Prince of Brantinburgs and this day had Audience of. the Emperor; It is faid, his coming is on occasion of fome differences between the Generals of the Confederate Tracos, near Sarasburg; athechief Command whereof will be given to the Elector of Brandonburgh. To morrow the Extraurdinary Ambassadon of Sweden will, make his publick Entry here.

Cobleniss Offer. 18. The 13 inflant the Elector of Brandendurg paffed the Rhyne at Strasburg, with his Army, which confifts in 18000 Men, and his Artillery in appieces of Cannon, and two Montaf pieces ; the n exe coulie dress up bis Army in Batallia, in the prefener of the Generals of the Imperial, Lorrain, and Lunenburg Troops, whom he afterwards entertainediat Dinner ; Ous Louers dated the by as Strasburg, tell us, That the Confederates, who together make a Body of 50000 Men, were on their march rowards Monfieur de Turenne, who was encamped at Marleym., about three Leagues from Strasburg, fo that we are in much expectation to hear of fome great action, and the rather's for that we have news by fome Gentlemen dome from Strasburg, that the Armies were already within fight of one another, when they left that place. There be some Letters wom the Confederates Camp which feem to fay, that the backwardness of the Duke of Bournonville in rie lato Battel of Erskeim, 19 engage the Imperial Troops, notwithstanding those of Lunenburg were fo hard pay to it, has occasioned great jealoufie of him among the other Generals, though on the other fide it is faid, that the ground would not permit them to come into Fight, and fecond the Lunenburghs, as they intended.

Strasburg, Oftob. 19. The Confederates having fince the 15 inflant, lain within a League or thereabouts of Monsieur de Turenne's Camp at Marleym, and having in a Council of War refolved to attack him in his Post, yesterday they decamped, whereupon Monsteur de Turenne likewise test his Quarters, and marched nearer to Saverne; This morning, according to the advice we receive at this inflant, the two Armies were almost within fight of each other, fo that we are still in expectation to hear of a Basel. On Saturday laft she Mareichal de Crequi joynod Monsieur de Turcane with 5000 Gentlemen of the Arrierban, and we are sold that in few days Monfieur de Turenre expocts another reinforcement, under the Command of the Marquis de Gentis : On Monday last arrived here the Rlector Palatine, and the next day went to the Army ; This morning the Electoral Prince Palatine paffed our Bridge with 1, 500 Horle, and followed his Father. The 4000 Men of the Duke of Zell are just now likewife palling the Rhyne.

cologue, Oftob. 19. Several Pattengers arrived from Bon, give as an account, that the Imperialifis have Tarely cealed to work on the Fortifications there, and that at the fame time, by order of the Elector of Cologne his Electoral Highness did for merly constantly relide; from whence most people argue, that the Treaty of Ac commodation between the Emperor and his Electora Highnels is in a fair way to be concluded; which our laft Letters from Vienne gave us fome farther encouragement to believe; and add, that Prince Willem of Furfienberg had been brought thither prifoner from Newflads and that the general report was, that his affairs were in an ill posture.

Ditio, Colub. 23. Our Letters fiom Strasbur; & dated the 19 inftant, advile, That the 15 inflant, the Con federates decamped from their Quarters near strafe burge, and marched towards Monticur de Turenne, who was, golted at Marleim; and that they approached for near the Franch Camp, as to be able to shoot into it from a Cannon 3 That the 18, the Armies were drawn up in Battalia on both fices, fo that it was expected they would have engaged, but they did not ; That the next Morning, Monfieur de Turenne decamped, and retreated fomewhat farther off, but that at the coming away of these Letters, the two Armies were fo near each other, that it was thought they could not avoid fighting, Our Letters from Vienna tell us, That the Process spainit the Prince of Furflenberg was carried on with great camefinefs, and that it was thought they would in few That dayes proceed to pass sentence against-him. the Secretary of the Prince I obcowits firft Minifler of State in that Court, had been apprehended, and that his Papers having been examined, feveral matters have been discovered, in which four or five principal perfons of Quality are concerned. The fame Letters add, That the Emperour has recalled the Count de Souches, and given the Command of his A1my to General sporke, till fuch time as the Count de Montecutuli artives at it, who is to have the Supreme Command of his Imperial Majeflies Forces ; but it is generally thought that Menternculi will not go to the Army till Spring, in cale the War continue, which in the mean time is to be Commanded by General Sperke.

Nancy, Oflob. 23. The 13 and 14 inflant the Troops of the Elector of Brandenburg peffed the Rhyne at Strasburg, and joyned with the other Confederates; The 17 Nonfieur de Grequi arrived, and joyned Monfieur de Turenne with 48 Squadrons of Cavalry ; the 19 the Confederates quitted their quarters near Strasburg, and marched towards Vanzenam, as if they had deligne upon Hagyeners, which obliged Monsieur de Turenne to decamp likewife, and to go and post himfelf near Och+ feldt about an hours march from Haguenaw; The 25 or 26 the Marquis de Genlis is expected to arrive at Saverne with the Forces under his Command. We have just not advice that Monlieur de Turgone and the Confederates are within two Leagues of each other, fo that there muft needs happen some suddain aftion between them.
