Warfaw, Offob. 4:

F had, not long fince, a report here that the Moloures, who have a very great Army together, were marched to the relief of Haman, belieged by the Turks, who had thereupon quitted it 3 but two dayes fince we receive Letters of a quite contrary tenor: they fay, that for we know not what reason, the Moscovites had, on the fudden, repassed the Dniester, and were recreated, instead of relieving Haman, farther off: That thereupon the Turks had attacked the Besieged with greater fury, who, despairing of any succour had surrendred, upon promise of having their Lives and Goods faved; bilt this barbarous Enemy being Master of the place, without any regard to his Capitulation, put all the Inhabitants to the Sword, so that of 100000 Souls, very few remained alive, within the space of sew hours. This News afflicts us the more; for that it is accompanied with that of the Reither of the Molovies, from whose affiliance we did promise our selves very much. Our King is at prefent, at fimorowa on the Frontiers, but finds he wants both Men and money. The Grand Signior is in person in the Field, and, according to our last advices, was at Ladiftin.

Libon, Sept. 25. The ty inflant, our Armada came to an anchor in the Bay of Cafcais, having on board the King Alphonius, and that Night a Troop of Horfe was fent down to Cafcais; the next day the King came ashore, and was conducted to Cintra, where he remains.

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Venice, Octob. 6. Several Vessels arrived here from the Ar hipelago, tell us, That the Corfairs are abroad in considerable numbers, and very much disturb the Chri-Rians Trade; whereupon our Proveditor General Valier has sent several Gallies that way, to join with the Gallies of Maliha, &c. in order to the clearing the Sea of the faid Corfairs. The 16 instant, Signior Autonio Barbaro intends to part honce on his Embaffy to Rome, from whence we have advice of great differences arisen between the several Ambassadors, and the Court, about a new Impolition laid on all Forreign Merchandizes imported, greatly to the prejudice of the Ambassadors. After all, we begin to doubt the News we have had from several hands, of the arming of the Persians, and seem to think it onely to have been spread abroad by the Turks, to make the Poles less concerned to put them-Telves into a posture of desence, through the expectation they might have of the Twikt having a divertion from the Perfians on that fide. The Balla of Boffins makes great provisions to fend to the Ottoman Army

Madrid Oct b, 10. The 28 pail, arrived here the Marquels det Fresno, late Ambassador Extraordinary from this Crown in England, very weak, through his indisposition schowever, since his arrival, he hath received the Visits of all the Ministers and persons of Quality in this Court. We have not, as yet, any News of our New-Spain Fleet, and are somewhat concerned at it. The Commotions at Messing grow daily more violent, so that some extraordinary means must be used an com-

pose them. Lieutenant Admiral Pan Tremp is failed thither with his Squadron of Men of War, and will, we hope, afford us great allatance in order to the reducing that City; which if not done suddenly may, it's feared, have an effect as well upon the whole Kingdom of Sicily, as that of Naples.

Mirsciller, Oftob. 16. Yesterday came orders from his most Christian Majesty, for the sitting our with all speed twenty Men of War at Thoston, and twelve Gallies here; it is thought they are to be sent towards Messer, where, we hear, the Chevalier de Vallete is already arrived with nine men of War, and that the Inhabitants of that City have put themselves under his protection. There have lately appeared on the Coast of Catalonia a Squadron of about twenty Dutch Men of War, under the Command of Lieutenant Admiral Van Tromp, directing their course, as is supposed towards sittly.

Vienna, Octob. 7. In our last, we gave you an account of a Rencounter that had hapned between a party of timperial Troops under the Command of Colonel smidt, and the Baffa of Erla; since we have this farther particular, That the Turks had with them two pieces of Cannon, not without occasioning great ombrage here; for though the incursions which happen to be made on the Frontiers by the one or the other party in time of Peace, be not looked upon as an infraction of the Peace, yes in case the party that makes the inroad have Cannon with them, it has been alwayes looke upon as an infraction; fo that from hence many begin to conjecture, that the Ottomans defign to break with us. We are told, that the Sieur Burman, who is now Prifoner here, hach difcovered leveral matters of very great importance to the Emperours service. Prince William of Furstenbergh is to be removed hither from Menstadt, in order to his Tryal, in which he is to be affilted by two Advocates allowed him by the Emperour.

Strasburgh, Octob. 15. The 13 instant, the Artillery and Infantry of the Elector of Brandenburgh paffed the Rhine near Schaggmooten. The Artillery confilted, of forcy seven pieces of Cannon, and two Morgar-pieces: The next day the Cavalry passed the Rhine over our Bridge; the whole Army being composed of a 8000 fighting Men, belides the Troops of the Duke of Zell, Yellerday the Elector drew up his Army in Battalia, at which time arrived a Trumpeter from Monsieur de Turenne with Letters to his Electoral Highness. Yesterday the Lunenburgh Troops decamped from Graven Lidt, and this morning the Imperialifts under the Dake of Bours nonville from Ilkerken, and this day the Brandenburgh Army past the River Il at Arbogars, in order to their marching together against the Enemy, who lies between Walfinkeim and Saverce. This morning arrived here the Electoress of Brandenburgh, and we likewise expect the Blector Palatine. Monsieur de Turenne fortifies himself; And the Confederates endeavor to cut off the succours coming to him under Monsieur de Crequi.

Hamburgh, Odeb. 16. Our last Letters from spekholm gave us an account. That General Wrangel was embarked, in order to his passing over into Pomeren; so that we daily expect to hear of his arrival on this side:

Several Troops have arrived this Summer from Sweden; and we are told that in Pomeren; Bremen, and other their Territories in Germany, the Swedes have, at prefent, 20000 Men, ready to come together upon the first order. Our Letters from Sweden add, I hat that Chown is resolved to use all endeavours to procure a Peace this Winter between the warring Parties, but that if they have not the defired effect, that Crown will at Spring have an Army of 30000 Men, and employ the same against those that resuse the Reace. We have advice, That orders have been published throughout all the Territories of the Dukes of Lunenburgh, for the Countrey people to bring in all their Corn into the strong Towns, as if there was likelihood of an Army marching that way, of which we fee not as yet any appearance, and therefore wonder very much at these orders.

Lille, Octob. 23. The Prince of Conde is, at present, at Tournay, and will, as it's thought, continue there, till he hears the Enemy is gone into Winter quarters. According to our last advices the Spanish and Imperial Troops were still about Louvain. We this day expected here the Duke d' Enghien, but he came not; it is said, that the Prince of Conde may in sew dayes return to Pa is.

Ghest, Odob. 23. On Thursday last, the Governour and Souldiers which the Count de Souches had the beginning of this Campagne put into the Castle of Dinant on the Meufe, were surprized and driven out by the Inhabitants of that City; the manner thus: He that was formerly Governor of the Calle, and most of his Souldiers being Burgers of the Town, were permitted when Count Souches took the place, to remain Inhabitants there; and having fince contracted a great familiarity with the imperial Governour and Sou diers, on Thursday laft the Governour and many of the Souldiers, it being a Feltival, were invited out to Dinner, and in the mean time, several of the Burgers, who had privately gor into the Castle, possessed themselv soi it, a ter having killed about twelve of the Imterial Soulciers, and drove the rest and the Governour out of To B; his / xcellency is much concerned hereas, this place being of great importance to the Spaniaris or several accounts. The Imperialists are still about Die; and Tillemont. We are told, that his Excellency has fent another message to Count Souches, to press his departure out of these Countries, which suffer so extremely by the great violences committed daily by his Souldiers. We hear that the Prince of Conde having fent part of his Army to reinforce Monsieur de Turenne, and put the rest into Winter quarters, will fuddenly teturn to Paris. From Germany they write, That the Elector of Brandenburgh was joined with the other Confederater, and that they marched towards Monsieur de Turenne, so that we expect to hear by the next of some great action.

Last Night we made another Attick, which cost us many men. We are, at present, lodged on one side of the Counterscarp, and the Enemy on the other. Yesterday the French made a Sally; but we having notice of it by a Deserter, received them very warmly. We are preparing for a general Storm, and are at work to undermine the Enemies Mines. The 17 instant, Lieutenant-Colonel Linden was kill'd with a Cannon Bullet. By a Prisoner taken two dayes since, we understand the Besieged have lately mustered 1600 Men.

Hagne, Ollob. 23. Grave holds out still, notwithstanding the Prince of Orange acts with all possible vigour. Our last Letters from thence, were dated on Sa-

turday last, and told us, That the Night before, the Resiegers had made another attack; That, after a long and tharp dispute, they had taken a new Post on the Counterfearp, when she Enemy foringing a Mine, with a great flaughter; dispossessed them again; yet so as to make that Polt useless as well to themselves, as the Besiegers. On Saineday Night another attack was intended to be made, but, we know not yet what success it had ; however; notwirfiftanding this vigorous resistance, we cannot doubt but that the place will be fuddenly furren-dred, feeing they within donor expect any relief; for part of the Dutch Forces that were in Flanders, are fo quartered in several Posts between Grave and Mac-striebi, as to hinder (as is faid) all succours from thence. We are told, that the Raedt Penfionary Fagel write the 19 instant to the States, That he was of opinion the place would be furrendred by Sunday; but as fet we hear not any thing of it. Another part of the Prince of Orange's Army is arrived at Dort, and will be difpofed into Winter-quarters. The Emperour, it is faid, has written to the Prince of Orange, as well as to the Count de Monterey, in answer to their Letters to him concerning the raising the Siege of Audenard and other miscarriages this Campagne, to the fatisfaction of his Highness, and his Excellency. Qur Letters from Girmany, give us an account of the conjunction of the Elector of Brandenburgh's Forces with the rest of the Confederates, and that they were marching towards Monsieur de Turenne, who was encamped near Wassenbe m, about two Leagues from Strasburgh; some Letters seem to mention, as if the other confede atcs were somewhat jealous of the Duke of Bournonville, occasioned by his backwardness to engage the French Troops, in the late Fight, near Strasburgh. The swedish Ambaffador continues, with much earnelinels, to preis the States in the matter of the Preliminaries of a general Peace, and first as to the nominating a place for the renewing the Conference in order to it; but, it is thought, no-

thing will be done till the Prince return hither.

Pain, 02105. 24. We are told, That the last Ordinary from Germany brought Letters from Monsieur de Iurenne, giving an account that the Elector of Brangen-burgh had, with his Army, passed the Rhine at Strafburgh, and joined the other Confederates, who now together make an Army of between Forty and Fifty thou-tand fighting men; That he was encamped within a League and kalf from them; That being much weaker in number, he had fortified his quarters, and planted his Cannon on a certain hill, and ordered all other matters, as that he might receive the Enemy with the most advantage, in case they should artack him. It is said that Monsieur de Turenne has, at present, with him about 25000 Men, and expects daily a very confiderable reinsorcement under the Command of Monsieur de Gregui and other Troops fent by the Prince of Conde from his Army in Flanders. The Process against the Chevalier de Robin. Prisoner in the Bastile here, is in hand, and will be fuddenly finished. On Monday last the Court removed from Versailles to St. Germans. Monsieur de Chamilly Governour of Grave, is very much commended here for his so vigorous defending of that place, though we expect every day to hear of its furrender 5 and some fay the King has fent him orders fo to do, when he thought The Prince of Conds will be fuddenly here.
