*Naples, August 14.*

**A** FEW Days ago the Marquis Brancaccio, Superintendent and Secretary of the King's private Revenues, having resigned his Employment, the King gave it to the Marquis de Gregorio, who on the 7th Instant took Possession of it accordingly. On the 8th and 11th Instant their Majesties went over to the Island of Procida to shoot Pheasants, and returned to Court in the Evenings. On the 9th Notice from M. Martinez, Commander of the Squadron of the King's Xebeck Cruizers, came to the Secretary of State's Office, that on the 30th past, off Brindisi, on the Coast of Calabria, he had taken a large Tripoline Row Boat Cruizer, mounted with 4 Cannon, and about 50 Men; whereof ten were killed in the Engagement, as many mortally wounded, and the rest made Captives.

*Rome, Aug. 18.* The Pope, to provide against the Scarcity of Silver Species in the Country, has consented to the Proposal of the Congregation of the Treasury, for Coining into Crowns, Half Crowns, and two Paols Pieces, the Lingots of Plate and Pieces of Eight for a Million and Half of Crowns, deposited in the Castle of St. Angelo, which were lately remitted from Spain, in Consequence of the Treaty concluded between the Catholick King and the Pope, as an Equivalent for yielding to the former the Disposal of such Ecclesiastical Benefices in his Kingdom, as are stipulated in the said Treaty. On the 11th anchored at Civita Vecchia, by contrary Wind, from Naples, two Neapolitan Gallies, escorting a Convoy of Transport Vessels with Troops to relieve the Garrisons of the Presidii. On the 12th anchored likewise at Civita Vecchia two of the Pope's Gallies, on their Return from a Cruise on the Coast of Calabria, and, after having refitted, put again to Sea in Pursuit of the Barbary Pirates. On the 13th Cardinal Mellini had a long private Audience of the Pope to communicate to him the Commissions he was charged with from the Court of Vienna. The Pope, to compleat the Dispositions to fill up the Vacancies in the College of Cardinals, in which the Nuncios at the Courts of crowned

Heads are included, in the last Week caused the Lifts, with the Names of the Prelates whom he has destined for their Successors, to be sent to the different Courts, in order to receive their Approbation.

*Liege, Aug. 26.* The Lady of Count Uhlfeldt, Grand Master of the Empress Queen's Household, arrived here this Afternoon from Spa, where she had been drinking the Waters for some Time, and intends to proceed Tomorrow on her Journey for Vienna by the Way of Brussels; at which Place she will make a Stay of eight or ten Days.

*Madrid, Aug. 27.* The Baron de Wense, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, left this Place on Thursday the 23d Instant, without taking Leave of their Catholick Majesties, on Account of the Disputes subsisting between the King his Master and this Court, with regard to the Treaties, which the Danes are engaged in with the States of Barbary. The Marquis de Grimaldi, who has lately been appointed Ambassador to the States General, will have Leave to make a Tour into Italy, before he sets out for the Hague. The great Drought, which has entirely destroyed the Harvest this Year, in almost every Part of this Kingdom, still continues; and publick Processions are again ordered to be made for Rain.

*Stockholm, Aug. 27.* M. de Malzhan, who was formerly the King of Prussia's Minister at the Court of Dresden, and who is now to reside at this Court, in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from that Prince, arrived here some Days ago, and is forthwith to have his first Audiences of the King and the Royal Family, the Baron de Rhodt, whom he succeeds, being to set out for Berlin as soon as possible.

*Bern, Aug. 29.* M. Chavigny's Letters to the Intendant of Franche Comté, relating to the Incursions of the Peasants of Burgundy on the Territory of this State, and the several Outrages committed by them, have already produced the Effect, and procured the Canton of Bern all the Satisfaction they could reasonably expect or desire; and as it is not questioned but the Court of France will approve and more amply confirm what has already been done in order thereto, that Affair, which has occasioned

so much Buffle and Uneasiness here, may now be looked upon as entirely at an End. The Intendant, on receiving the French Ambassadors Letters, repair'd immediately to the Place where the Excesses complain'd of were committed, having previously invited the Bayliff of Nyon to meet him there; and after the most severe Reprimand to the Curate, who was suspected to be the Instigator of those Acts of Violence, as well as to the Subaltern Officers who connived at them; and after imprisoning the only one of the Ringleaders, who had not made his Escape, he order'd the Cattle that had been carried off to be returned. He farther sentenced those who were concerned in this Depredation, to pay 600 Livres for Damages; and publickly declared, that if ever they obliged him to make another Journey thither on the like Occasion, as many as were concerned should be hanged on his Arrival. With Regard to the Cattle, which the Swiss Subjects had taken by way of Reprisal, the Intendant left it entirely to the Option of the Bayliff of Nyon to keep or return them as he should think proper: But M. Sturler, who would not be behind Hand, ordered them immediately to be sent back and delivered to the Owners.
