The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**H**IS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, That the Parliament which stands prorogued to Tuesday the Fourteenth of this Instant August, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-seventh Day of September next.

*Naples*, July 12. Their Majesties and the Royal Family continue at *Portici*, where was celebrated Yesterday, with great Splendor, la Fete de S<sup>te</sup>. *Amelie*, whose Name the Queen bears. *Don Alphonso d'Arossteque*, who arrived here some Days ago from the Court of *Madrid*, with the Character of Minister, will have, in a Day or two, his first publick Audience of the King. The Corsairs of *Barbary*, which, during the last Month, hovered about the Coasts of this Kingdom, are retired.

*Florence*, July 14. Agreeably to an Order which the Regency of this Dutchy received lately from *Vienna*, the Troops that were in the County of *Carpegna* are retiring; which gives Hopes, that the Differences which have for some Time subsisted between the Emperor our Sovereign and the Holy See, concerning the Fief, are at last adjusted to the mutual Satisfaction of the Parties interested.

*Prague*, July 18. *Don Joseph da Sylva*, formerly Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Portugal* to the States General, and appointed since by his most faithful Majesty to reside with the same Character at the Court of the King of the Two Sicilies, arrived here lately from *Dresden*, and is going to *Vienna*. We hear from *Streckow*, a Village situated in the Neighbourhood of *Tabor*, and belonging to *Prince Lobkowitz*, that there fell, some Days ago, a great Quantity of Hail, of such Bigness, that all the Produce of the Earth, for two Miles round, is entirely destroyed thereby.

*Copenhagen*, July 20. Two Men of War, which have been cruizing for some Time in the Mediterranean, the one commanded by Captain *Schinder*, and the other by Captain *Fisher*, returned into this Port a few Days ago, and are ordered to be disarmed and laid up. Count *Hamilton*, and several other Swedish Officers, who came hither to see the Camp formed by

our Troops in the Neighbourhood of *Frederichsberg*, are set out for their respective Posts.

*Vienna*, July 21. Their Imperial Majesties; who, with the Duke *Charles*, and the Princess *Charlotte of Lorrain*, were the 17th Instant at *Kittsee*, to see the Regiments of Hussars who are encamped in the Neighbourhood of that Castle, returned Yesterday in perfect Health to *Schonbrun*.

*Modena*, July 21. The Duke our Sovereign a few Days ago made a Tour to *Mirandola*, to view the Fortifications there, and to give Orders to make the necessary Repairs. His Serene Highness has also given Orders to repair the Works of other Places of this Dutchy.

*Cologne*, Aug. 2. The Count de *Colloredo*, whom their Imperial Majesties has nominated their Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Great Britain, has passed thro' this City; and is to take *Brussels* in his Way to *London*.

*Hague*, Aug. 2. The Margrave of *Baden-Dourlach*, on whom her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has conferred the Government of the City of *Arnheim*, vacant by the Death of Lieutenant General de *Rode van Heekeren*, is set out in order to make a Tour in *Germany*.

*Hague*, Aug. 7. By the last Letters from *Soefdyk*, her Royal Highness and Family continued in good Health.
