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Warfaw, Oftob. 4:

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E had, not long fince, a report here the the Molebures, who have a very great Army together, were marched so the relief of Haman, befieged by the Turks, who had thereupon quitted it ; but two

dayes fince we receive Letters of a quite contrary tenor : they fay, that for we know not what reason, the Mofcovites had, on the fudden, repassed the Dniefter, and were retreated, instead of relieving Haman, farther off: That thereupon the Turks had attacked the Befieged with greater fury, who, defpairing of any fuccour had furrendred, upon promife of having their Lives and Goods faved; bilt this barbarous Enemy being Master of the place, without any regard to his Capitulation, put all the Inhabitants to the Sword, fo that of 100000 Souls, very few remained alive, within the space of few hours. This News afflicts us the more; for that it is accompani-ed with that of the Retriet of the Molovines, from whole affiliance we did promile our felves very much. Our King is at prefent, at Fimorowa on the Frontiers, but finds he wants both Men and money. The Grand Signior is in perfon in the Field, and, according to our last advices, was at Ladifzin.

Libbon, Sept. 25. The 17 inflant, our Armada came to an anchor in the Bay of Cafcuis, having on board the King Alphonfus, and that Night a Troop of Horfe was feat down to Cafcais; the next day the King came ashore, and was conducted to Cintra, where he remains.

and was conducted to Ginna, where he remains. Venice, Ottob. 6. Several Vessels arrived here from the Ar hipeligo; tell us, That the Corfiers are abroad in confiderable numbers, and very much diffurb the Chri-Rians Trade ; whereupon our Proveditor General Valier has fent feveral Gallies that way, to join with the Gallies of Muliha, &c. in order to the clearing the Sea of the faid Corfairs. The 16 inftant, Signior Autonio Barbaro intends to part hence on his Embaffy to Rome, from whence we have advice of great differences arifen between the feveral Ambaffadors, and the Court, about a new Impolition laid on all Forreign Merchandizes imported, greatly to the prejudice of the Ambaffadors. After all, we begin to doubt the News we have had from several hands, of the arming of the Pe fians, and feem to think it onely to have been fpread abroad by the Turks, to make the Poles lefs concerned to put them-Telves into a pollure of defence, through the expectation they might have of the Trikt having a diversion from the Perfians on that fide. 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Mirscilles, Oftob. 16. Yesterday came orders from his most Christian Majefty, for the ficting our with all speed twenty Men of War at The 110n, and twelve Gallies here; it is thought they are to be fent towards Meffina., where, we hear, the Chevalier de Vallette is already arrived with nine men of War, and that the Inhabitants of that City have put themfelves under his protection. There have lately appeared on the Coalt of Caudonia a Squadron of about twenty Dutch Men of War, under the Command of Lieutenant Admiral Wan Trong, directing their courfe, as is suppoled, towards sticity.

Vienna, Octob. 7. In our last, we gave you an account of a Rencounter that had hapned between a party of 191perial Troops under the Command of Colonel smidt, and the Baffa of Erla; fince we have this farther particular, That the Turks had with them two pieces of Cannon, not without occasioning great ombrage here; for though the incursions which happen to be made on the Frontiers by the one or the other party in time of Peace, be not looked upon as an infraction of the Peace, yes in cafe the party that makes the inroad have Cannon with them, it has been alwayes lookt upon is an infraction; fo that from hence many begin to conjecture, that the Ottomans defign to break with us. We are cold, that the Sieur Burman, who is now Puisoner here, hath difcovered leveral matters of very great importance to the Emperours fervice. Prince Williem of Furftenbergh is to be removed hither from Menfladt, in order to his Tryal, in which he is to be affilted by two Advocates allowed him by the Emperour.

Strasburgh, Oftob. 15. The 13 inftant, the Artillery and Infantry of the Elector of Brandenburgh paffed the Rhine near Schaggmoolen. The Artillery confilted, of forty feven pieces of Cannon, and two Mortar-pieces. The next day the Cavalry paffed the Rkine over our Brilgesthe whole Army being composed of a 8000 fighting Men, befides the Troops of the Duke of Zell, Yellerday the Elector drew up his Army in Battalia, at which time arrived a Trumpeter from Monfieur de Turenne with Letters to his Electoral Highness. Yeller day the Lunenburgh Troops decamped from Gravenfladt, and this morning the Imperialifts under the Dake of Bours nonville from Ilkerken, and this day the Brandenburgh Ariny paft the River II at Arbogars, in order to their marching together against the Enemy, who, lies between Walf in cim and saverce. This morning arrived here the Electorefs of Brandenburgh, and we likewife expect the Blector Palatine. Monfieur de Turenne fortifies himfelf ; And the Confederates endeavor to cut off the fuccours coming to him under Monfieur de Crequi.
