senators Counts Tessin and Eckebladt, accompanied with Colonel Count Sparre, Baron Hopken, President of the Chancery, and Major General Count Lieven, set out some Days ago, to see and examine the new Canal of Trolhatta, which, after much Labour and Expence, is finally brought to Perfection. We have received Advice, that the Corps of 1200 Men, who were embarked some Time ago at Carlscroon, to relieve the Garrisons in Finland, were arrived at Helsingfors, one of the Ports in that Province. We have Advice from Gottenburg, that the Union, a Ship belonging to our East India Company, was arrived in that Port from Canton, which Place she sailed from the 24th of December last: Her Cargoe is said to be one of the richest that ever our Company received from thence.

*Paris, July 9.* The Camp which is to be formed within a few Days in the Neighbourhood of Compiègne, will be composed of no more than four Battalions of the King's Regiment, and one Battalion of that of the Royal Artillery; and is to be commanded by Lieutenant General Count Guerchy, Colonel of the first-mentioned Regiment. The Marechal de Camp, Joseph Lamoureulx de la Javeliere, died here some Days ago in the 88th Year of his Age.

*Berlin, July 10.* The King having last Year received great Benefit from the Use of Pymont Water, his Majesty has begun to use the same again, at his Palace of Sans-Soucy. Prince Frederick-Francis of Brunswick-Wolfenbuttle, returned hither last Thursday Night from the Court of Denmark, and set out the next Day for Konigsberg, to join his Regiment.

*Hague, July 19.* The Court's intended Journey to Dieren, is put off for this Year.
