WHEREAS His Majesty hath signified unto us his Royal Pleasure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued unto Tuesday the Twenty-eighth Day of August Instant, be further prorogued unto Tuesday the Ninth Day of October next, then to meet and sit for the Dispatch of Business; we do therefore publish and declare, that the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is hereby further prorogued unto Tuesday the Ninth Day of October next, and that the same shall be then held at Dublin, and sit for the Dispatch of Business; Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice, and to give their Attendance accordingly.

Moscow, July 21. The Empress is again returned to the Convent of the Trinity, to pass a few Days. Besides the Army which is assembled by her Imperial Majesty's Orders, in the Conquered Provinces; there continue to pass here a great Number of Troops, even of those which have their Quarters on the Frontiers of Turkey.

Naples, July 27. The Prince d'Ardoté, who lately return'd hither from his Embassy to the Court of France, gave, last Monday, a sumptuous Entertainment to the Foreign Ministers and several other Persons of Distinction.

Florence, July 28. The Emperor has appointed the Marquis del Riccio to be Commissary General of the Troops of the Grand Dutchy; They are to be reviewed by this Nobleman soon after his Arrival from Vienna, from whence he is hourly expected.

Milan, Aug. 2. Count Pallavicini, Governor of this Dutchy, and of the whole Austrian Lombardy, has received a Dispatch from Vienna, whereby the Empress Queen is pleased to appoint that General, Governor for Life, of the Castle of Milan, and to grant him all the Prerogatives and Honours which were formerly belonging to that Post. The Time of his present Government being to expire in September next, his Excellency will set out on the 29th Instant for Vienna, in order to make a Report of his Administration. Here are daily sad Accounts of the manifold Highway Robberies and other Excesses committed in this Neighbourhood.

Vienna, Aug. 4. Count Cobentzel, who is to succeed the Marquis de Botta d'Adorno, in the Post of Minister Plenipotentiary from the Empress-Queen, to the Government of the Austrian Netherlands, had Yesterday his Audience of Leave from their Imperial Majesties and Family, and is to set out To-morrow for Brussels. David Henry Joseph de Knock, Lord of Thepchowitz, Aulick Counsellor, died here on the 2d Instant, in the 61st Year of his Age.

Prague, Aug. 4. Great Numbers of Persons of Distinction continue to pass through this Town to the Baths of Carlsbad and Toplitz. The Regiments of Foot, which are to compose the Camp of Collin, are already arrived there; but the Cavalry is not expected to arrive till next Week.

Genoa, Aug. 6. We have an Account by the Master of a Vessel, that two Spanish Chebecks, which were cruizing off the Island of Majorca, had taken a Tunefine Corsair, on Board of which there were 30 Slaves.

Copenhagen, Aug. 7. Their Majesties, who have passed some Days at Jagerspreys, return'd from thence to Fredensbourg, where they intend to stay till the Beginning of next Month, whence their Majesties propose to return hither.

Dresden, Aug. 8. Their Majesties, accompanied with the Princes Xavier and Charles, set out the 2d Instant for Sedlitz, where was celebrated the next Day, with great Magnificence, the Feast of the Knights of the Order of the White Eagle.

Modena, Aug. 10. The Duke our Sovereign has been at Massa since the 3d Instant, from whence his Serene Highness is expected to return to Saffuolo next Tuesday. It is assured that the hereditary Prince will soon set out for Vienna, in order to receive, from the Emperor's own Hands, the Order of the Golden Fleece.

Dresden, Aug. 12. Their Majesties, with the Princes Xavier and Charles, returned hither the Day before Yesterday from Sedlitz in perfect Health. The Count de Bellegard, the King's Minister at the Court of Turin, is daily expected here on his Return from that Court. M. de Malzhan, the Prussian Minister at this Court, having received his Recredential Letters, is preparing to set out for the Court of Sweden, where he is appointed by his Prussian Majesty to reside in the like Character; and we daily expect to hear that his Prussian Majesty has named a Person to succeed him at this Court.

Berlin, Aug. 14. Last Thursday was celebrated at the Palace of Montbijou, the Anniversary of the Birth of the Prince of Prussia, who then enter'd into the 32d Year of his Age.

Hague, Aug. 20. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, the Prince Stadholder, and the Princess, continue in perfect Health at Soestdyk. Count William of Wartenleben is appointed Captain of a Company of Grenadiers in the Second Regiment of Orange Nassau. An Express is arrived from Ratisbon to acquaint the Field Marshal Duke Lewis of Brunswick Wolfenbuttle, that his Highness has been chosen to succeed the late Prince Maximilian of Hesse Cassel, in the Post of Field Marshal of the Imperial Troops of Augsburg.

Hague, Aug. 23. The Baron de Wassenauer, Colonel Commandant and Major of the Regiment of Foot Guards, Superintendent of the Dykes of Delfland, &c. died here Yesterday Morning, in the 36th Year of his Age.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Friday last, the 17th Instant, a Letter directed "To Mr. Browning, Woodcôt, at Epsom, "Surry", was received by the said Mr. Browning, by the General Post, the Words of which Letter are, as follow, viz. — "If you do not, immediately upon the Receipt of this, lay Twenty Pound, at the Foot of the Starting Post, upon the Downs, that it may be ready any Time of the Night, you may depend, that you or yours shall be treated with the utmost Severity, the first Opportunity that offers; so, beware, and comply with this Demand, or, expect my Vengeance, and take what follows, "from Y r X Z". — His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice, the Person or Persons principally concerned in writing and sending the said threatening Letter, as aforesaid, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, to any one of them, who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice, or Accomplices, therein, so that he, she, or they, being principally concerned in the same, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
