Madrid, July 24. Great Preparations are making at Court to celebrate To-morrow the Anniversary of the Birth of the Infant Cardinal, who then enters into the 27th Year of his Age. The King has been pleased to confer upon Don Jean Baptiste Ruiz Delgado, the Place of Corregidor and Governor of the City of Xijona, in the Kingdom of Valence; and upon Don Francis Xavier Solanor, the Post of Commissary of the Armies. Count Saint Marsan, who has resided at this Court for some Time, in Quality of Ambassador from the King of Sardinia, has received his Letters of Revocation; and, in Consequence thereof, is preparing to set out on his Return to this Court, in the Month of September next. The last Letters from Lisbon say, that two Men of War were equipping there with the greatest Diligence, to cruize upon the Corfairs of Algiers, which have lately appeared in the Mouth of the Tagus.

Turin, July 28. Count de Bellegarde, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland to this Court, having received his Letters of Revocation, had his Audiences of Leave of his Sardinian Majesty, and the Royal Family, on the 22d Instant, and is preparing to set out on his Return to Dresden. The King, in forbidding his Subjects to furnish the Malecontents of the Island of Corsica with Arms and Military Stores, has, at the same Time, demanded from the Genoese, that these Prohibitions should not expose the Ships under his Colours, who are provided with his Majesty's Passports, to be molested, under frivolous Pretexts, by the Ships of that Repub-

lick.

The Baron de Borseille arrived here last Sunday Evening from Middleburg, and fet out this Day to make a Tour to Amsterdam.
