Naples, August 4.

A Few Days ago M. Dumontier, Captain of the Artillery, meeting the Chevalier Ruggiero in the Street, without any Provocation gave him a Slap on the Face; whereupon M. Ruggiero drew his Sword, and wounded him in two Parts of his Body. The Chevalier was immediately arrested, and strict Enquiry of the Fact having been made by Order of a Council of War, on their Report thereof to the King, M. Ruggiero was set at Liberty, and the Captain broke, and turned out of the King's Service. On the 25th Instant being the Birth-day of the Cardinal Don Lewis; and on the 26th being the Queen of Portugal's Name-day, the same were celebrated at Court with the usual Solemnity. The same Day died, aged 73, M. Galliani, the King's First Chaplain, in which Post M. de Roja, Bishop of Puzzoli, is appointed to succeed him. On the 27th two of the King's Frigates returned to this Port from a Cruize against the Barbary Pirates. On the 28th their Majesties went over to the Island of Procida, for the Diversion of shooting Pheasants; and after having shot upwards of Forty, returned to Town in the Evening. On the 22d of last Month his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Phoenix, commanded by the Hon. Capt. Hervey, enter'd this Mole from Leghorn, and after having loaded 50 Chefts of Spanish Dollars for Marseilles, sail'd again on the 31st.

Rome, August 4. Last Week arriv'd here from Spain, the Chevalier de Solis, to solicit from the Pope divers Bulls relating to Ecclesiastical Affairs, in Consequence of the Convention lately stipulated between the See of Rome and the Court of Spain. M. de Solis is furnished for that Purpose with the King's Credentials.
