Florence, August 25.

WE learn from Lombardy, that the Duke of Modena is making the necessary Dispositions to take Possession of the Government of Milan, which Ceremony it is said is fixed for next Month; and that on the 18th Instant, on his Return from Massa and Carrara, he had performed the Ceremony at Sassolo, to invest the Hereditary Prince of Modena his Son with the Order of the Golden Fleece, lately conferred on him by the Emperor.

Stockholm, Aug. 25. The King's Journey for reviewing the Troops in the several Provinces, is fixed for To-morrow. It is assured that the Queen, whose Delivery is expected in about a Month, will lye-in at Drotningholm. There has been a Mutiny in the Regiment of Foot Guards, occasioned by the Subalterns not paying due Respect to their superior Officers, for which about 60 of them have been put under Arrest.

Copenhagen, Sept. 1. Great Preparations are making at Friedensburg to celebrate, on the 4th Instant, with Splendor, the Anniversary of the Birth of the reigning Queen. The two Ships of War, the Heron and the Christianbourg, who were sent some Time ago to the Coast of Africa, one under the Command of M. de Fontenay, the other of M. Lutrau, are returned from thence, and a few Days ago came into this Port, where they are ordered to be laid up. Lieutenant Colonel de Longueville, who was on board one of the above Men of War, has been seized by an express Order from the King, and there is little Appearance that his Affairs will take a favourable Turn, it having been laid to his Charge, that he has greatly surpassed the Orders which his Majesty gave him.

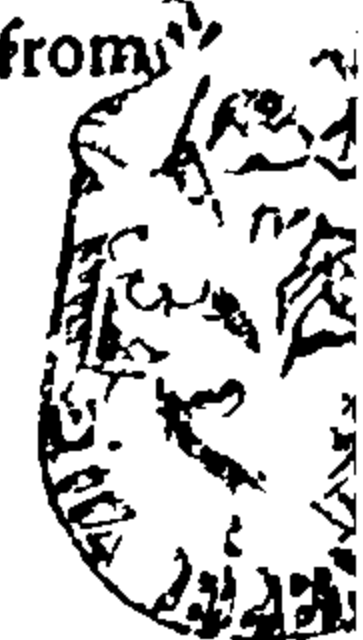
Copenhagen, Sept. 8. The 4th Instant, being the Anniversary of the Queen of Denmark's Birth-Day, there was a numerous Court at Friedensburg, but no Promotions were made on that Occasion. On the 6th Instant their Danish

Majesties, with the Princess Charlotte, left that Place, and after having dined with the Queen Dowager at Hirschholm, arrived the same Evening at their Winter Residence, the Palace of Charlottenburg, in this City. The Prince Royal, and the young Princesses, returned hither likewise the same Evening, in perfect Health. The Queen Dowager is not expected till near the approaching Labour of the reigning Queen, whose Reckoning it is said will be out about the End of this Month. The King is not yet settled in Town, his Majesty proposing to go every Monday Evening to Jagersburg, and to return the Thursday following, as long as the Hunting Season continues; so that the Council will be held for the future twice a Week, as the usual Method is, when his Majesty resides in the Neighbourhood of this Place. Baron Wedel, who is in the Service of the King of Great Britain, as Elector of Hanover, being arrived here upon some private Family Affairs, was Yesterday presented by Mr. Titley, his Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary at this Court, to his Danish Majesty, and was received in a most gracious Manner.

Berlin, Sept. 4. The King has made several Military Promotions since the Beginning of this Month, and amongst others has conferred on M. Malakowsky the Regiment of Hussars, late under the Command of M. de Billerbeck, who, on Account of his great Age, has obtained Permission to retire from the Service.

Turin, Sept. 5. Last Sunday Morning her Royal Highness the Dutchess of Savoy was safely delivered of a Princess, who was immediately christened by the Cardinal de Lances, their Royal Highnesses the Duke of Chablais, and the Princess Louisa, second Daughter to his Sardinian Majesty, being the Sponsors. It was little expected that her Royal Highness would be brought to Bed so soon, as the Day before she was at the publick Walk, as usual, with the rest of the Royal Family, and her Royal Highness continues perfectly well since her Delivery. On this Occasion the Prince of Piedmont was sent for

from Moncalier, where he has been this Summer for the Benefit of the Air; and his Royal Highness's Health is much mended. The Marquis de Crussolle passed through this Place last Week in his Way to his Post at Parma; though his Stay here was only twenty-four Hours, he was presented to his Sardinian Majesty, and the rest of the Royal Family. The Neapolitan Ambassador has declared his being appointed Ambassador to the French Court, and that he is to be succeeded here by M. Carraccioli, who is now Minister at Paris.

Hanau, Sept. 8. Our Serene Sovereign the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, who has been to drink the Water at Schlangenbad, is returned in perfect Health.

Brussels, Sept. 10. The Syndycks of the different Bodies of Tradesmen in this City, have had several Meetings to consider of some new Proposals which have been made to them by the Government. It is assured, that as soon as M. Neny is returned from the Court of Vienna, the Conferences, which had been opened here, will be reassumed, for regulating the Affairs of the Barrier and Tariff. The Viscount d'Oudenaerde, Son to Count Lalaing, returned here some Days ago from Vienna, and is preparing to go to take Possession of the Employment of Bayliff of Bruges, which the Empress Queen has been pleased to confer upon him.

Hague, September 11. We have received Advice from Soestdyck, that the first Princess Dowager of Orange arrived there Yesterday in the Evening in perfect Health, and was received by their Royal and Serene Highnesses with Marks of the most tender Affection. The Marquis de Bonac, Ambassador from France, received this Morning an Express from his Court, with the agreeable News, that the Dauphiness was happily delivered the 9th Instant of a Prince, who is to have the Title of Duke of Aquitaine.

Hague, Sept. 13. The States of this Province, who opened Yesterday their ordinary Assembly, have continued this Day their Deliberations. The Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty are likewise employed here in the Affairs of that Department. The Marquis de Bonac, Ambassador from France, delivered Yesterday a Letter from the King his Master, to the President of the Assembly of the States General, in which his most Christian Majesty notifies to their High Mightinesses the Birth of a Prince, of which the Dauphiness had been happily delivered on the 9th Instant. The Ambassador has been complimented on this Occasion in the Name of the States General, who intend to write a Letter of Congratulation to his most Christian Majesty on this happy Event. The Baron de Grovesteins, who returned a few Days since from his Government of Ypres, set out this Morning for Soestdyck; and Baron de

Schwartzenberg, Governor of Namure, who has been here for some Days, proposes to set out To-morrow for his Government.
