

repair to Ratibon, there to reside as his most Christian Majesty's Minister. The Queen of Denmark has felt some Symptoms of her approaching Labour, which is now daily to be expected, the Term of her Majesty's Reckoning being expired.

*Copenhagen, Oct. 6.* Prince Ferdinand of Wolfembutte is arrived here to visit the Queen his Sister, and proposes to stay here the whole Month of November. His Highness lodges in the Palace, and has dined and hunted with the King, and is treated with great Kindness and Regard.

*Genoa, Oct. 1.* By the last Letters from Bastia, there is Advice of the Arrival there of four Deputies, on Behalf of the Malecontents, who were politely received by M. Grimaldi, the Republic's Commissary General, assuring him of the great Desire the People of the Island had to return to their Obedience under the Republic: They likewise presented to M. Grimaldi a List of the Capitulations they demand, (which are the same as those they gave to M. de Cursay) and he has transmitted them to this Republic. M. Grimaldi was fully resolved to have quitted his Command, and a large Fleet was at Bastia to bring him back, but the Deputies waiting on him unexpectedly, he staid for an Answer from the Republic to the Demands made by the Deputies; and it is said that the Republic have desired him to remain there a while longer; but this will depend upon their Answer, which perhaps may be favourable for the Malecontents. The Republic continue to augment their Troops by new Levies, in which they are successful, and are greatly facilitated by the Desertion from the Garrisons of Tortona, Alexandria, &c. who are immediately enlisted by the Republic's Officers, and sent either to Corsica, or to the Garrisons of Porto Specia. Last Night General Pallavicini arrived at the Marquis Durazzo's House at Polcevera, escorted by a Body of Hussars, where his Nuptials are to be celebrated.

*Milan, Oct. 1.* They continue here to make great Preparations for the Reception of the Duke of Modena, who is expected for certain the End of this Month, to come and take the Character of Governor General of Austrian Lombardy.

*Vienna, Oct. 3.* The Prince of Modena arrived here on Sunday Evening; but Monday being one of the Anniversaries of the late Emperor Charles XVII. on which the Empress Queen sees no Company, his Highness did not see their Imperial Majesties till Yesterday in the Morning, when he had his Audiences of the Emperor and Empress, in the same Manner as the Ambassadors of crowned Heads; and after they were over, and his Visits to all the Royal Family, he had the Honour to dine with their Imperial Majesties without Ceremony, and in

the Way that Persons of Distinction, as well Strangers as those of the Country, are daily admitted. In the Afternoon his Highness made Visits to the two Chancellors, Counts Colredo and Kaunitz.

*Vienna, Oct. 6.* M. de Callenback, Privy-Counsellor of the Prince Archbishop of Passau, having been nominated by the Empress's Council in the Department of Foreign Affairs, he has this Day begun to perform the Functions of his Charge.

*Leipsick, Oct. 9.* The Anniversary of the Birth of the King, who the Day before Yesterday entered into the 58th Year of his Age, was celebrated with great Magnificence at Hubertzbourg, whither their Majesties, accompanied by the Princes Xavier and Charles, went on Saturday Night, and from whence they Yesterday returned to this Place, in perfect Health.

*Kensington, October 22.*

This being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Coronation, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment his Majesty. The Guns in St. James's Park, and at the Tower, were fired, and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other publick Demonstrations of Joy upon that Occasion.

*Whitehall, October 22, 1753.*

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That an Incendiary Letter, was sent, on the 16th of September last past, by the Post, from London, to Hales Wortham, Junion, of Royston in the County of Cambridge, Gentleman, requiring him to lay One Hundred Pounds, at the Outside of his Gate, on the Monday, then next following, by Two o'Clock in the Morning, and threatening, in Case of Failure, to murder him, or fire his House; and also, that a second Incendiary Letter was likewise sent, on the 7th of this Instant October, by the Post, from London, to the said Mr. Wortham, threatening him with Death, if he did not lay the said Sum of One Hundred Pounds, in the Highway, by One o'Clock on the Monday Morning, then next following; and that, if he set any Body to watch, his whole Family should be murdered; His Majesty, for the better discovering, and bringing to Justice, the Persons, concerned in writing, and sending, the said two Incendiary Letters, is, hereby, pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person, or Persons, that actually wrote, and sent, the said Letters,) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice, or Accomplices, therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended, and convicted thereof.
